

LOUIS F. HART BOOM RECEIVES IMPETUS

Acting Governor Will Be Candidate if Lister Resigns.

PROBABILITY INCREASING

Governor Will Not Shoulder Executive Duties Until Fully Recuperated.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 5.—(Special.)—Impetus has been given to the gubernatorial boom of Lieutenant-Governor Louis F. Hart by his prominence the last 10 days at such public functions as the tractor show at Walla Walla, and the word that Hart's friends have passed around that if he continues to function as governor he will demand that the public either endorse his career or turn him down. It is an open secret that if Governor Ernest Lister should permanently relinquish the duties of the gubernatorial office and give Hart a free rein he would be a candidate for chief executive. On the other hand, some of Hart's closest friends maintain that if he never gets a free rein in the governor's service he will feel that he should run for lieutenant-governor again to go the distance. He seeks basing a claim for re-election on the fact that he served as chief executive during a crisis and also served as lieutenant-governor, therefore the public knows what he would do in either position.

Trend of Events Awaited.
Politicians quote Lieutenant-Governor Hart both as a prospective candidate for governor and as a seeker for renomination. The fact is that Hart decided last year that he would drop out of politics altogether, and now he figures himself a creature of circumstances and not an arbiter of his own political fortunes. He leaves himself an "out" to do what circumstances indicate the best policy. There is an increasing probability that Governor Lister will not attempt to shoulder executive duties until he has thoroughly recuperated. He is taking long walks daily, and tells his friends that he feels much improved in health but Governor Lister does not feel that he can go into his office as once. Even if he did he would do so temporarily and be prepared to leave the state in the fall to avoid the winter climate. That he is prominently out of politics, no matter what may occur, is something that Lister and his friends are thoroughly agreed upon.

All Depends on Governor Lister.
The governor would like to re-enter business life and inasmuch as arrangements were made before his illness for such a return they will be carried out if he is strong enough to shoulder his responsibilities.

The uncertainty of Lister's action affects the Hart gubernatorial candidacy even more than republican politicians have figured, for Hart will not make capital out of the executive's illness. This means he will hold himself in reserve until Lister's fight for recovery of health is settled. There can be no question about the candidacy of Roland H. Hartley of Everett, who already has begun to campaign for votes. Hartley and Senator E. T. Conan of Spokane are the only avowed candidates for the republican nomination. Hartley has a war record that runs through one Indian campaign, a Spanish-American war connection and his own enlistment in the world war. Conan would have to be a business man's candidate and that is the attitude he is assuming.

Colonel George B. Lamping of Seattle, member of the state senate and a Philippine war veteran, has not done much since he returned from California after his vacation tour which followed the Legislature's adjournment, but he has intimated that he will be in the race. And of the handful of republican aspirants who can be advanced, said that they are awaiting developments.

RESPIRE GIVEN RENTERS

Courts of New York Put Check on Profiteering Landlords.

NEW YORK, May 5.—The courts came to the aid of victims of alleged rent profiteering today by refusing to permit landlords to eject tenants along upper Broadway and Riverside Drive until the home leasers had been given a week to find new apartments.

Disposition proceedings were brought by the landlords when the tenants refused to pay the higher rentals imposed May 1, and hundreds of persons appeared in the municipal courts today to fight the attempt to evict them. The justices took cognizance of the scarcity of apartments in the city and refused to sign dispossession warrants when this excuse was advanced. Tenants in some sections of the city said that if evicted they would be forced to put up tents in parks and on vacant lots.

DR. MARY THOMPSON DIES

PIONEER WOMAN PHYSICIAN
SUCCEUMS TO PARALYSIS.

Practice of Medicine Begun in the '80s—Ardent Advocate of Woman Suffrage and Temperance.

Dr. Mary Thompson, pioneer woman physician, died Sunday at her residence, 430 Sixth street, as a result of a para-

lytic stroke suffered six months ago. She had practiced medicine since the '80s, and was an ardent advocate of woman suffrage and of temperance. Mrs. Thompson was born in New York, February 14, 1825. She moved to Chicago when she was 12 years old and lived there until her marriage. She studied medicine in a doctor's office after her marriage, while she and her husband lived in La Salle, Ill.

Mrs. Thompson was of the abolitionist party in ante bellum days, and during her residence in La Salle she helped many negro slaves to escape into Canada. There was an element of risk in giving the fugitives assistance, inasmuch as the sentiment in La Salle was divided on the slavery question. Feeling ran high, and detection might have resulted in prosecution, or even mob violence, for the city was filled with canal diggers of a lawless type.

During the Civil War, Mrs. Thompson was a member of the Sanitary Commission. She devoted her time to assisting the wives, children, and dependents of the soldiers, for whom the government made little provision. Coming to Oregon in 1866 by way of the Isthmus of Panama, she took a deep interest in the affairs of the new country. All her life she had been a public speaker and, until her death, she took a deep interest in the temperance question.

As an advocate of woman suffrage she went to Washington, D. C., 42 years ago and appeared before congressional committees to plead for women's rights. She took a deep interest in political reforms and worked for the initiative and referendum in Oregon.

Mrs. Thompson was a charter member of the Woman's club and also an honorary member. Ever since coming to Portland she had been a member of the United Methodist church. Mrs. Thompson lived at 430 Sixth street for 36 years, although she made trips to California, Alaska and the Hawaiian Islands and to the east. She was very fond of Portland, however, and always glad to return here after her travels. Her husband, Reuben Thompson, contractor, died here 34 years ago.

Mrs. Thompson is survived by one son, James R. Thompson, 454 1/2 Sixth street, a sister, Mrs. Rebecca Middleton, and a brother, Vincent Cook, both of Portland.

Funeral services will be held at 2 P. M. today in the First Unitarian church. Rev. William G. Elliot, her pastor, will officiate, and Rev. Thomas L. Elliot, pastor emeritus, will be asked to assist him. The pallbearers had not been selected last night. The body will be cremated.

UNION MEN QUIT AT 3:30

Orders of Employers to Work Until 4:06 P. M. Openly Defied.

TOLEDO, O., May 5.—About 7500 unionized employees in the Overland plant, and 8000 of the Electric Auto-light company, an Overland subsidiary, quit work as usual at 3:30 this afternoon in defiance of orders of their employers to stay on the job until 4:06 P. M. Included in the employees to cast their lot with the men were 500 women. Vice-President Clarence A. Earl of the Overland declared that each employee quitting at 3:30 had forfeited his job.

Union men at the Overland said they expected the 3000 nonunion workers would walk out in sympathy.

VAN CLEVE PAYS TRIBUTE

LIUTENANT-COLONEL RETURNS TO PRACTICE OF MEDICINE.

91st Division Declared Cleanest Outfit Morally and Made Up of Best Sportsmen in Whole A. E. F.

Dr. Archie C. Van Cleve, who went to France as regimental surgeon of the 52d infantry, with the rank of major, has returned to Portland to resume the practice of medicine after winning promotion to the grade of lieutenant-colonel for gallantry in action during 17 days when he served under continuous shell fire.

The 91st division, with which he served, he says, was the cleanest outfit morally, was made up of the best sportsmen and gained more ground during the time it was in action than any other division in the American expeditionary forces.

The 362d was the regiment which lost men in a train wreck before it reached the front. As a result of the wreck the medical contingent had 31 men in its personnel instead of 52 when the regiment went over the top.

The medical contingent, Dr. Van Cleve says, was never further back than the support lines. Dr. Van Cleve was out of action for 12 hours after he inhaled a bit of gas. Captain J. E. Doudna, one of his medical officers, was the second man in the 91st division to win the distinguished service cross.

MOTHER AND SON KILLED

Police Say Woman Cut Child's Throat, Then Her Own.

LOS ANGELES, May 5.—Mrs. Josephine Lopez, 27 years old, killed herself and her 6-year-old son, John, at her home at Venice, a beach resort near here, today, according to the police.

Mrs. Lopez had been ill for some time. She sent her husband, John Lopez, to the home of a neighbor to ask the latter to nurse her. When he returned with the woman the bodies of

Mrs. Lopez and their son were lying on a bed. Their throats were cut. In one of Mrs. Lopez' hands was a razor. With the other the child was clasped to her breast.

AGGIE TEACHER TO RETURN

Professor Buol Writes From France He Be on Hand for Fall Term.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 5.—(Special.)—Lieutenant Edward M. Buol, professor of logging engineering at O. A. C., who is at present on leave of absence for the duration of the war, writes from France that he will return in time to resume his work next fall.

Lieutenant Buol is engaged in reconstruction work. He enlisted in Portland at the outbreak of the war and went overseas with the 29th engineer forestry regiment. He received his commission at a training school in France.

MONMOUTH SCHOOLS SHUT

Influenza Epidemic Reappears at Normal, High and Public Schools.

OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL, Monmouth, May 5.—(Special.)—A number of the Oregon Normal school have had a mild attack of influenza. Dr. McCullion, county health officer, made an examination and recommended that the school should be closed until May 19. This has been done. The directors of the public and high schools also have closed each of these schools until May 19.

"TABAKA" SEEK CHANGES

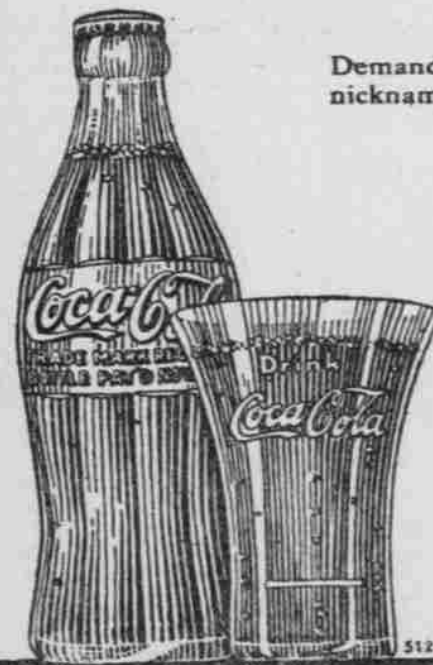
