

BANK OF TRADING IN FUTURES THREATENED

National Wheat Administrator
Would Stop Abuses.

SPECULATORS ARE WARNED

Break in Corn at Chicago and En-
suing Rise Arouses Suspicion in
Mind of Mr. Barnes.

CHICAGO, May 6.—Julius H. Barnes, national wheat administrator, today in an address to members of the Chicago board of trade that the act establishing the food administration gave authority to control trading in foodstuffs on exchanges to the extent of prohibiting future trading. Although he said the act was still in effect and that his duty was imperative if demonstrated abuses should arise.

Mr. Barnes questioned frankly whether a fluctuation in corn prices, such as took place in Chicago yesterday—a rapid break of 10 or 15 cents followed by a quick reaction of 5 or 6 cents—was not a clear indication of speculation on so large a scale that it was overbalancing legitimate functions. A conference will be called May 13 at New York among representatives of millers, bankers, grain trade and others, at which certain trade agreements will be entered into, Mr. Barnes announced. He added that if the prices of flour did not sharply reflect the real situation in regard to supplies, the United States must shortly return to the 1917 food regulations which allowed only 30 days supply to be held on hand. He did not want to do this, however.

Mr. Barnes, it was admitted, is the biggest figure in the grain trade of the world by reason of his position, and the traders noted his youthful look and his healthy crop of light brown hair with surprise and interest.

Before the government drafted him Mr. Barnes was a keen trader himself. "I know that the food administrator relies on the officers of this exchange and others to protect the situation in the public interest, and I am sure he will not look in vain," said Mr. Barnes. "It has been in my mind for some time, and at a conference in New York a week from today, which I have arranged with advisory committees from the grain trade, from the milling trade, from the flour jobbers and bakers of this country, among other things I shall discuss with them the tabulation of a weekly report of authentic and exact information to be made public. I do not see why, for instance, the baking trade and the jobbing trade of this country should be excited by entirely erroneous statements as to the growing scarcity of wheat and flour when it is not the case."

MINE OWNER IS CONVICTED

William Dowling Found Guilty Under
White Slave Act.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 6.—William E. Dowling, part owner of a mine at Sloat, Cal., was found guilty of violating the Mann act by a jury in the United States district court here today. Dowling was charged with an indictment returned by the federal grand jury with transporting Mrs. Myrna P. Norbott of Riverside, Cal., from Reno, Nev., to Sloat for immoral purposes. The jury found the defendant guilty on all five counts in the indictment. Dowling's bail was increased from \$3000 to \$5000 by the court after the verdict was returned and Friday was fixed as the day for imposing sentence. Dowling was ordered detained in the county jail here until he could furnish the additional bail.

Desperate Negro Killed.

FLANO, Tex., May 6.—Tom Embrey, a negro, after standing off armed citizens and officers for four hours today from a barricade in his home here, was shot and killed shortly before noon. Nine persons were wounded by the negro, one probably fatally. The trouble started when Embrey attempted to kill his wife.

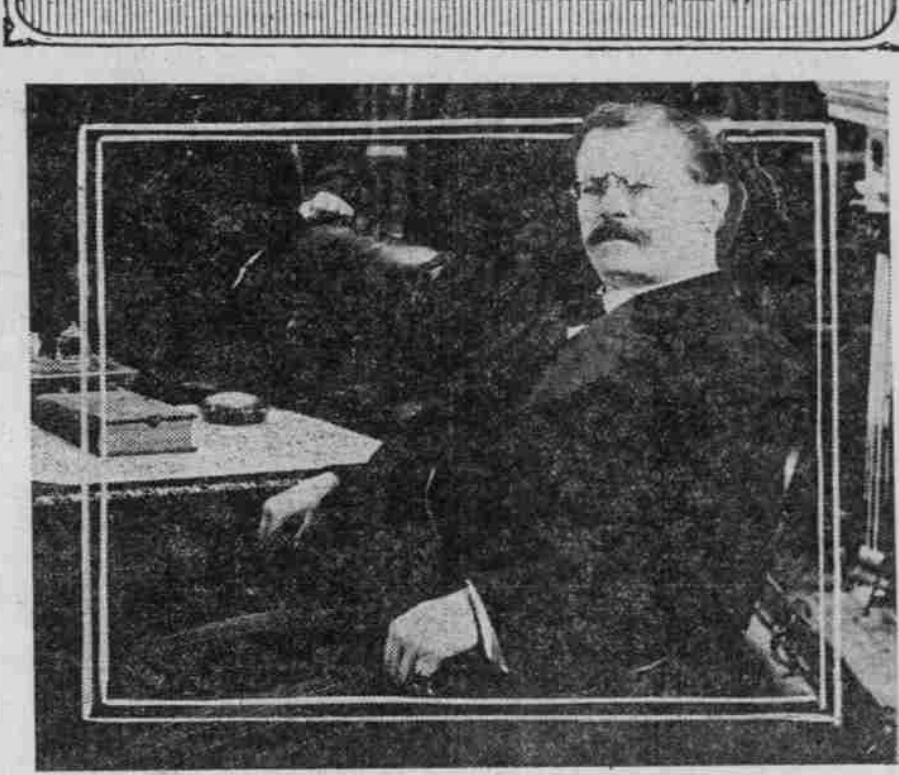
