ITALIAN DRIVER ENTERS LIB-ERTY SWEEPSTAKES.

Twelve-Cylinder Packard Racer Will Be Used in Events at Indianapolis May 31.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 19 .- (Spe cial.)—Ralph DePalma world's speed king, has entered the 500-mile Liberty Sweepstakes, at Indianapolis, May 31. The premier driver in the American The premier driver in the American racing game will start in the chase for \$50,000 in gold in the 12-cylinder Packard racer that he has used with great success on the speedways the last two seasons.

This will be the sixth 500-mile race that DePalma has entered at Indianapolis and the third time that he has named an American-made car. In the 1911 event he drove a Simplex to sixth

apolis and the third time that it also named an American-made car. In the 1911 event he drove a Simplex to sixth place, in 1912 his Morcer failed carly in the race, his only starts with Yankee racers. In the 1912 race his Mercedes faitered with two laps to go to victory, in 1914 his Mercedes did not start, being damaged in qualifying, while in 1915 he scored a victory in the last 500-mile with the Grand Prix Mercedes. However, this American car has proved its metal in two seasons of racing and scored its most spectacular win last August on the Sheapshead Bay speedway, when it's Italian pilot put it over the jumps for five victories in five starts. In the day's racing it won the two, 10, 20, 30 and 50 mile races and set new world's records for the two 10, 30 and 50 mile marks in competition. That the car has speed is

two 16, 30 and 50 mile marks in competition. That the car has speed is shown by its average of 11.1 miles an hour in the 10-mile event.

In establishing a new hour record DePalma took the laurels from Jean Chassagne and the 12-cylinder Sunbeam, which established a mark of 107 miles, 1280 yards on the Brooklands speedway in England in 1910. DePalma and the Packard made 109 miles in the 60 minutes.

the 60 minutes. In establishing the 10-mile mark DePalma shattered the record made by Hornstead on the Brooklands track with a Benz, in January 1914, of 112.8 miles an hour by showing the average

miles an hour by shoving the average for the distance up to 113.7, covering the distance in 5:17:40.

When DePalma get the world's six hour record he bettered the performance of Dario Resta, Jean Chassagne and Lee Guinness, driving in relays, a Sunbeam on the Brocklands oval. DePalms covered 516 miles against the
