

GERMAN DELEGATION REACHES VERSAILLES

Sixty Boches Compose Party to Discuss Peace Pact.

ARRIVAL LACKS INCIDENT

VERSAILLES, April 28.—(Havas.)—The German delegates to the peace conference arrived here this evening at 9 o'clock. The party numbered 60.

PARIS, April 28.—(Havas.)—The council of five at its meeting Saturday, La Liberté says, agreed that the German war prisoners shall be liberated after the signing of the peace treaty.

JAMES K. LYNCH PASSES AWAY AT ALAMEDA, CAL.

Governor of U. S. Federal Reserve Bank 62 Years of Age and Veteran San Francisco Financier.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.—James Kennedy Lynch, governor of the United States 12th federal reserve bank in this city, died early today at his home in Alameda, near here, from an attack of heart disease.

Mr. Lynch was a veteran banker of San Francisco. Son of James Lynch, pioneer to California in 1848, Mr. Lynch started his banking career with the First National bank here in 1877 as a teller.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS COVENANT REVISED TO MEET WORLD CRITICISMS IS MADE PUBLIC.

State Department Issues Text of Amended and Amplified Document as It Is to Be Presented at Plenary Session of Peace Conference Today.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—The state department made public tonight the text of the revised covenant of the league of nations, as it will be presented tomorrow to the plenary session of the peace conference at Paris. The text follows, with parenthetical insertions showing changes made in the covenant as originally drafted and made public.

The covenant of the league of nations: In order to promote international co-operation and to achieve international peace and security, by the acceptance of obligations not to resort to war; by the prescription of open, just and honorable relations between nations, by the firm establishment of the understandings of international law as actual rule of conduct among governments, and by the maintenance of justice and a scrupulous respect for all treaty obligations in the dealings of organized peoples with one another, the high contracting parties agree to this covenant of the league of nations.

Membership Provisions Named. Article 1. The original members of the league of nations shall be those of the signatories which are named in the annex to this covenant and also such of those other states named in the annex as shall accede without reservation to this covenant. Such accessions shall be effected by a declaration deposited with the secretariat within two months of the coming into force of the covenant. Notice thereof shall be sent to all other members of the league.

Old Article Amplified. (This article is amplified with alterations and additions the old article seven. It provides more specifically the method of admitting new members and adds the entirely new paragraph providing for withdrawal from the league.)

Sphere of Action Large. The assembly shall meet at stated intervals and from time to time as occasion may require, at the seat of the league, or at such other place as may be decided upon.

Plans Subject to Revision. Such plans shall be subject to reconsideration and revision at least every ten years. After these plans shall have been adopted by the several governments, limits of armaments therein fixed shall not be exceeded without the concurrence of the council.

Enlargement Provided For. With the approval of the majority of the assembly, the council may name additional members of the league whose representatives shall always be members of the council; the council with like approval may increase the number of members of the league to be selected by the assembly for representation on the council.

Any member of the league not represented on the council shall be invited to send a representative to sit as a member at any meeting of the council during the consideration of matters specially affecting the interests of that member of the league.

Article 5. Except where otherwise expressly provided in this covenant, decisions at any meeting of the assembly or of the council shall require the agreement of all the members of the league represented at the meeting.

Meeting Calls Decried. The first meeting of the assembly and the first meeting of the council shall be summoned by the president of the United States of America.

Expense to Be Apportioned. The expenses of the secretariat shall be borne by the members of the league in accordance with the apportionment of expenses of the international bureau of the Universal Postal Union.

Article 7. The seat of the league is established at Geneva. The council may at any time decide that the seat of the league shall be established elsewhere.

Article 8. The members of the league recognize that the maintenance of peace requires the reduction of national armaments to the lowest point consistent with national safety and the enforcement by common action of international obligations.

Article 9. A permanent commission shall be constituted to advise the council on the execution of the provisions of articles 1 and 8 and on military and naval questions generally.

Article 10. The members of the league undertake to respect and preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all members of the league.

Article 11. Any war or threat of war, whether immediately affecting any of the members of the league or not, is hereby declared a matter of concern to the whole league and the league shall take any action that may be deemed wise and effectual to safeguard the peace of nations.

Article 12. The members of the league agree that if there should arise between them any dispute likely to lead to a rupture, they will submit the matter either to arbitration or to inquiry by the council, and they agree in no case to resort to war until three months after the award by the arbitrators or the report by the council.

Article 13. The members of the league agree that whenever any dispute shall arise between them which they recognize to be suitable for submission to arbitration and which cannot be satisfactorily settled by diplomacy, they will submit the whole subject matter to arbitration.

Article 14. The council shall formulate and submit to the members of the league for adoption plans for the establishment of a permanent court of international justice.

Article 15. If there should arise between members of the league any dispute likely to lead to a rupture, which is not submitted to arbitration as above, the members of the league agree that they will submit the matter to the council.

Article 16. Should any member of the league resort to war in disregard of its covenants under articles 12, 13 or 15, it shall ipso facto be deemed to have committed an act of war against all other members of the league, which hereby undertake immediately to subject it to the severance of all trade or financial relations, the prohibition of all intercourse between their nationals and the nationals of the covenant-breaking state and the prevention of all financial, commercial or personal intercourse between the nationals of the
