

MEDIA TON DOWNING WINNIPEG STRIKE

Change for Better Comes as
Troubles Reach Crisis.

RAILWAY MEN HEAD MOVE

Unruly Mob Fills Streets, Jeering at
Workers, But Is Dispersed by
Promise of Relief.

WINNIPEG, Man., May 30.—Arbitration of the differences between the metal trades council of Winnipeg and the leading industrial employers was officially begun this afternoon at an hour when tension caused by the general strike deadlock, which began May 25, seemed to be approaching the breaking point.

For the first time since the general walkout crowds of idle men paraded through the business district, jeering persons who were doing work usually performed by union men. Some of these marchers joined a delegation of returned soldiers who paraded to the parliament building and insisted the government "do something at once."

The men were told the government was considering the advisability of legislation to enforce the principle of collective bargaining and that the offer of mediation by executives of the railway brotherhoods had been accepted by the leading forces concerned. The demonstration dispersed after these announcements were made, but the marchers told Premier T. C. Norris that they would march to parliament again at 11 A. M. tomorrow.

Drastic Plans Held Up.
Success of the railway brotherhoods in initiating the first movement toward mutual arbitration made since the strike began caused city officials to make changes in the programme arranged for today. Nothing was done regarding recognition of street service.

The matter of immediate dismissal of policemen who refused to sign the anti-sympathetic strike pledge was left for decision at a special council meeting this evening. The citizens' committee also delayed its garbage collection campaign, and the railway brotherhood executives issued the following statement regarding the mediation activities:

"The committee which is attempting to mediate in the present difficulty includes representatives of the six train service organizations, viz: Brotherhood of locomotive engineers, brotherhood of locomotive firemen and engineers, order of railway conductors, brotherhood of railway trainmen, brotherhood of maintenance of way employees and order of railroad telegraphers.

Mediation Plan Accepted.
"We have offered our services as mediators between the employers and the employees in the metal trades, and our offer has been accepted by both sides to the controversy. We are at present doing everything possible to bring about a speedy and amicable settlement."

Official letters from brotherhood executives to local trainmen in Winnipeg and other cities were made public earlier in the day. The executives told the men they had no authority to vote on the question of a sympathetic strike without permission of the brotherhoods, and that the brotherhoods were opposed to any breach of contract with their employers. The statement contained the declaration that some of the Winnipeg trainmen had been intimidated by strikers.

City Employees Drift Back.
About 100 regular firemen have returned to work, it was announced at the office of the city fire commissioner. Announcement was made at Mayor Charles E. Gray's office that the city's 1000 employees who went on strike have been reinstated, and that a few others have applied for their former positions.

The terrible heat spell which has lasted all week was broken today and a storm was threatening the city tonight. For five consecutive days temperature ranged from 90 to 95 degrees.

TORONTO GENERAL STRIKE ON

Ballots to Be Cast in Many Canadian
Cities on Sympathy Strike.

TORONTO, Ont., May 30.—Orders for the sympathetic strike to be begun this morning to aid the striking railway workers who are demanding a 44-hour week, higher wages and improved shop conditions, were obeyed by a large number of unionists in Toronto, although the actual extent of the walkout was not known up to a late hour tonight.

The city employees have not yet quit, nor have the federal government's employees on the railroads, or street railway men.

The city is absolutely under control tonight. The mayor has sent out an appeal to the citizens, asking for maintenance of the peace. A committee of 10,000 persons is being organized, it was stated this evening, to help local authorities in the event of need.

EDMONTON, Alta., May 30.—The strike situation here is clearing rapidly. The Free Press, the official organ of the Trades Council, has advised the men to return to work, stating that the object of the strike was gained when it placed labor's attitude before the government.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 30.—Several Vancouver unions today were reported responding to a request made by the Vancouver Trades and Labor council last night that a vote be taken on the question of calling a general strike here, June 3, in sympathy with the Winnipeg strikers. Returns will be counted Sunday night.

VICTORIA, B. C., May 30.—E. S. Woodward, president of the Victoria Trades and Labor council, which has called for a vote on a general strike, declared today he thought all well-organized labor unions here would vote to strike.

British Police May Strike.
LONDON, May 30.—England is threatened with a country-wide police strike. The metropolitan police of London are balloting on the question. The Liverpool men already have voted in favor of stopping work next Monday night. The police in some provincial cities also threaten to strike over wages.

cil Crest Park.

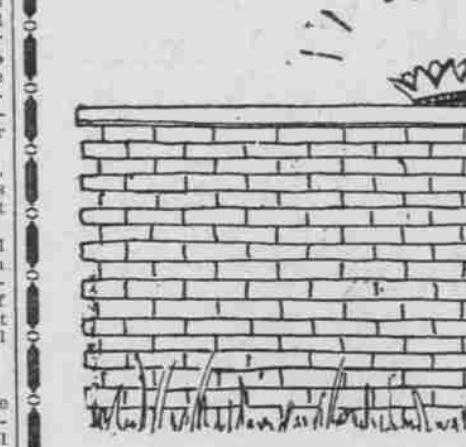
The annual picnic of the Columbus club was largely attended yesterday by members and their friends, who gathered in Council Crest park during the afternoon and evening.

BURLESON POLICY IS UPHELD BY CARLTON

Head of Western Union Be-
rates ex-Postal Chief.

SECRET WARFARE CHARGED

Rival Is Accused of Attempting to
Make Government Operation of
Wire Systems Failure.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Charges by Newcomb Carlton, president of the Western Union Telegraph company, that Edward Reynolds, formerly general manager of the Postal Telegraph-Cable company, had attempted to make government operation of the telegraph system a failure, and an alternate defense of an attack upon Postmaster-General Burleson were features of today's hearings before the senate commerce committee on legislation for return of the telephone and telegraph properties.

Mr. Carlton told the committee that Mr. Reynolds, at the request of Mr. Burleson, worked out a plan for coordination of the wires, but at the same time sent letters to the officials of the Postal company "asking them to make government operation a failure."

Mr. Reynolds subsequently was relieved of his duties as general manager by the postmaster-general.

Burleson Policy Defended.
Operation of the wire systems under direction of Mr. Burleson was defended by Mr. Carlton, who declared the postmaster-general had no more to do with the deterioration of the telephone and telegraph service than did members of the senate committee. A spokesman, he said, could not have prevented deterioration; it was a result of "natural conditions."

A directly opposite view was expressed by Mr. Reynolds, who took the stand on his own request. Mr. Reynolds declared some of the declarations of Mr. Carlton regarding relations between the Postal company and Mr. Burleson were "wholly untrue."

Mr. Reynolds will conclude his statements Monday. Just before the committee adjourned today he informed the senators that he might have something more to say about Mr. Burleson when he appears before the house commerce committee, where, he said, the dignity that exists on the senate side does not prevail.

Joint Service Suggested.
In beginning his testimony today Mr. Carlton urged amendment of the Sherman anti-trust law so as to permit the wire companies to operate a joint service immediately after their return to private ownership. Chairman Cummins expressed "great sympathy" with the suggestion, but said he did not see how the Sherman law would stand in the way.

Mr. Carlton also made a plea for retention of the 20 per cent increase in rates granted under federal control, saying if any reduction were made it might have to be taken from employees.
