

POLICE CHECK STRIKE PARADE AT WINNIPEG

2000 Sympathizers Violent in Attempt to Enter Structure.

PREMIER STANDS FIRMLY

Settlement Offer by Iron Works Sent by Railroad Brotherhood to Metal Trades Council.

WINNIPEG, Man., June 2.—Violence by strike sympathizers in a parade of 2000 men today marked the eighteenth day of the general strike here.

For the first time since the strike began Winnipeg policemen were called into action, and demonstrators who attempted to force their way into the board of trade building were checked by policemen, detectives and volunteers.

The paraders first marched to the provincial parliament building for the third time since Friday and demanded the resignation of Premier T. C. Norris and his cabinet on the grounds of "incompetency."

Premier Norris announced he had not receded from his previous stand, that he would do nothing regarding provincial legislation which the union men are demanding until the sympathetic strike is called off.

Settlement Offer Made.
Howard Lloyd, a business man, who stood on the curb wearing a Canadian flag on his coat, refused to remove the flag and several of the marchers attacked him. He proudly displayed the emblem still on his torn coat after the melee.

The most important strike development today from a conciliation standpoint was an announcement by the railroad brotherhood executives, attempting to mediate the controversy, that they had transmitted to the executives of the Winnipeg metal trades council an offer of settlement which had been received from the heads of the three leading iron works of Winnipeg.

Four Unions Oppose Strike.
Teamsters, chauffeurs, musicians and street railway union, it was reported, have voted against the strike. Commercial telegraphers did not vote.

CALGARY, Alta., June 2.—Calgary's war veterans, it became known today, do not approve of last week's postponement of the convention of the Great War Veterans of Canada, originally set for June 9, in Vancouver. The returned men here are planning to send their delegates to the British Columbia metropolis to open the convention at the appointed time with or without the attendance of delegates from elsewhere.

The convention was postponed by the association's central council, as it was thought the unexpected conditions in Canada would make it impossible for many delegates to attend. The Calgary veterans believe the convention is necessary at this critical time to define the association's policy.

MRS. MARY E. KNOTT DIES
Widow of Captain, After Whom Knott Street Named, Passes Away.

Mrs. Mary E. Knott, 85, widow of Captain A. J. Knott, after whom Knott street was named, died Sunday at her residence, 456 East Eleventh street. She had lived in Portland since 1853.

Mrs. Knott was born in Manchester, Ind., February 19, 1835. She came to Oregon with her parents in 1852, crossing the plains with an ox team. The next year she married Captain Knott and came to Portland to live. Her family had settled in the Umpqua valley.

Captain Knott owned and operated one of the ferries across the Willamette in early days. He also owned valuable property in Portland and left his widow a considerable fortune.

Mrs. Knott is survived by seven children: Mrs. L. C. McCormick, Mrs. J. W. Phalen, Mrs. Sadie McCuen, Mrs. P. M. Stephens and Walter, Harry and Gordon Knott, besides five grandchildren. Three sisters and two brothers also survive her. They are: Mrs. Hinger Hermann of Rosburg, Or.; Mrs. Lois Avery of San Francisco and Mrs. Ella McInnon of Forest Grove, Or., and C. A. and J. E. Tibbatts.

Funeral services will be held at 2 P. M. today in the chapel of the East Side Funeral Directors. Interment will be in Lone Fir cemetery.

may be reasonable for absence of antagonism, and this is the assurance that fully \$4,000,000 of the bond issue is dependent on the federal government co-operating with a like sum, and the pledges of the state board of control members that the remaining \$3,000,000 will not be expended unless there is a necessity for its use.

In 18 counties there are 1800 bond elections today, the aggregate of these county issues exceeding \$5,000,000. Most of this money is intended for matching purposes with state and federal money for road construction. Indications point to the approval of these bonds in each of the 18 counties.

Development of Oregon is the idea back of the bond measures on the state ballot. The same holds true of several measures on the city ballots, and the Port of Portland \$1,000,000 bond bill is designed to develop navigation. Party politics is playing no part in this special election and there are no candidates—nothing but measures.

Improvement Work Aim.
Broadly speaking, the state ballot aims, through its measures, to reclaim arid, swamp and logged-off lands; develop irrigation and drainage districts; build roads which will open undeveloped country; construct market roads for the farmers; erect such state institutional buildings as the times require.

On the city ballot the forward movement calls for improvement of present playgrounds, establishment of comfort stations; purchase of more land for playgrounds; more police protection and fire protection; additional revenue to meet the increased cost of materials and labor, and aid for the police pension system.

There are other measures on these two ballots, but in the main they give a comprehensive idea of the scope of projects contemplated by the state and municipal authorities, if the measures carry.

Speakers "Bunch" Plans.
There has been a close working agreement among the committees in charge of the main measures. The reconstruction measures, Roosevelt highway and the payment of irrigation and drainage bond interest have been linked from the beginning, and whenever a speaker has appeared he has advocated each of these matters. Eastern Oregon, wanting irrigation, has talked for the Roosevelt highway, because eastern Oregon wanted the votes of the coast counties. Along the coast the counties want the highway and they have overlooked no opportunity to advocate the irrigation measure wanted by eastern Oregon. Farmers on the other hand, are interested in the reclamation measures, and they want the market road tax to carry.

With all these elements interested, a large vote might be expected, but none of those who have been managing the campaign look for a 50 per cent vote.

O. C. Letter, director of the reconstruction committee, said last night that he believed the voters would vote for the highway and the market road tax.

Highway Plan Favored.
S. C. Pier, president of the Roosevelt highway association, received telegrams yesterday from the coast, the Willamette valley and eastern Oregon, and in every instance the sentiment was that the highway measure will pass, as will the reconstruction programme as a whole.

Mr. Letter and Mr. Pier are of one mind in declaring that this election means millions of dollars in the development of Oregon and is the greatest opportunity the people of the state have ever had to help themselves.

The following telegram has been received from Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, Washington, D. C.: "I sincerely trust that Oregon electors will approve legislation for soldier settlements, and I am hopeful that the federal government will share favorably upon the soldier settlement bills which I expect will be reported out of committees shortly."

Many of our states have already passed measures including some substantial appropriations. Favorable action by Oregon would be further proof that the country should be as well as the lines of giving this opportunity to those who have offered their lives in our defense.

McArthur Telegrams Approval.
Representative C. N. McArthur telegraphed the following approval last night: "Highly important to the state of Oregon that voters approve the reconstruction bonding amendment at Tuesday's election. Otherwise Oregon will lose opportunity to share the share of the federal appropriation authorized in the land settlement bill now pending before congress, and which will surely pass this session. The proposed cooperative plan of developing the state and providing homes for soldiers and sailors means prosperity to Oregon and justice to those who made victory possible in the recent war."

Senators George E. Chamberlain and C. L. McNary and Representative W. C. Hawley and N. J. Sinnott have also telegraphed their endorsements of the general reconstruction programme and Roosevelt highway measure.

Governor Olcott has said, speaking as a member of the board of control, that the money under the reconstruction measure will be spent only as emergencies arise and the labor situation warrants. Mr. Letter telegraphed State Treasurer Hoff, the other member of the board of control, for his views, and Mr. Hoff wired yesterday as follows:

"I consider the matter in the light of an emergency and believe money should be spent in the spirit that prompted the action by the legislature, using it only in case of need and guarding against waste."

WOMEN PLAN BIG BOYCOTT

RISE IN PRICES TARGET OF SEATTLE HOUSEKEEPERS.

Mrs. Elinor Redington Seeks Protection in Steadily Advancing Cost of Living.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 2.—(Special).—To organize for a boycott on eggs and butter to force prices down, Elinor M. Redington, 1318 Fifteenth avenue, South, president of the Homekeepers' association, today announced the proposed combine two years ago, issued a call Monday for a meeting of the club leaders next week.

Monday's quotations showed eggs selling at 60 cents a dozen and commanding 53 cents on Western avenue. The commission men were intimating that further advances in price. The commission merchants shot the price up 2 cents a dozen Friday.

Mrs. Redington will outline the campaign for the boycott to the women who helped in the Homekeepers' drive two years ago, and plans for the boycott will be announced in a few days. "We will try to make it a general boycott this time, to include as many homes as possible, and shut down completely on eggs and butter," Mrs. Redington asserted.

"I have investigated by talking to the egg producers and merchants. Everywhere they tell me there is lots of money in eggs. I remember when the Western avenue profiteers organized to force the price of eggs up to \$1 a dozen. They have been gradually scheming to put the price up this year and it is time to act."

"Many of our states have already selling at 60 cents a dozen and commanding 53 cents on Western avenue. The commission men were intimating that further advances in price. The commission merchants shot the price up 2 cents a dozen Friday."

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"The boycott will be extended throughout the state, if necessary, for the prices are too high and they must come down."

"There is too much profiteering. Boycott them, that's the way."

"For the last two weeks we have been too busy with our Red Cross work, but now the women have time to get after the high prices."

PRIVATE CONTROL IS URGED

OREGON COMMISSION ASKS AID OF SENATOR McNARY.

Telegram Sent to Capital Says People of State Are Entitled to Voice in Local Affairs.

SALEM, Or., June 2.—(Special).—An urgent request that the telegraph and telephone lines be restored immediately to private ownership is contained in a telegram forwarded today to United States Senator McNary by the public service commission.

"After due consideration and with full knowledge of conditions as affecting these utilities we unhesitatingly urge the prompt return of the wires to private owners without attempting hastily constructed remedial measures, which in our present opinion can only result in further involving an already needlessly complicated situation and prove detrimental to the general welfare."

Contract Let for Razing Building Used as Capitol Annex.

BOISE, Idaho, June 2.—(Special).—O. W. Allen has received the contract for razing the old central school building used as a capitol annex. For tearing down and removing from the premises the old building in a period of 16 days the contractor will receive \$2000 and for razing the old capitol in 21 days \$4000. The contract was approved this afternoon by Roy L. Black, attorney-general, and work will start Tuesday morning.

Mr. Allen assembled his material and engaged the necessary men this afternoon. One wing for the capitol building costing \$450,000 will be erected on the site.
