

VETERANS OF 2 WARS TO MARCH TOGETHER

Grand Army and Overseas Men to Appear in Great Parade.

MANY EXERCISES ARE SET

Throngs at Cemeteries and in the Churches Tomorrow Will Pay Tribute to Heroic Dead.

Veterans of the civil war will march in the same column with those who have just returned from carrying the flag to victory overseas, when the memorial day parade sets forth tomorrow, and when the numerous places of the Grand Army visit the resting places of comrades who have pitched their last camp.

First in public interest will be the afternoon parade forming at the courthouse and moving through the downtown district at 2:30 o'clock. In test money to his overseas service, where he led the 162d infantry, the Third Oregon, General John L. May will act as marshal of the day.

Keen competition already is being shown between army, navy and marine corps, as to which branch of the service will be represented by the most in line parade. The marines, with a local organization of Devil Dogs, plan to turn out in force and are boasting that they will outnumber either navy or army, though the boasts are greatly discounted by service men of the other branches.

Col. Hammond Picks Aides. Colonel Creed C. Hammond, U. S. A., who will have immediate command of the veterans of the world war in the parade, chose as his aides yesterday Major Halvor Rasch, representative of the army; Commander L. M. Cox, representative of the navy, and Lieutenant C. L. Mullen, representative of the marine corps.

Whether still in the service or not, all military men of the late war have been requested to turn out for the parade by the Grand Army of the Republic, while will soon pass on all observance of Memorial day to the veterans of the world conflict. The American Legion of Oregon has issued a call to members to participate in the parade, in appreciation of the reception Portland and Oregon have tendered the men coming back from the front and of the splendid war record of the state. The veterans will gather in uniform at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon on the north side of Salmon street, between Fourth and Fifth streets. The army, navy and marines at Fifth and the navy men at Sixth.

Distinction Is Discarded. As many Portland naval men saw service on the South Dakota, there is expected to be a large contingent in the parade who knew that vessel as their home during the war.

No distinction of grade or rank will be made in the parade, it is announced. The service men, enlisted or commissioned, are requested to fall in line as they arrive at the mobilization point, regardless of rank. It will be natural that men will group together as acquaintances, but attempt will be made to segregate officers from enlisted men.

The line of march will be west on Main street to Broadway, north on Broadway to Morrison street, east on Morrison street to Sixth street, north on Sixth street to Third street, east on Third street to Third street, south on Third street to the auditorium. The order of the parade and its formation is as follows:

- At 2 P. M.—Comrades will assemble at the courthouse and prepare for parade. The details of the parade formation will be under the direction of the marshal of the day, General John L. May, and aides, preceded by a platoon of police.
- Police platoon, Chief Johnson, on Main street, south side of courthouse.
- Band.
- National guard, Colonel North, Fourth street, south side, right resting on Main.
- Sons of Veterans, Commander E. D. Timms, east side Fourth street, right resting on Main.
- Veterans of world war, Commander E. J. Rivers, Salmon street, right resting on Fourth street.
- Spanish war veterans, Edward Rommel, west side Fourth street, right resting on Main.
- Salvors and marines of world war, Commander Salmon River, north side, right resting on Fourth street.
- Veterans of world war, Commander E. J. Rivers, Salmon street, right resting on Fourth street.
- Boy Scouts, Colonel Brockway.
- Junior Honor guards.

The ladies of the Women's Relief corps, circles of the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, Ladies' Auxiliary of Scout Young camp who desire to march will form under charge of Surgeon J. W. Curran on east side of Fourth street, right resting on Salmon street, and will move in the parade.

The Indian war veterans and Grand Army veterans not marching will be in carriages and automobiles under the direction of J. M. Stadler and form in line on the north side of Salmon street east of Fourth street and move out in rear of marching column.

Veterans to Decorate Graves. At 5:30 tomorrow morning details from the various posts will visit all cemeteries, accompanied by school children, and decorate the graves of soldiers and sailors, holding brief programmes in several instances. Special services, with speakers, will be held at Lone Fir cemetery at 10:30 o'clock; at Montavilla, I. O. O. F. hall, at 9:30, followed by march to the cemetery; at Lents, memorial services in I. O. O. F. hall, at 10:30; at Sellwood, Wall's hall, both morning and afternoon, with programme at 2 o'clock, and at St. Johns, before the memorial monument near Jersey street, a programme at 10:30 o'clock. Dinner will be served to the various posts by the Women's Relief corps at noon.

Following are notable features of the general programme:
At 10:30 A. M.—The memorial service for sailors and marines will be held by the Grand Army of the Republic and the Ladies of the Relief corps. Sons of Veterans and the G. A. R., under the direction of Commander T. R. McDevitt and E. J. Hoadley, chaplain. A procession will march from the courthouse at 10:30 A. M. and move to the Stark street dock and the services will be held on the ferryboat kindly donated by the county commissioners.

William B. Cronin of All Saints' church. Rev. Arthur G. de Lorimer of the Cathedral will act as master of ceremonies. A special sermon will be preached by Rev. Guy Quinn of the Church of St. Philip Neri. The choir of the Cathedral will sing Turner's "Mass in H. nor of St. Cecilia" under the direction of Frederick W. Goodrich. Special cars will be run on the King's Heights line, leaving the end of Washington street at frequent intervals.

LUMBERMEN IN SESSION
Operators Discuss Competition in Middle West.

TACOMA, Wash., May 28.—(Special.)—Unorganized lumbermen and mill operators of Washington met in executive session here today and discussed adjustment of discounts to middle-western states so that Washington fir might compete with southern pine. Southern pine mills operate on the ten-hour day basis. The log market, wages and co-operation with the loyal legion of loggers and lumbermen were discussed at length. Major Everett G. Griggs of Tacoma presided.

Although the lumbermen were silent after they left the meeting, it is said that no general increase in prices or

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material change outside of the eastern discounts were agreed upon. The middle states market, according to the lumbermen, has caused much annoyance, as the southern pine manufacturers have almost a monopoly there under existing conditions.

THEFT OF \$630 CHARGED

Vancouver Machinist Accused of Robbing Chinese.

Portland police are looking for George D. Packard, a machinist of

Vancouver, who is alleged to have stolen \$430 in gold and a \$200 check from John Sney, a Chinese. According to the story told by Paul Sans, Packard's southern pine manufacturers committed a lonely place on the road between Vancouver and Portland as Sney was being brought to this city by automobile.

In Sney's baggage was a box that had been made for him by the Vancouver men, this being equipped with wells under the cleats for the secretion of gold which Sney contemplated taking to China with him. Packard, it is claimed, drove Sney from the machine, removed the cleats and appropriated

the money.

Sans claims to have driven to police headquarters as soon as he found the Chinaman's baggage had been tampered with. He is being held as a witness.

Privilege for Farmers Provided.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Collective bargaining by farmers' organizations will be permitted under an amendment to the Clayton act, introduced today by Senator Capper of Kansas. It was referred to the judiciary committee. Senator Capper said the amendment was endorsed by various state granges.

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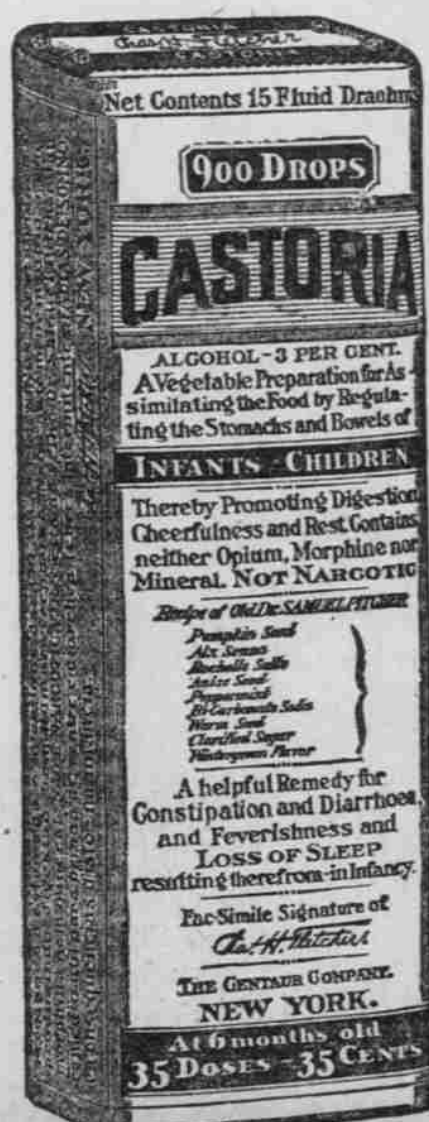
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
