More 91st Men Entrain for Western Camp.

TROOPS HALT AT ST. PAUL

All San Francisco Turns Out to Greet 363d Infantry and 347th Field Artillery.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The following transport sailings were announced today: The transport Mercury, due at Newport News May 4, has on board the headquarters troops and headquarters detachment and other units of the 28th (Pennsylvania national guard) division; Major-General Charles H. Muir, commanding the 28th division, is aboard.

The transport Finland will arrive at Newport News May 1 with detachments of the 28th division; convalescent camps Nos. 2 and 10; base hospitals Nos. 22, 46 and 96, six casual companies and five convalescent detachments.

The transport Columbia, due at New York May 4, has on board bakery companies Nos. 395 and 327, 14 casual companies and 39 casual officers.

The transport Canonicus, due at New York also on May 1, is bringing the 1st artillery park, less truck company D.

CAMP MILLS, N. Y., April 22.—Detachments of troops from the 35th and 51st divisions, numbering 2644 officers and men, entrained here today for their demobilization centers at eight different camps. Among them were seven officers and 309 men, 246th machine-gun battalion, for Fort Russell, Wyo.

ST. PAUL, Minn., April 22.—Four hundred Washington and Oregon soldiers bound for Camp Lewis stopped here several hours today to take a bath and swim at the Y. M. C. A. The soldiers included the Camp Lewis detachment of the 363d Infantry and 181st brigade headquarters and two casual companies, the 350th and 414th. They left late this afternoon.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The following army organizations were announced today as assigned to early convey:

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.—A brilliantly lighted, laughing and dancing San Francisco was turned over to the heroes of the 363d Infantry and the 347th field artillery tonight, following the breaking up of their parade here today by a shouting mass of relatives and friends who defied rope barriers and police to welcome them hand to hand. The thousands of well wishers in a frenzy of gladness broke their packed ranks when an aged woman, spying her son in the line, ran out to kiss him. The strict military formation of the marching men was shattered by the host that followed them; the crowds finally forming a human trench through which the khaki-clad host marched single file, men, women and children clinging to their arms.

There were 2600 arrivals, the majority of them San Francisco and California men.

Hundreds of Red Cross workers in their various uniforms, the Salvation Army, Knights of Columbus, Y. M. C. A., war camp community service, Red Cross societies and representatives of other semi-military organizations were in line.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 22.—The 364th Infantry was welcomed home today by apparently almost everybody in Los Angeles and from near-by cities and towns.

OLD LANDMARK IS BURNED

KLAMATH FALLS HAS FIRE DOING \$60,000 DAMAGE.

Blaze Starts in Cafe Kitchen and Spreads so Rapidly Lodgers Have No Time to Dress.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., April 22.—(Special.)—Sixty thousand dollars is the estimated loss of the destructive fire which wiped out one of the oldest landmarks, the old American hotel, near the corner of Seventh and Main streets and its adjoining building between 4 and 5 o'clock this morning.

Thomas Dixon, was seriously burned. The blaze started in the kitchen of the Rex Cafe, on the lower floor of the hotel and spread so rapidly that many of the occupants of the rooms upstairs had to get out in scantiest apparel and finish dressing on the sidewalk.

A. A. Beltman, owner of the building, places his loss at \$30,000; insurance about 25 per cent.

Ross Nickerson of the Rex Cafe, who had just completed remodeling his establishment, loses over \$15,000, with only \$3000 insurance.

R. I. Hammond, clothier; W. C. Davenport, jeweler; R. M. Schenck, second-hand store; R. C. Vandamp and Fred U. Grenn were also heavy losers.

The fire department saved the adjoining buildings. The heat was so intense that big plateglass windows opposite for nearly a block were destroyed. The old American hotel was built 40 years ago and was one of the first buildings in that section of the city.

SITE PURCHASE PROPOSED

COUNCIL TO GET PLAN TO DRAW NEW INDUSTRIES.

Commissioner Mann Wants City to Buy Columbia Slough Property and Dig Channel.

Acquisition of property located along the Columbia river slough by the city through condemnation proceedings, digging of a channel at least 200 feet wide, and the offering of sites by the city to manufacturers who will immediately locate large industrial plants along the slough comprise the plan which City Commissioner Mann will present today to the city council.

Under the plan City Commissioner Mann proposes that the city move the "smokestacks" along the Columbia river and through the offer of land, build up Portland industrially and at the same time dig a channel of sufficient width to guarantee the flow of sewage which it is proposed will be emptied into the waterway from the Peninsula sewer district.

Money to handle the entire plan should be secured by a bond issue, according to Commissioner Mann, the entire plan to be presented to the people at the special city reconstruction election to be held on June 2.

LAWS IN PRINT MAY 15

Price of Volume Yet Undetermined, Deputy Koser Announces.

SALEM, Or., April 22.—(Special.)—In response to many inquiries as to the time when the laws enacted at the last session of the legislature will be in print, Deputy Secretary of State Koser today stated that it is not unlikely copies will be ready for distribution by May 15.

"It must be borne in mind that the legislature did not adjourn until February 27, and that the laws consequently will not be in effect until 90 days from that date, or May 29, which is about one week later than the laws usually go into effect, by reason of the fact that the last legislative assembly convened at a later date and also adjourned at a date some days later than usual," said Mr. Koser.

"As the price per volume is governed by the cost of compilation, printing and binding, it will not be possible to determine the price until this work is fully complete," said Mr. Koser.

MALLORY TO GO TO PRISON

Conviction of Physician Upheld by Supreme Court.

The conviction and sentence of Dr. W. E. Mallory, a naturopath having offices in the Broadway building, for an attack on a 17-year-old girl patient, were affirmed by the Oregon supreme court in an opinion received by District Attorney Evans yesterday. Dr. Mallory soon will begin serving sentence of from one to five years in the penitentiary given by Circuit Judge Kavanaugh July 3, 1918.

Dr. Mallory was treating the girl, who lived on a farm near Milwaukie, for gonorrhea, and required her to remove her clothing before treatment. He was arrested April 19, 1918, indicted by the grand jury and tried in July, defended by Attorney Henry E. McGinnis. An appeal was taken from the conviction by jury in the court of Judge Kavanaugh.
