

CHICAGO TRIBUNE'S POLICIES ATTACKED

Ford Counsel Says Paper Was
Influenced by Big Firms.

PRO-GERMAN CHARGE MADE

Depositions From Standard Oil and
Harvester Officials Are Read
Into Trial Record.

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., June 5.—Depositions from officials of the Standard Oil company and the International Harvester company were introduced today in the libel suit of Henry Ford against the Chicago Tribune. Editorials which the plaintiff contends show pro-Germanism on the part of the Tribune also were read by Attorney William Lucking.

The depositions were from Frederick David Anche, who was a director of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey at the time of publication of the alleged libelous editorial headed, "Ford Is An Anarchist," and who since 1917 has been vice-president of the company; Milton M. Eames, assistant secretary of the company; Arthur F. Corwin, who was vice-president of the Penn-Mex Fuel company in 1915; President Harold F. McCormick of the International Harvester company, who was vice-president of that corporation in 1916; George A. Ranney, secretary and treasurer of the company; and Mrs. Elinor Medill Patterson, part owner of the Tribune.

Tribune's Policy Attacked.
The depositions of the officials of the two big corporations were deemed pertinent to suit by the plaintiff in connection with the charge that the Tribune wanted war with Mexico because it would benefit the Harvester company in obtaining sisal from Yucatan and the Standard Oil company in the matter of Mexican oil. The plaintiff charged that a distant relationship between Harold F. McCormick and Colonel R. R. McCormick, one of the defendants, influenced in the Tribune's policy.

Harold F. McCormick deposed that Colonel R. R. McCormick was distantly related to him, but denied any influence or connection in Tribune affairs, or that he was consulted in any way as to Tribune policy.

Writer Says Chicago Dirty.
Mr. Ranney deposed that Colonel McCormick was a small stockholder in the Harvester company in 1916, and the latter's father, former Ambassador Robert S. McCormick, recently deceased, was the owner of 24 shares.

Reading of the deposition of Edward Goldbeck, who was a special writer for the Tribune in 1916, was concluded. Mr. Goldbeck, who resided in Evanston, Ill., was asked why he so seldom visited the Tribune office in Chicago.

"I dislike very much to say so, but Chicago is the dirtiest city in the world, and I visit it as seldom as possible," he answered.

Witnesses who came here four weeks ago from Texas and New Mexico to testify for the Chicago Daily Tribune and who have been growing restive, were cheered today by information that in all probability their testimony would be called for tomorrow.

Counsel for Ford said the plaintiffs case would probably be concluded tomorrow morning.

CHEMAWA GRADUATES 19

DIPLOMAS PRESENTED BY GOV.

Charles V. Galloway Delivers Address—Social Gathering Today
Will End Festivities.

CHEMAWA, Or., June 5.—(Special.)—With ideal weather for dress parade, military maneuvers, sports and band concerts, the annual commencement exercises of Chemawa Indian school have attracted many visitors this week.

The baccalaureate sermon was delivered Sunday evening by the Rev. Thomas Anderson of the First Presbyterian church of Salem, and Monday witnessed a baseball game between the school and Oregon Agricultural college freshmen, the honors going to the visitors.

Monday evening an oratorical contest was won by Miss Eleanor Houk of the Blackfoot tribe of Montana. Second place was won by Mary Belle Healy, Washington; third, Katherine Wilder, Klamath; and fourth, Julia Gromoff, Alaska.

Tuesday featured the Girls' Mandolin and Guitars club, while Wednesday was given up to an inspection of the academic and industrial departments, with a physical culture exhibition in the gymnasium, band concert and literary entertainment in the evening.

Diplomas today were presented to 19 graduates by Governor Olcott. The graduating address was delivered by Charles V. Galloway, state tax commissioner. In the evening a program entitled "Windmills of Holland" was given by the pupils.

The exercises end tomorrow evening with a social gathering of pupils and faculty, but 100 Indians from the school will take part in the week-end pageant to be staged at Willamette university in Salem, depicting the historical beginning and progress of the school and country in the past 50 years.

DEFICIT HELD INEVITABLE

McADOO TELLS OF EXTRAORDINARY
WHEAT SHIPMENTS.

Record Movement of 1918, Though
Costly, Held to Have Been Factor
in Winning War.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., June 5.—The \$200,000,000 deficit resulting from government control of railroads last year was due to measures that had to be taken up to keep Europe from starvation and to win the war, William G. McAdoo, former director-general of railroads, asserted in a letter to Thomas M. Storke, publisher of the Daily News here.

Mr. McAdoo relates in the letter hitherto unpublished facts as to the situation in February, 1918, when American shipments of cereals abroad were 300,000 tons short for the previous two months. As a result of this shortage, the rationing of the Italian army had twice been reduced and those of the French army once. The civil populations of England, France and Italy were on the verge of starvation, and the premier of the three countries, at a meeting in Versailles, combined in an appeal to President Wilson to rush wheat because the morale of the allied peoples was falling.

On February 8, 1918, as a result of this appeal, the railroads were granted to food shipments to Atlantic ports.

Mr. McAdoo immediately ordered all empty box cars for carrying grain rushed to western states and directed station agents to co-operate with the farmers and elevator men in the prompt loading and dispatch of the filled cars to the Atlantic seaboard.

At the expiration of five weeks from the appeal, McAdoo declared he was able to notify the allied representatives that there was more grain at Atlantic ports than their steamships could handle.

He declares that had it not been for war emergencies of this character, the \$200,000,000 deficit of 1918 could have been turned into a profit. He adds that the government was spending \$60,000,000 per day for the winning of the war, so that the deficit in reality meant but three and a half days' extra expenditures and was responsible for winning the war.

WICKS AND WOMAN FREED

Part of Spokane Ordinance Affecting
Immorality Held Invalid.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 5.—(Special.)—In a sweeping decision rendering void an important part of the city ordinance aimed against immorality, Superior Judge William A. Hunscke today sustained a demurrer which freed Harry M. Wicks, professor of bolshavism and agitator of Portland, and his secretary, Mrs. Erna Lee Lamb, also of Portland, of a charge of immorality.

That part of the ordinance affecting immorality was held invalid on the ground of uncertainty. City Prosecutor Hooper gave immediate notice of appeal to the supreme court.

RUTH GARRISON COLLAPSES

GIRL SLAYER AT OKANOGAN TO
TESTIFY FOR STORRS.

Trial on Charges of Felony of Man,
Whose Wife Was Poisoned, Is
Delayed Until Today.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 5.—(Special.)—Ruth Garrison collapsed at Okanogan last night. The girl slayer of Mrs. Douglas Storrs broke down when she reached the town where the dead woman's husband is to stand trial on felony charges. Douglas Storrs was arrested as a result of his relations with Ruth Garrison at Okanogan and it was for love of Storrs that Ruth Garrison killed Mrs. Storrs.

Ruth Garrison was found by the jury to be mentally irresponsible when she was acquitted of the murder of Mrs. Storrs and was committed to the insane ward at the state penitentiary at Walla Walla. She was taken by train and automobile yesterday to Okanogan where she will testify in the trial of Storrs.

The Storrs case was called for today, but was delayed until tomorrow owing to the fact that the case of Frank Musselman, on trial for the second time for the murder of Opal Harmonson, an 18-year-old girl visiting her sister, Mrs. N. A. Doyle, near Oroville, will not be finished until late today. It is possible that a start may be made late today to obtain a jury.

In the Storrs case the state has subpoenaed Captain Tennant of the Seattle police department; Thomas Askren, counsel for Ruth Garrison at her trial; and other principals of the Garrison trial. The defense has obtained the presence of Ruth Garrison to testify in Storrs' behalf.

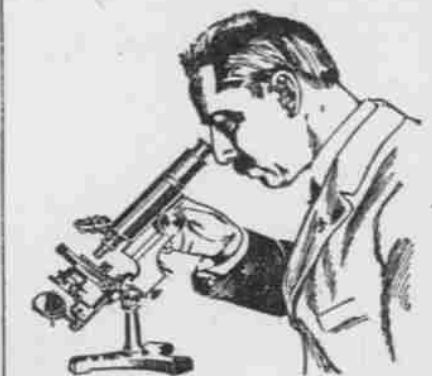
Military Training Plan Rejected.

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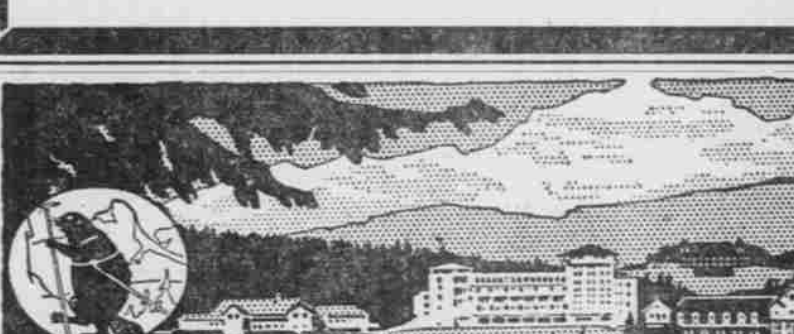
