Slavic People Should Have Sea Outlet and Form Independent State. Says Massachusetts Member.

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Demanda of Italy for the port of Flume, denial of which led to the withdrawal of the Italian pienipotentiaries from the peace conference, were upheld tonight by Senator Lodge of Massachuseits, republican floor leader, in a telegram sent to Italian soldiers of Bosion.

Senator Lodge declared that Italy's demands rested on the ground of her national safety and projection, whereas

He asserted that innamuch as Italy had sacrificed a half million of her people and burdened herself with heavy debts in alding France. Italy's Desires Defended.

The senator said be could not under-stand why arrangements had not been made for satisfying Italy's desire for military and naval control over the Adriatic and at the same time provid-ing the Jugo-Slavs with a port through which they would have access to the

"In the discussions of the terms of peace," said Senator Lodge, "I have always declared that the region known as Italia irridenta and all adjoining regions where Italian culture and Italian continues and the said of the sa regions where Hallan cutture and Hallan population are dominant should be returned to Italy and that Italy should have military and naval control of the Adriatic. I have also said repeatedly that the Jugo-Slava ought to have access to the Adriatic which I regard as economically essential to their inde-

Situation Vitally Changed,

The pact of London, according to the president's statement, provided for the return of Finne to Croatia, but the dissolution of the Austrian empire has vitally changed the situation contomplated by the secret treaty of London and to that secret treaty the United States was not a party. I repeat that I think Italy should make arrangements to secure access to the Adriatic to the Slavic populations which I hope to the Slavic populations which I hope will form a united independent barrier

"As to Fiume, if Italy is of opinion that it is necessary to her safety and for her protection that she should hold Fiume, I am clearly of the opinion that Flume, I am clearly of the opinion that it should be here, especially since the people of Flume, I understand, have voted to join with Italy. MR. BARNES EXPLAINS ACTION

Recent Advance in Flour Prices Held Not Warranted.

NEW YORK, April 29.—Commenting on his notice that government purchases of "white flour for export would be discontinued, with a view to stopping speculation," Julius H. Barnes, federal wheat director, announced through the food administration grain carporation today that the speculative tendency threatened, unless checked, to carry flour prices above their proper reflection of the federal resale price of wheat.

Under the government resale rates, the statement said, legitimate milling was protected for fair returns. Since there was in the hands of Abarican milliers, or directed by them, it continued, \$9,000,000 to \$90,000,000 bushels of wheat, only a part of which probably was directed to flour users, the recent sharp advances in flour prices were not "fully warranted." If they were continued, the announcement asserted, import restrictions would be retaxed to permit foreign wheat and flour to enter.

Today's warning to speculators was the second issued by Mr. Barnes' office this month.

PACT EVOKES FEW CHEERS

BRITISH AND FRENCH PRESS INCLINED TO SKEPTICISM.

London Papers Do Not Welcom Covenant Heartify and Paris Papers Express Disappointment.

LONDON, April 29.-While on the thole the London morning newspapers in their editorial comment on the amended covenant of the league of na-tions do not welcome it heartily, there nowhere is any condemnation of its

It calls attention to the "extreme difficulty under which the idealist labors when he approaches purely practical issues, and adds "even in the very covenant we note the fact that the Monroe doctrine is especially inviolate."
