BANKER MADE MODERATOR

J. WILLIS BAER OF PASADENA HEAD OF PRESBYTERIANS.

Layman Chosen as Highest Officer of Church for First Time in Its History.

ST. LOUIS, May 15.—J. Willis Baer, Pasadena, Cal., banker, late today was elected moderator at the 131st general assembly of the Presbyterian church of the United States, in session here. This is the first time in history a layman has been chosen as the highest officer of the church. Mr. Baer's opponent was the Rev. Dr. S. Hall Young, an Alaskan missionary.

Commissioners from every section of the country are in attendance and world issues will be considered in determining the church's policy. Laymen, who for the first time are eligible to hold high offices, are taking a leading part in the assembly. William Jennings Bryan, mentioned for moderator, did not arrive until after the election.

WETS STILL HAVE HOPES

Referendum Against Prohibition Is Asked in California.

SACRAMENTO, May 15.—A referendum petition directed against the Harbin prohibition enforcement act passed by the 45th California legislature and another against the national prohibition ratification resolution adopted by the legislature were filed today with Frank C. Jordan, secretary of state.

The petitions ask that the acts be referred to the people.

Democratic Leader Favors Treaty.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Senator Martin of Virginia, the democratic leader, announced on his return to Washington today that he would support the peace treaty and the league of nations covenant in the senate. He said he did not expect the treaty to be submitted by President Wilson until late in June.

Hospital Bed Capacity Cut.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, May 15.—A reduction in the bed capacity of the hospital at Camp Lewis has been ordered, curtailing the number from 1,000 to 750. This is the second reduction since the armistice was signed. Troops discharged at Camp Lewis up to this time total 35,920.

Japanese Place No Embargo on Rice

HONOLULU, T. H., May 15.—(Special).—The Japanese government will not put an embargo on rice shipments to Hawaii. The announcement was made by the local Japanese consulate yesterday following the receipt of a cablegram from Tokyo.

EXPERTS REPORT ON ALIENS

AMERICANIZATION TO BE FREE FROM RELIGION AND POLITICS.

Public School Indorsed as Best Means of Assimilating Children of Foreign-Born Parentage.

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Combined recommendations of many experts on relations with foreign-born citizens were given to the interior department today at the close of the national Americanization conference. The recommendation will be issued as a basis for a comprehensive programme of solidifying the racial elements of the nation.

Details of the recommendations were not made public, but it was understood that one of the basic suggestions was that all such work should be kept absolutely free of religious and political taint. The public school was indorsed as the best means of assimilating alien children.

Protests of foreign-born citizens against any suspicion of force in attempting to make citizens of immigrants or of requiring them to learn English were heeded in the advice that Americanization should never be imposed, but should develop from within outward.

ELMA POSTOFFICE ROBBED

CRACKSMEN ESCAPE WITH LOOT ESTIMATED AT \$1000.

Presumable Confederate Honks Auto Horn to Draw Voice of Explosion.

ABERDEEN, Wash., May 15.—(Special).—The postoffice at Elma was entered early this morning and the doors of the vault dynamited, evidently by expert cracksmen, and loot secured amounting, according to estimates, to about \$100, most of it in war savings stamps.

LOVELORN WAITRESS DEAD

Boise Woman Commits Suicide by Taking bi-Chloride Tablets.

BOISE, Idaho, May 15.—(Special).—Ella West, a pretty waitress of a local restaurant, died today, a suicide. She took bichloride of mercury tablets last Friday and a slow death followed.

Responsibility over a love affair was given as the cause. She was in love with a married man who was present when she took the tablets, but until he testified at the coroner's inquest tomorrow the facts will not be known. He refuses to talk. The girl died without telling where her relatives live. She had been married here, but obtained a divorce.

GROCER OF 670 DEKUM AVENUE MISSING FROM HIS HOME.

J. L. Gustin, grocer, of 670 Dekum avenue, has been missing from his home since Wednesday, May 7, and members of his family fear he may have committed suicide in a moment of despondency. The day following his disappearance he sent Mrs. Gustin a brief note, rather irrationally worded, bidding the family goodbye.

According to Mrs. Gustin, her husband has been subjected to brooding spells for the past year, following a severe injury received in an automobile wreck. Since his departure she and her sons have contrived to manage the grocery store, but are distraught by Mr. Gustin's absence.

Mr. Gustin is described as a man of 30 years, medium height and build, fair or sandy complexion, thin gray hair, reddish-gray mustache. He is slightly stooped, and a three-inch scar, shaped like a loop, is discernible on the right side of his head. He was dressed in a dark gray suit, black soft hat and black shoes.
