ADRIATIC CRISIS STIRS ALL

DEMAND FOR ANNEXATION OF FIUME PREVAILS IN ITALY.

Americans Much Impressed by Political and Historical Knowledge of Even Uneducated Italians.

ROME, May 6.—(Special cable.)—The prolongation of the Adriatic crisis disturbs public opinion. D'Annunzio's demand for the immediate annexation of Fiume is echoed throughout the peninsula, irrespective of any man's politics or his place in society. The Americans now in Italy are much impressed by the political and historical knowledge of even uneducated Italians who declare with Latin vehemence:

"Fiume has belonged to Italy for centuries. The Jugo-Slavs are there now because they immigrated there. Would the Americans abandon cities of which the vast majority of the population is American because those cities are under foreign rule? No. And why should we, whose ancestors ruled the world when America was inhabited by redskins, abandon Fiume?"

Scavengers, porters, unskilled laborers of all kinds are arguing in this way here today. The opinion prevails that had the government declared the annexation of Fiume immediately after the chamber of deputies voted confidence in them, Paris would have invited the Italians to return to the peace conference even more hastily.

The public knows that the Jugo-Slavs cannot fight because they lack everything needed to go to war. The public will probably force the government to declare the annexation of Fiume, just as in May, 1915, it forced the government to join the allies.

AERO SCOUTS TO GO SOUTH

Aviation Landing Fields in Oregon to Be Selected.

Scouts of the Aero club of Oregon will start south sometime next week for the purpose of selecting four or five permanent aviation landing fields

between Portland and Ashland. The fields will serve not only the purposes of the club, but will be of value to the government's aviation programme, which recommends that at least four such fields be selected from the California line to Portland. The selection of the fields was authorized Monday night, at a meeting of the Aero club of Oregon, held at the Chamber of Commerce, when 150 members of the new organization were in attendance. The club also took steps toward co-operation with the Rose Festival association in the aerial programme of the coming fiesta, and will attempt to have the landing fields of the southern route in readiness for the visit of the festival planes, which are to fly overland from Sacramento.

BAZAAR PLANS CONCLUDED

"JAZZ CANYON" OPENS AT AUDITORIUM TOMORROW.

Fathers of Soldiers and Sailors Expect to Place Organization on Solid Basis With Funds Raised.

Fathers of Soldiers and Sailors concluded plans for the frontier bazaar to be staged at the Public Auditorium beginning today and to continue until May 17, with continuous performances every night. It is to be known as "Jazz Canyon" and is put on for the purpose of raising funds to finance the organization in its work on behalf of the families of soldiers and sailors and place it on a solid basis for continuing the work it has started when its activities pass from the founders to the sons who have served overseas.

About 30 members of the auxiliaries of batteries A and B, 147th field artillery, brought a surprise to the fathers and great satisfaction when they tendered their services every night for ten days in assisting in whatever way they can to make the affair a success. The offer was accepted and the ladies will serve in various responsible duties during the show.

SILVER LAKE FILLING UP

Squatters Who Hoped to File Homesteads Disappointed.

BEND, Or., May 6.—(Special.)—Squatters who have informally claimed the bed of Silver lake, intending to make homestead entry as soon as a government classification could be made, are doomed to bitter disappointment, for already their cabins are surrounded by water, heavy snows during the winter provided more than enough water for irrigation, and with the coming of warm weather the lake bed is rapidly filling up.

The lake was temporarily dry in one other year, 1889, but according to irrigationists will not permanently pass out of existence until the construction of more reservoirs effectually shuts off the entire water supply. The land which for ages has been covered by the lake, is of a rich alluvial character and has been eagerly seized by settlers during the last few months, practically every square foot of it was under cultivation when the lake began to take form again.

Mackenzie Pass Being Surveyed.

BEND, Or., May 6.—(Special.)—Headed by a party of seven men, S. S. Cranshaw, of the bureau of public roads, United States forest service, Monday started a survey of the Mackenzie pass highway from Sisters, at the same time

that another party of engineers is starting from Blue river, the Lane county end of the highway. The survey made from this end of the pass road will be approximately 20 miles in length, and is expected to furnish data necessary before a call for bids can be made.

BOYS JAILED; GIRLS FREED

Robert Sleight and J. Allory Charged With Speeding at 50 Miles.

Riding tandem style on a motorcycle without a side car, two girls and two boys, Robert Sleight and J. Allory, were arrested early Sunday morning on the Sandy boulevard by Motorcycle Officer Horack. The officer stated that the quartet were traveling at a speed of 50 miles an hour when he overtook them.

One was sitting on the mudguard and two on the frame and handle bars. J. Allory, the driver, and Sleight were locked up in jail, but the girls were released.

Methodists to Rebuild Village.

NEW YORK, May 6.—Twelve villages on the Chateau-Thierry battlefield, where American soldiers helped to halt the German drive on Paris last summer, have been "adopted" for recon-

struction work by the American Methodist Episcopal church. It was announced Monday by the Methodist Centenary committee. The actual construction of the building is being done by the French government, but the church will contribute clothing, kitchen utensils and farm machinery.
