Report of Sergeant Thatcher, of War Emergency Squad, Shows Great Amount of Work Done.

Nearly \$500,000 worth of liquor has een confiscated and destroyed by the tenant Thatcher has completed for Chief of Police Johnson. The squad has seized 29,684 quarts of liquor and offenders whom they have haled into the municipal court paid the city \$58,649 in fines between February 1, 1915, and April 20, 1919.

Taking the value of the liquor at the current "bootleg" price of \$15 a quart, the quantity destroyed would be worth \$445,260, and the seizures since April 30 would materially increase that sum. Lieutenant Thatcher says the liquor included in his report was mainly whisky, as the government took most of the wine which had been made in violation.

Thatcher's report for May, 1918, shows that his squad during that month arrested 293 offenders and seized 1227 quarts of liquor. The prisoners paid fines of \$3185 to the city, and \$500 to the federal government. The jail sentences meted out to the prisoners during May aggregated 1291 days.
