"VICTORY' WING, NEW TITLE

Committee Advises Convention Present Prayer Book Is Antiquated and Suggests Revision.

The razing of the present east wing of the Good Samaritan hospital and of the Good Samaritan hospital and erection of an enlarged modern and fireproof "victory" wing was recom-mended by the hospital board of trus-tees at the meeting of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon, which yesterday closed its three-day convention. The

closed its infee-day convention. In recommendation was adopted. Simplification of the prayer book was advocated in the report of a special committee appointed on that subject last year. The report declared the prayer book not only to be too large, cumbersome and complicated for mod-ern democratic use, but that the wording of the book is so antiquated as to interfere with its usefulness. Preservation of dignity and beauty of the prayer book was advocated by the re-port. Soldiers' Aid Appointed.

The Brotherhood of St. Andrew an-nounced the appointment of W. C. Harvey as its representative to aid returning soldiers, sailors and marines to readjust themselves to the social

and religious life of the church. Confusion over the election of dele-gates to the general Episcopal convention, which caused three separate bal-lots to be prepared before the eigh delegates were finally chosen, resulted in the appointment of a special com-mittee to report next year on changing the canons of the church regarding the manner of conducting convention elec-tions. The committees appointed by Bishop Sumner is composed of Dr. O. W Taylor, Dr. H. C. Fixott and F. H. V Andrews, all of Portland The present canon provides that clergy and laity must vote for convention delegates on separate ballots and that the two ballots must elect the same men.

CONSTANTINOPLE, — (By Mail.) — American, British, French and Greek physicians are striving with might and main to prevent an outbreak of the plague in the region extending along the north shore of the Aegean sea from Saloniki to Constantinople. In this work the British, French and Greek armies and the American Red Cross are co-operating. "America and England as well as the

far off corners of the earth cannot af-ford in these days to ignore outbreaks of disease no matter where they occur." declared a British sanitary officer in charge of the work of cleaning up Con-stantinople. "If the plague is allowed to breed here in the Near East sooner or later it will reach England and America. And its ravages if allowed to spread will exceed those of the so-called influence." of disease no matter where they occur

Eastern Macedonia which has been a battleground for centuries and which since 1912 has been fought over again since 1912 has been fought over again and again is today a horrible mess. The early summer sun is breeding flies and mosquitoes by the millions, the unhealthy Struma valley is steaming with malarial vapors, the streets of Drama, Serres, Kavalla, Nanthi and the hundreds of other small villages are fibbs beyond belief

hundreds of other small villages are filthy beyond belief. The returned refugees live in shell-shattered ruins under sanitary condi-tions unspeakable. Their rags are alive with vermin. From the big Red Cross warehouse at Kavalla housing 300 families of refugees from 5 to 12 dead from typhus were removed daily last month. The refugees were easy victims after many months of semi-starvation in Bulgaria. starvation in Bulgaria.

The children of Eastern Macedonia are pitiful sights, suffering the results of semi-starvation, with their little ribs showing plainly through their tast flesh. With hollow lack-lustre e. a they lie about on the streets in the sun indifferent to their fate indifferent to their fate.

Each day tens of thousands of loaves of bread are distributed by the Red Cross in dozens of Serbian, Macedonian and Roumanian cities. Bales of cloth-ing are given out to the needlest. Serums against disease are injected in thousands of peasants and "declousing" baths are given to those living in crowded centers.
