

WEIRD BOMB SENT TO OLE HANSON

Clerk in Seattle Mayor's Office
Opens It Wrong Way.

MAIL BRINGS CONTRIVANCE

Infernal Machine Mailed in New
York Arrives When Official
Is Away on Loan Tour.

SEATTLE, April 28.—Police headquarters announced that the office of Mayor Ole Hanson in the Seattle city and county building today received a broken bomb in the mail. Mayor Hanson is at present in Colorado on a victory loan speaking tour.

Acid from the broken bomb spilled onto the table where it was found in the mail today, and led to its discovery. Mayor Hanson has recently delivered a number of addresses denouncing Bolshevism. He gained nation-wide fame when he attacked radical labor leaders and branded Seattle's recent strike a revolution.

Bomb Labeled "Novelty."
The bomb, police said, was postmarked New York and was marked "Novelty." A return address given on the package was "Novelty Department, Gimbell Bros., New York city."

Police said the bomb was a cylindrical bottle-like arrangement, aimed to explode when the bottle cap was unscrewed. Unscrewing of the cap, it was said, would cause sulphuric acid, which was in the top of the bottle, to drop onto and explode a substance, which, police said, was dynamite, in the bottom.

When the bomb arrived at the mayor's office a clerk noticed the break and held it upside down while he unscrewed the cap, thus allowing the acid to spill onto the floor instead of onto the dynamite.

No Hoax, Say Police.
Some officials at the city-county building stated they thought the bomb might be a hoax. Police, however, held to the claim that it was intended to explode when opened. The bomb was turned over to the postal authorities.

"It is an infernal machine as sure as any that was ever fashioned," C. M. Perkins, Seattle postal superintendent of mails, said today after examining the bomb. "The person who made it miscalculated somewhere, that's all." Postal Inspector J. S. Swenson said he also believed the bomb was not a hoax.

PUEBLO, Colo., April 28.—When shown the Associated Press report of a bomb received at his office, Mayor Hanson of Seattle said:

"If they have the courage, why don't they attack me like men instead of playing the part of cowardly assassins? One thing I am sure of, and that is that labor throughout this great land of ours has no connection whatever with this attempted outrage."

GIRL MYSTERY UNSOLVED

YOUNG COLLEGE STUDENT AC-
CUSED OF THEFT OF CLOAK.

Lillian Davis Prefers to Stay in Jail
Rather Than Let Parents Know
of Her Misfortune.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 28.—(Special.)—Who is Lillian Davis, pretty 19-year-old "mystery girl" who was arrested at the Y. W. C. A. a few days ago on a charge of grand larceny?

This is a question which is puzzling Deputy Prosecutor Royce and all others who have had opportunity to observe her case. She is accused of stealing a \$45 coat from the Ladies' Specialty shop. She admits she was at the store a day or so before the cloak was found in her room at the Y. W. C. A.

She says she was a freshman at the University of Washington in 1917 and a sophomore at Leland Stanford university last year. She is modest, unassuming and easily embarrassed, and speaks flawless English. She has none of the appearance of the young girls who are usually hailed into court on such charges.

The "mystery girl," who is slightly crippled, says that her father, Richard Davis, is a wealthy promoter of Juneau, Alaska, and that she is unable to reach him at this time. She says she has a large amount of money of her own, but that it is in a safe-deposit vault which cannot be opened without the consent of her father. She asserts she has rich relatives, but does not consider her predicament of such a serious nature that she should appeal to them. Deputy Prosecutor Royce declared that, while the case against the girl seemed very strong, she was making no apparent effort to fight it, or to get out of jail. He has started an inquiry to learn her true identity in the expectation that her relatives will come to her assistance when they hear she is under arrest here.

MURDERED CLERK BURIED

Lawrence Goodell, Native of Grants
Pass, Laid to Rest at Salem.

SALEM, Or., April 28.—(Special.)—Lawrence Goodell, 19-year-old night clerk at the Angela hotel, Portland, who was murdered by A. B. Foster, a druggist, last Thursday morning, was buried here this afternoon. The funeral services were arranged by Henry L. Benson, justice of the supreme court, an uncle of the murdered boy. Goodell was born at Grants Pass, Or., in 1900, but had lived practically all his life in Alaska, where his father was at one time a judge. The boy had been a helpless cripple since infancy.

REVISED LEAGUE COVENANT IS READY FOR PLENARY COUNCIL

Text of Amended Document as It Will Be Presented at Peace Conference
Issued by State Department.

(Continued From Page 6.)
members of the league represented thereon.

(Unchanged except for the addition of the last sentence.)

Article 17. In the event of a dispute between a member of the league and a state which is not a member of the league, or between states not members of the league, the state or states not members of the league shall be invited to accept the obligations of membership in the league for the purposes of such dispute, upon such conditions as the council may deem just. If such invitation is accepted, the provisions of articles 12 to 16, inclusive, shall be applied with such modifications as may be deemed necessary by the council.

Council to Make Inquiry.
Upon such invitations being given, the council shall immediately institute an inquiry into the circumstances of the dispute and recommend such action as may seem best and most effectual in the circumstances.

If a state so invited shall refuse to accept the obligations of membership in the league for the purposes of such dispute, and shall resort to war against a member of the league, the provisions of article 16 shall be applicable as against the state taking such action.

If both parties to the dispute, when so invited, refuse to accept the obligations of membership in the league for the purposes of such dispute, the council may take such measures and make such recommendations as will prevent hostilities and will result in the settlement of the dispute.

(Virtually unchanged.)

Article 18. Every convention or international engagement entered into henceforward by any member of the league, shall be forthwith registered with the secretariat and shall as soon as possible be published by it. No such treaty or international engagement shall be binding until so registered.

(Same as original article 23.)

Old Treaties Considered.
Article 19. The assembly may from time to time advise the reconsideration by members of the league of treaties which have become inapplicable and the consideration of international conditions whose continuance might endanger the peace of the world.

(Virtually the same as original article 24.)
Article 20. The members of the league severally agree that this covenant is accepted as abrogating all obligations or understandings inter se which are inconsistent with the terms thereof, and solemnly undertake that they will not hereafter enter into any engagements inconsistent with the terms thereof.

In case a member of the league shall, before becoming a member of the league have undertaken any obligations inconsistent with the terms of this covenant, it shall be the duty of such member to take immediate steps to procure its release from such obligations.

(Virtually the same as original article 25.)

Monroe Doctrine Secure.
Article 21. Nothing in this covenant shall be deemed to affect the validity of international engagements, such as treaties of arbitration or regional understandings like the Monroe doctrine for securing the maintenance of peace.

(Entirely new.)

Article 22. To those colonies and territories which as a consequence of the late war have ceased to be under the sovereignty of the states which formerly governed them and which are inhabited by peoples not yet able to stand by themselves under the strenuous conditions of the modern world, there should be applied the principle that the well-being and development of such peoples form a sacred trust of civilization and that securities for the performance of this trust should be embodied in this covenant.

The best method of giving practical effect to this principle is that the tutelage of such peoples be entrusted to advanced nations who, by reasons of their resources, their experience or their geographical position, can best undertake this responsibility and who are willing to accept it and that this tutelage should be exercised by them as mandataries on behalf of the league.

Self-Government Is Aim.

The character of the mandate must differ according to the stage of development of the people, the geographical situation of the territory, its economic condition and other similar circumstances.

Certain communities formerly belonging to the Turkish empire have reached a stage of development where their existence as independent nations can be provisionally recognized subject to the rendering of administrative advice and assistance by a mandatory until such time as they are able to stand alone. The wishes of these communities must be a principal consideration in the selection of mandatory. Other peoples, especially those of central Africa, are at such a stage that the mandatory must be responsible for the administration of

territory until conditions which will guarantee freedom of conscience or religion, subject only to the maintenance of public order and morals, the prohibition of abuses such as the slave trade, the arms traffic and the liquor traffic and the prevention of the establishment of fortifications or military and naval bases and of military training of the nations for other than police purposes and the defense of territory, will also secure equal opportunities for the trade and commerce of other members of the league.

There are territories, such as South-west Africa and certain of the South Pacific islands, which, owing to the sparseness of their population or their small size or their remoteness from the centers of civilization or their geographical contiguity to the territory of the mandatory and other circumstances can be best administered under the laws of the mandatory as integral portions of its territory subject to the safeguards above mentioned in the interest of the indigenous population. In every case of mandate, the mandatory shall render to the council an annual report in reference to the territory committed to its charge.

The degree of authority, control, or administration to be exercised by the mandatory shall, if not previously agreed upon by the members of the league, be explicitly defined in each case by the council.

A permanent commission shall be constituted to receive and examine the annual reports of the mandataries and advise the council on all matters relating to the observance of the mandates.

(This is the original article 19, virtually, except for the insertion of the words "and who are willing to accept" in describing nations to be given mandates.)

Fair Treatment for Labor.

Article 23. Subject to and in accordance with the provisions of international conventions existing or hereafter to be agreed upon the members of the league (a) will endeavor to secure and maintain fair and humane conditions of labor for men, women and children both in their own countries and in all countries to which their commercial and industrial relations extend, and for that purpose will establish and maintain the necessary international organizations; (b) undertake to secure just treatment of the native inhabitants of territories under their control; (c) will entrust the league with the general supervision over the execution of agreements with regard to the traffic in women and children, and the traffic in opium and other dangerous drugs; (d) will entrust the league with the general supervision of the trade in arms and ammunition with the countries in which the control of this traffic is necessary in the common interest; (e) will make provision to secure and maintain freedom of communication and of transit and equitable treatment for the commerce of all members of the league—in this connection the special necessities of the regions devastated during the war of 1914-1918 shall be in mind; (f) will endeavor to take steps in matters of international concern for the prevention and control of disease.

(This replaces the original article 20 and embodies parts of the original articles 18 and 21. It eliminates a specific provision formerly made for a bureau of labor and adds the clauses (b) and (c).)

League Rules Over Bureaus.
Article 24. There shall be placed under the direction of the league all international bureaus already established by general treaties if the parties to such treaties consent. All such international bureaus and all commissions for the regulation of matters of international interest hereafter constituted shall be placed under the direction of the league.

In all matters of international interest which are regulated by general conventions, but which are not placed under the control of international bureaus or commissions, the secretariat of the league shall be subject to the consent of the council and if desired by the parties, collect and distribute all relevant information and shall render any other assistance which may be necessary or desirable.

The council may include as part of the expenses of the secretariat the expenses of any bureau or commission which is placed under the direction of the league.

(Same as article 22 in the original, with the matter after the first two sentences added.)

Article 25. The members of the league agree to encourage and promote the establishment and co-operation of duly authorized voluntary national Red Cross organizations having as purposes improvement of health, the prevention of disease and the mitigation of suffering throughout the world.

(Entirely new.)

Amendments Are Provided.
Article 26. Amendments to this covenant will take effect when ratified by the members of the league whose representatives compose the council and by a majority of the members of

the league whose representatives compose the assembly.

Such amendments shall (the word "not" apparently omitted in cable transmission) bind any member of the league which signifies its dissent therefrom, but in that case it shall cease to be a member of the league.

(Same as the original, except that a majority of the league instead of three-fourths is required for ratification of amendments, with the last sentence added.)

Annex to the covenant: 1. Original members of the league of nations.

Signatories of the treaty of peace. United States of America, Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, British Empire, Canada, Australia, South Africa, New South Wales, India, China, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, Ecuador, France, Greece, Guatemala, Haiti, Hedjaz, Honduras, Italy, Japan, Liberia, Nicaragua, Panama, Peru, Poland, Portugal, Roumania, Servia, Siam, Uruguay.

States invited to accede to the covenant:

Argentine Republic, Chile, Colombia, Denmark, Netherlands, Norway, Paraguay, Persia, Salvador, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Venezuela.

The ladies' auxiliary of company H will have charge of some of the booths. Arrangements have been made for regimental, auxiliary and company nights.

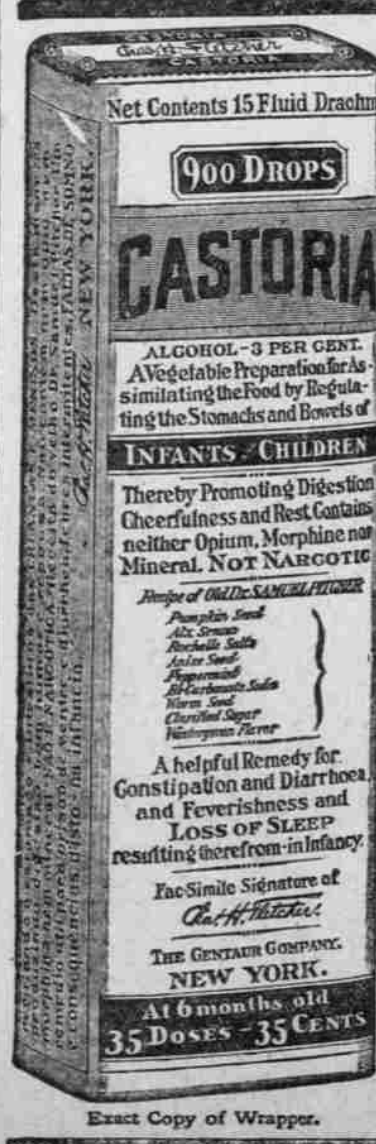
GERMAN CONCERT 'RAIDED'
