

GERMANY'S ASSEMBLY TO MOVE TO BERLIN

Transfer From Weimar to Former Capital Expected.

POLES PLANNING ADVANCE

Erzberger Says Teuton Government May Be Forced to Halt Further Movement of Haller's Troops.

BASLE, May 1.—(French Wireless Service.)—The German national assembly probably will be transferred from Weimar to Berlin next week, the Tagblatt of Berlin reports.

BERLIN, May 1.—(Via Copenhagen.)—Matthias Erzberger, chief of the German armistice delegation, in a note to Marshal Poch, says Germany has information that the Poles are planning soon an advance against German territory in Posen and Upper Silesia. After such an attack, he said, the German government could not permit the further passage through Germany of the Polish troops of General Haller.

COPENHAGEN, May 1.—The ring of government troops is closing around Munich, according to Berlin dispatches. The villages of Schwanau and Unifing have been captured from the soviet forces without loss. They are about 40 miles northwest of the city.

LONDON, May 1.—The Hungarian communist government, a wireless message from Budapest says, has offered the Roumanian government territorial concessions and requested an immediate cessation of hostilities.

The Hungarian war office statement of April 30 says that the Franco-Serbian, Roumanian and Czech-Slovak forces continued their advance on Budapest, the Roumanians capturing Mero-Tur, 40 miles southeast of Budapest.

The Hungarian government also has asked the Jugo-Slav government for a cessation of hostilities, offering territorial concessions.

The military statement says that on Tuesday the Serbians and French captured Hodomez-Vasarehly, while the Roumanians also occupied Szentes and Kun-Sent-Martin south of Mero-Tur.

The Czechs attacked with strong forces. It is added, against Chap and Sakoralia-Ubaly, northeast of Munkacs, and also in the Hernad and Upper Sajó valleys. The Hungarians retired from Chára.

SHORT HOURS FOR WOMEN

Section of Labor Party in England Takes Stand.

WAKEFIELD, Eng.—The women's section of the labor party in Wakefield, Normanton and Rothwell, have adopted a resolution declaring that no government scheme of reconstruction would be acceptable to the women unless it recognized the need of lightening the hours of work for women in their homes.

Dr. Marion Phillips declared that the government should insist that the hours of wage-earners should be arranged to conform to normal family life. She demanded the abolition of night work except for the maintenance of the public services.

SEATTLE SHIPYARDS BUSY

No Observance of May Day Held Despite Metal Trades Resolution.

SEATTLE, May 1.—All but one of Seattle's shipyards operated with full forces today, despite the fact that the Metal Trades council Tuesday adopted a resolution favoring the observance of May 1 as an international labor holiday.

At the Seattle North Pacific yard, where several hundred men failed to report for work, it was not known whether they remained away on account of the holiday propaganda or for other reasons.

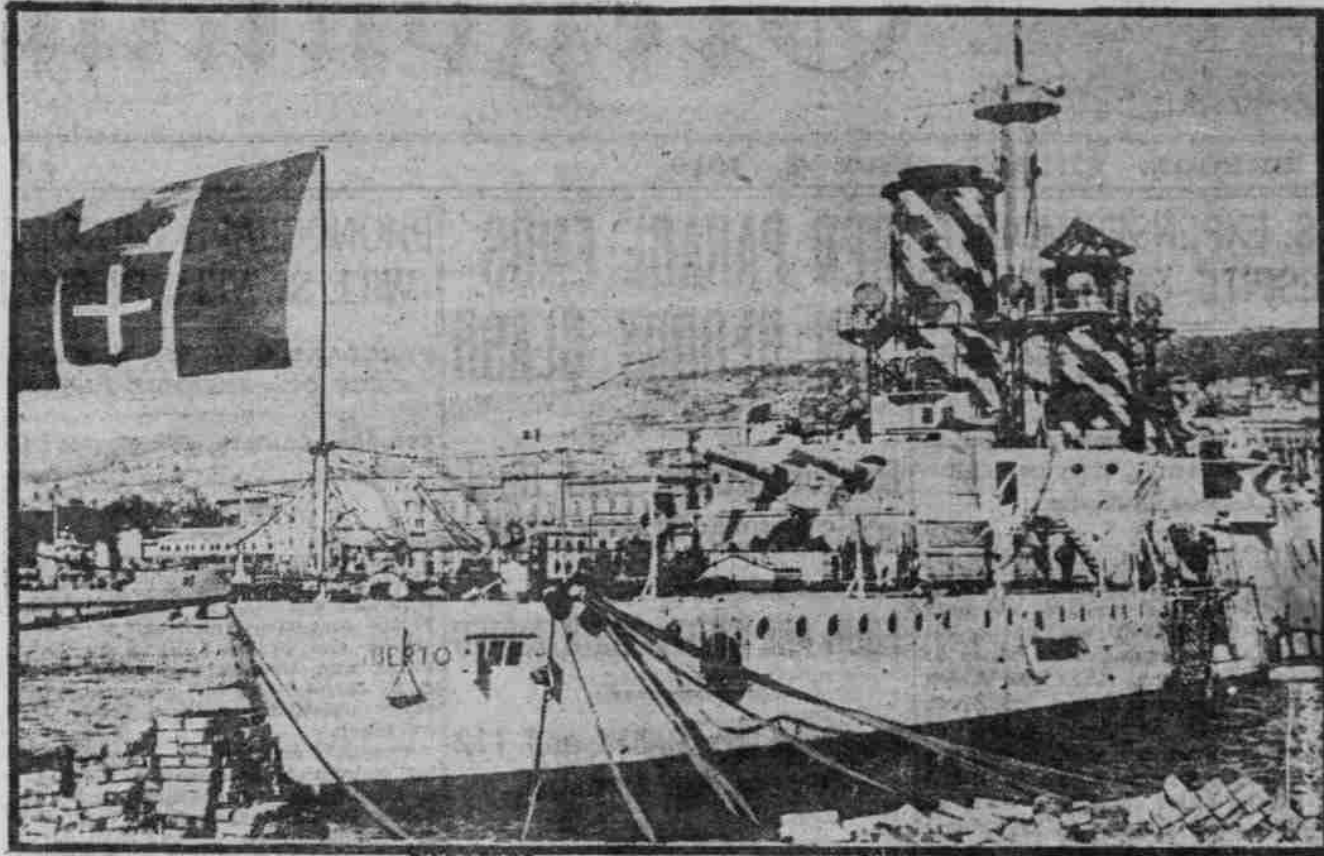

WICKERSHAM HELD LEADER

ALASKANS SEE NO TIME FOR CAMPAIGN AGAINST HIM.

Attorney-General Griggsby Being Urged by Democrats to Enter Congress Race.

SEATTLE, May 1.—(Special.)—Alaskans in Seattle believe that the shortage of time between the notice of the special election and the time the vote is taken will give former Delegate James Wickersham the advantage in the election June 3 to choose a successor to Delegate Charles A. Sulzer, who was buried two days ago at his home in Elizabeth, N. J.

Delegate Sulzer died on his way from his home to Ketchikan to seek medical attention on the same day that his certificate of election was issued.

Among many Alaskans it is figured that because of the short time before the special election, George Griggsby, attorney-general for the territory, is the only democrat who possibly could hope to defeat Wickersham. Griggsby has declared that he does not wish to go to congress. His appointment as attorney-general holds good for two years longer and he wishes to hold the berth. However, politicians who are trying to get him into the race declare that it is remotely possible to convince him that he can hold his present position and be a candidate against Wickersham.

If Wickersham should win out he would drop his contest, but if defeated he would renew the fight on the ground that he, instead of Sulzer, had been elected and that the special election was unnecessary.

FRAUD CHARGES REVIVED

AMENDED COMPLAINT IN SUIT ASKS ACCOUNTING.

Dr. A. A. Morrison Alleged to Have Made Huge Profit on Sale of Land to Church School.

Allegations of fraud, stricken from the original complaint of the board of school trustees of the Episcopal diocese against Dr. A. A. Morrison on motion before Presiding Judge Stapleton several weeks ago, are restored in slightly different form in an amended complaint filed in the circuit court.

The new complaint asserts that Dr. Morrison wrongfully and fraudulently conceived a scheme and plan for taking advantage of his position as member of the school board trustees by acquiring Oak Hill farm of 1615 acres in Yamhill county from one Bland Hering in 1908, and selling a portion of it to the board at an outrageous and exorbitant price, far beyond its value, present or prospective.

The complainant alleges that Dr. Morrison purchased the land for \$40,000, or \$40 an acre, and sold 100 acres of it to the board of school trustees for \$25,000, or \$250 an acre. There has been expended in buildings for the Bishop Scott academy on the site about \$30,000, the complaint contends, maintaining that even with the improvements, the land is not worth more than \$5000.

The trustees assert that Dr. Morrison knew the lands sold the board were "worn out, washed out by rains, poor and undesirable, not exceeding in value \$25 per acre." An accounting for the alleged fraud is asked of Dr. Morrison.

STREED'S SEARCH ENDS

PORTLAND MAN FINDS BODY OF WIFE AT THE DALLIES.

Woman, Missing Two Weeks, Is Believed to Have Killed Self and Two Children.

THE DALLIES, Or., May 1.—(Special.)—When shown the body of a woman found in the Columbia river here this morning by local ferrymen, Ole Streed of Portland positively identified it as his wife's, who mysteriously disappeared at Arlington Wednesday. Mr. Streed arrived here this afternoon from Arlington, where he has been conducting a search.

He declared that there is no doubt that his wife drowned her two small children and then committed suicide. He said that she had made two previous attempts to end her life.

His wife and two children arrived in Arlington from Heppner on April 11. She went into a restaurant there and asked permission to leave her baggage until train time. Some time afterwards she and the children were seen by a gang employed on the highway, who said that the woman and two little ones were strolling along picking flowers by the roadside, apparently carefree and happy. Her husband believes that she was overcome by a fit of despondency and flung the two children and herself into the river.

YOUTH HELD AS NUISANCE

R. E. Wilson Refuses to Work When Positions Are Found Him.

R. E. Wilson, formerly a student at an officers' training school and son of Mrs. Laura Espy Wilson, prominent clubwoman, was arrested at the liberty temple yesterday and charged with disorderly conduct. Patrolman Evans, who made the arrest, reported that Wilson, who is only 19 years old, had made himself a nuisance by haunting the government employment office in search of positions which he would not keep after he had secured them.

Police say that after quitting work the government employment office had found for him, the boy would return to the office and upbraid them if another job was not forthcoming.
