

ALL ORDER GONE IN HUNGARIAN CAPITAL

Panic Again Prevails in Red-Ridden Budapest.

BELA KUN IS FRIGHTENED

Soviet Minister Said to Have Had Narrow Escape From Violence at Hands of Council.

BUDAPEST, May 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Confirmation of the unconditional surrender of the Hungarian government has been received in a dispatch from Vienna.

BERLIN, May 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—Budapest is the scene of the greatest panic, newspaper dispatches say. Recent statements by Bela Kun, Soviet foreign minister, have led to a complete disappearance of order and Bela Kun himself is reported to have had a narrow escape from violence at a meeting of the soldiers and workers' council. Red Guards have patrolled the streets threatening the bourgeoisie.

LONDON, May 5.—Hungarian Soviet forces have recaptured Szolnok, on the Thais river from the Roumans, according to a Hungarian wireless message dated Sunday.

COPENHAGEN, May 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—A Budapest report says the eastern command of the red army claims to have the Thais river securely and that the Czechs have not advanced beyond Miskolc.

PARIS, May 4.—(French wireless service.)—In Jugo-Slavic circles in Paris the following is given as the reason for the advance of the Jugo-Slav troops in Carinthia beyond the limits fixed in the armistice:

"The Slovenian population of Carinthia had been exposed to the exactions of undisciplined bands of German, Jugo-Slav troops were invited to cross the boundary and disarm these bands and occupy the districts temporarily."

BERLIN, May 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—The German national assembly will convene next Thursday in Berlin for a few sessions to discuss the peace terms, says a dispatch to Tagblatt from Weimar.

The national assembly will resume its sessions at Weimar in two or three weeks, the advices add.

PARIS, May 5.—Only three of the hostages executed at Munich by the communists before they were overpowered could be recognized. One was Prince Albert of Thurn and Taxis. Among the bodies which were unrecognizable were three that had been decapitated. They are believed to be those of the Countess Westarp, Countess Dalmat, who has been known as one of Munich's benefactors, and Professor Franz von Stuck.

BERLIN, May 4.—Herr Klingelhofner, a member of the Munich communist government, has been executed after a trial by court martial, the report from Augsburg says. The message confirms the shooting of Herr Klingelhofner, commander of the Bavarian red army and says Gustav Landauer, minister of enlightenment in the communist government, was murdered by a mob.

PARIS, May 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—The situation in Lemberg, Galicia, has greatly improved, according to advices received from the Polish committee at Paris. The Polish troops are said to have driven back the Ukrainians so far that Lemberg no longer is in danger from snails.

defense as bearing on Ruth's mental condition," he said.

"They might as well put this operation forward as anything else they can find," remarked John D. Carmody, deputy prosecuting attorney.

Attorney Hillen said he did not feel at liberty at this time to give the names of the experts he will call for the battle of the alienists with Dr. Nicholson.

Woman Saw Poison Given.

In the list of witnesses announced in the trial, interest is centered in the name of Mrs. P. H. McCue, who is now believed to be the woman who sat at a nearby table in the Bon Marche restaurant and saw the Garrison girl stir the poison into the fruit cocktail which she later served to Grace Elizabeth Storrs, and which caused the latter's death.

At the time the death of Mrs. Storrs was under investigation, a prominent Seattle woman was said to have told the authorities that she had observed Miss Garrison stirring the fruit salad that she afterward gave to Mrs. Storrs and it was partly through this information that the officers obtained the confession from Miss Garrison. The identity of the informant was withheld at that time.

Mrs. McCue, who is the wife of B. H. McCue, president of the Northwestern Fisheries company, 2000 East Cherry street, refused to discuss the subject and would neither affirm nor deny that she was the woman whose keenly observant eye witnessed the poisoning.

No Trace of Remorse Shown.

Although her face was pale, there was no trace of remorse and agonizing uncertainty spent at the detention home. She has gone through a month of waiting, uninterrupted by any court procedure. If the month has been torture, Ruth showed no trace of it.

There were dark circles under her eyes, but they were no deeper or more conspicuous than the shadows which every-day work brings to the eyes of many a working girl.

She was apparently making no superhuman effort to control herself. Her hands were almost motionless during the first hour or so of choosing a jury.

Only once or twice did she shift the position of the trim, slipped feet. Not once did she tap floor or table nervously with toe or finger tips.

With her eyes straight ahead, she seemed to be fixing attention on the work of examining the jury. Once or twice she smiled faintly at a juror's answer to counsel's question. Not once was she observed looking in the direction of her sister, Mrs. Clara Rice, or her cousins, Mrs. A. R. Askren and Mrs. George Esary, who were seated about four yards from her and almost within range of her vision. By turning her head slightly she could have spoken to them.

Dress of Prisoner Described.

The gown worn by Ruth today was new to the public. She has formerly appeared in a taupe broadcloth suit or simple silk dress. Nothing she could have chosen to appear in for the jury's first glimpse of her could have been simpler or more unsophisticated. The skirt, according to pleated, was short and set off to best advantage, without emphasizing, a slender pair of ankles.

Her hat had a tendency to emphasize her youth. Slightly turned down and without trimming, it brought out by the simple business of contrast the brilliant blue eyes, full, tender lips and white skin.

Women's interest in the youthful prisoner was everywhere apparent. Although the percentage of men and women who gained admission to the courtroom was in favor of the latter, it was the women whose curiosity was most apparent. In whispers they discussed the defendant's personal appearance. The general verdict seemed to be that she was pretty and did not show signs of severe mental stress.

DREAMY LOOK GETS PRIZE

Bossy, With Big Eyes, Tiny Ears and Thick Neck Wins.

MINNEAPOLIS.—To be a beauty in the bovine species is an accomplishment subject to as many requirements as being the season's most popular debutante, according to Dr. C. W. Gay, professor of animal husbandry at the University farm.

"Beauty in a cow, Dr. Gay said, is as clearly defined as in a human person. To be sure, the first points of consideration in selecting cows are those which pertain to productiveness, but when beauty is the consideration, a few simple standards to live up to as anyone."

"A placid, lazy, even expression of countenance," said Dr. Gay, "is one attribute of beauty in a cow. The head should be large, full and clear, and the ears, medium in size and carried alert."

General trimness and refinement, indicative of breeding, is the standard to which the cow must attain in order to join the ranks of beauty. Double chins are taboo. The flesh under the chin must not sag and the line must be clean cut.

A cow should have a small, fine head and horns at the top of the head broad, and the neck short and thick. The muzzle should be wide and the nostrils large. The line of the back should be straight. Soft, fine hair, that will marcel easily is an enviable attribute in cows.

A black nose and black tipped tail are marks of beauty in cows, according to Professor C. H. Eckles, head of the division of dairy husbandry. This, however, is a trait required as an essential, Professor Eckles said. Many years ago it was a trait absolutely necessary in cows for exhibition purposes, he said, and the black tail and nose might often mean a difference of hundreds of dollars.

Hawaiian History to Be Taught.

HONOLULU, T. H.—Two new courses are to be added to the curriculum of the public schools in Hawaii, Hawaiian history and Hawaiian commercial possibilities. The teachers in both of these courses will be prominent Honolulu men who have volunteered their services. Men who actually made history in Hawaii have agreed to give lectures. The list includes former President and Governor Sanford B. Dole, W. R. Castle, Charles J. Connelley, Governor C. J. McCarthy, J. S. Emerson and former Governor Walter F. Frear.

U. S. Office to Be Discontinued.

TACOMA, May 5.—The office of the United States health department in Tacoma, which has been in charge of the zone around Camp Lewis and has also assisted in the sanitary and pure-food work in the city of Tacoma, is to be discontinued May 15, according to orders received from Washington, officials in the service announced today.

ST. LOUIS.—A romance growing out of the recent Armenian-Syrian relief fund campaign resulted in the secret marriage of Haig Gudenian, the famous Armenian violinist, who appeared in concert here as part of the campaign program, and Miss Olive Peabody, daughter of Mrs. Leonora Peabody, 5355 Pershing avenue. The wedding took place in the court of a justice of the peace at St. Charles.

Announcement of the wedding and the beginning of the honeymoon were shared a few days by the accidental death of Sterling Mayfield Peabody, a brother of the bride, who was killed in an automobile accident at Riverdale, Cal., the night of the marriage. Friends and the mother of the bride learned of the wedding last Friday.

Miss Peabody met Mrs. Peabody the first time on the stage of the Odeon following a concert in which he was soloist. Two weeks later they became engaged. The violinist left St. Louis at the close of the campaign in February and returned last week to claim his bride.

Mrs. Gudenian is a granddaughter of the late Judge Peabody. Gudenian was educated in Constantinople and is a linguist and widely read. He made his first appearance in concert at the age of 18 and has appeared in the capitals of Europe and the leading cities of the United States.

TREPASSEY, N. F., May 5.—The navy today began laying its chain of destroyers for the inter-continental flight.

Six destroyers which arrived here yesterday for supplies left today for their stations on the coast to the Azores. The destroyer Roper, the seventh craft, was delayed in re-fueling and will leave at daybreak tomorrow.

ST. JOHNS, N. F., May 5.—Another British team of aspirants for trans-Atlantic flight honors has entered the London Daily Mail's \$50,000 prize competition. Captain Alcock, pilot, and Lieutenant Arthur Whitten Brown, navigator, are on the steamship Mauretania, which left Liverpool May 3, and their machine will follow soon on another vessel.

its crew have left Liverpool on the Page machine, another contestant, and the Handley-Page machine, the final destination being Harbor Grace.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Orders for new airplanes soon will be placed by the war department to prevent complete collapse of the airplane manufacturing capacity built up during the war.

The machines to be ordered will be of advanced types developed from war experience and designed by engineers working under conditions more favorable than those existing during the war.

Equipment to Be Concentrated.

These fields now are being used to store equipment. This equipment is to be concentrated at fields to be retained, which already have been announced. The ten fields then will be turned over to any other government department that might need them, or the buildings will be sold or salvaged.

Definite plans for the air service await action of congress as to the military policy. Interned Aliens Released.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—Three Germans brought here in August, 1918, and interned as dangerous enemy aliens since, with 150 others brought from the Philippines, were released from internment today on order of the attorney-general and permitted to board a transport to return to the islands with full rights. They were Paul Weber, Charles Messenger and Morris Herman.

Court Sustains Bureleson.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Action of Postmaster General Burleson in excluding from the mails certain copies of the Milwaukee Leader of which Victor Berger was editor, was sustained today by the District of Columbia court of appeals, which denied an application for a writ of mandamus.
