REED COLLEGE SCENES FILMED—The movie camera visited Reed college Saturday to film more scenes of activity for the Reed movie. It was the women who broke into the celluloid circle this time, as every co-ed was on hand in gymnasium garb to perform before the camera. Scenes were taken on the lawn, showing Reed women in an athletic exhibition similar to the one given recently in the gymnasium. The plan for the Reed film is to have a great many scenes taken, showing the picturesque beauties of the campus and the students in various athletic, social or curriculum activities. Within the next month athletic contests, registration day, student body meetings and the like are to be taken before the camera. With Reed college scenes as a prelude, a story conveying college atmosphere with plenty of action, will be filmed. The reels are to be used as publicity material by the college. The undertaking is made possible by the financial backing of a wealthy Portland citizen who is interested in Reed's growth.

MORE BOOKS AND PERIODICALS WANTED—Residents of Portland are depositing many magazines, periodicals and books in the blue boxes placed in prominent places of the city, declares John Anderson, who is in charge of the work of distributing them among the long-suffering tributes to Portland, but the adds there is a chance for improvement. TANK SHOWN AT EUGENE

THOUSANDS OF PERSONS ATTRACTED TO WAR MONSTER.

Fighting Tractor Bows Over House and Performs Other Amazing Stunts for Onlookers.

EUGENE, Or., April 12.—(Special.)—The American whippet tank, which is being shown at Eugene, the little machine built into an old wooden business building on Eighth avenue West and completely demolished it. Not satisfied with that, it climbed over the debris into the excavation several feet, climbed out again and returned to the fire station, where it is quartered in this city.

RED CROSS SHOP OFFERS MANY WORKS OF ART.

Artists of All Nations Represented in Collections Which Are to Be Disposed of at Low Prices.

A sale of over \$5000 worth of pictures, ranging in price from 10 cents to \$500, every one of which has been donated to the American Red Cross shop, 70-72 Third street, will begin this morning. The sale will be conducted by Mrs. Habersham, assisted by Mrs. Percy Smith, and will last two days.

Among the pictures to be offered for sale are a large number by Oregon artists who have won a national reputation. But artists of all nations are represented in the collection.

"Just to give an idea of the values to be offered at this Red Cross sale, every cent of the proceeds of which will go to the Red Cross, we have some wonderful works of art ranging around \$50," said Mrs. Habersham. "One picture, priced at \$18, has a frame that cost \$50, and similar values are to be found in the entire collection."

"It would be impossible to purchase the great majority of these pictures, even at an ordinary sale, for less than four times the price at which we will donate them. They were donated unconditionally to the American Red Cross shop and we are offering them at prices that make them remarkable, either to the art lover or merely to those who desire handsome wall furnishings for their homes."

The Red Cross shop is now anxious to have donated metal ware, no matter how tarnished, as it is just ready to have renovated a quantity of metal articles, such as percolators and breakfast sets.

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constitution and providing for "Establishing the principle of the single tax," as its title will declare.

The measure proposed reads as follows: Section 1 of article IX of the constitution of the state of Oregon shall be and hereby is amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. From July 1, 1921, to and until July 1, 1925, all revenues necessary for the maintenance of state county, municipal and district government shall be raised by a tax on the value of land, irrespective of improvements, shall be taken in lieu of all other taxes, for the maintenance of government, and for such other purposes as the people may direct. The intent of this amendment is to forever prevent the exploitation of the individual through the monopoly of natural or community-made values and opportunities."

Dormitory Contracts Awarded. SALEM, Or., April 12.—(Special.)—Contracts for the construction of a boys' dormitory and a hospital dormitory in action will be presented to First Lieutenant C. H. Fraser of the 44th infantry at Fort Lawton Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock.
