

TWO AMERICAS JOIN HANDS FOR PROGRESS

Pan-American Conference Declared to Mean Much.

FAST AIR-MAILS FORESEEN

Commercial Relations Between Latin Republics and United States to Be Aided.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Inauguration of a new epoch in Pan-American commercial relations will date from the second Pan-American commercial conference, Director-General John H. Barrett, of the Pan-American union and presiding officer of the conference, declared in summing up the achievements of the meeting at the concluding session today.

"It's one great outstanding characteristic," said Mr. Barrett, "has been the expression of the Pan-American or all-American, idea and viewpoint, in which the interests of Latin-America, just as much as those of the United States, have been frankly considered and discussed by the most eminent and skilled authorities of both North and South America."

The applause, which greeted the statement was considered as reflecting the sentiment of the more than 750 representatives of the United States and Latin-America who have attended the five-day meeting.

New Trade Foreseen.
"If the work and results of the conference are to be summarized in the form of conclusions," said Mr. Barrett, "the following should be included: 'The immediate establishment of abundant freight, mail and passenger steamship facilities between the principal ports of the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific coasts of the United States, on the one hand, and the corresponding ports of Latin-America on the other.'"

"The making of every effort by both governments and individuals to develop thorough reciprocity and mutual co-operation in trading methods, regulations, business ethics and general treatment of commercial relations."

"The meeting of the unavoidable and pressing financial needs of the Latin-American governments and legitimate private undertakings, and also the protection and enlargement of the United States-Latin-American trade, through the financial and banking interests of the United States providing the necessary money loans and credits."

Parcel Post to Expand.
"A well-defined programme for the protection of the patents, trademarks and copyrights of each country in all the other 20, through the new international bureau established in Havana and the opening of the South American office in Rio de Janeiro."

"The making of the parcel post beneficial alike to the export business interests of the United States and the rank and file of the Latin-American peoples through the removal of unnecessary restrictions and regulations."

"The improvement in the administration of consular offices, similarity of consular invoices and fees, the annulling of petty laws annoying to trade, and the revision and permanency of tariffs."

"The undertaking, without delay, all over Latin-America, of extensive railway and highway construction; the renewing of railways already in existence but suffering from the lack of supplies during the war, and the establishment of fast aviation mail service."

Extended Relations Due.
"Better credit facilities for Latin-American buyers, a closer study of the Latin-American trade and social conditions by the interests of the United States and the extensions of United States banking connections, for the benefit alike of the United States and Latin-America."

"The improvement and extension of news service, cable service and the employment of the press in the dissemination, publicity and other agencies of commercial intelligence."

"The study of the Spanish and Portuguese languages, Latin-American institutions, history and geography by the people of the United States and a corresponding study of the United States by the people of Latin-America and general vocational training for pan-American trade."

"A favorable attitude towards the holding of a second Pan-American financial conference in 1920 called by invitation of the secretary of the treasury of the United States extended to the ministers of finance of Latin-America."

DRY LAW ARGUMENT HEARD

Year for Dealers to Close Up Business Is Asked.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Arguments for repeal of wartime prohibition and for legislation for drastic enforcement of constitutional prohibition were heard today by the house judiciary committee. Representative, Democrat, Illinois, in favor of repeal of the war-time action, contended that dealers should have had at least a year in which to close up their business. He urged the committee to interview soldiers back from the front, investigate conditions in the larger cities and not to be informed by "professional prohibitionists."

Wayne B. Wheeler, counsel for the Anti-Saloon league, said it was the intent of the amendment to wipe out liquor traffic, "which has no inherent right to exist," and the only difficulty ahead would come when a state attempted to permit something which the constitution prohibited.

Marshfield Legion Organizes.

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 6.—(Special.)—An American legion post, with an initial membership of 30, was organized in Marshfield with Ben S. Fisher temporary president and Ronald McGeorge secretary. Permanent officers will be named at a later date. The legion meets for final organization. Members are entirely soldiers. By-laws and a constitution are in course of preparation and will be considered at the next meeting on June 8.

DAVILLA SLAIN IN MEXICO

FORMER GENERAL KILLED IN BATTLE IN OAXACA.

Oregon, Candidate for Presidency of Mexico, Counts on Support of Liberal Party.

MEXICO CITY, June 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—Jose Inez Davilla, former federal general, it was announced officially today, has been killed in battle in the state of Oaxaca after having been in revolt against the government for more than four years. Davilla at one time was governor of the state of Oaxaca.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., June 6.—Copies of the long manifesto issued by General Alvaro Obregon in announcing his candidacy for the presidency of Mexico were received here today.

General Obregon states that he has the united support of the strong liberal party and that he will inaugurate a broader policy with regard to foreign relations.

One clause of Obregon's platform says that he will uphold the inviolability of Mexico's sovereignty, but declares in favor of "a complete respect of the sovereignty and institutions of all other nations which are in any way represented within the borders of Mexico."

The Mexican general also asserts he will give "complete recognition of all the rights acquired by foreigners in Mexico in absolute conformity to Mexican laws."

The Mexican general election is to be held the first Sunday in September.

MEXICO CITY, June 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—President Carranza today sent a message to the Mexican senate asking congress to authorize the national executive to construct the railways connecting undeveloped regions of Mexico with those already developed.

In the introduction to his message the president says that the government hopes to form a centralized railway system by which both the northern and southern railways connecting undeveloped regions of Mexico with those already developed.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—President Wilson's visit to Belgium will be made the latter part of next week, the Belgian government was informed today in a dispatch from Brussels.

King Albert, the dispatch said, will meet the president at Ainderkerke, on the French border and will accompany him to Brussels, where Mr. Wilson will be the guest of the king at the royal palace. 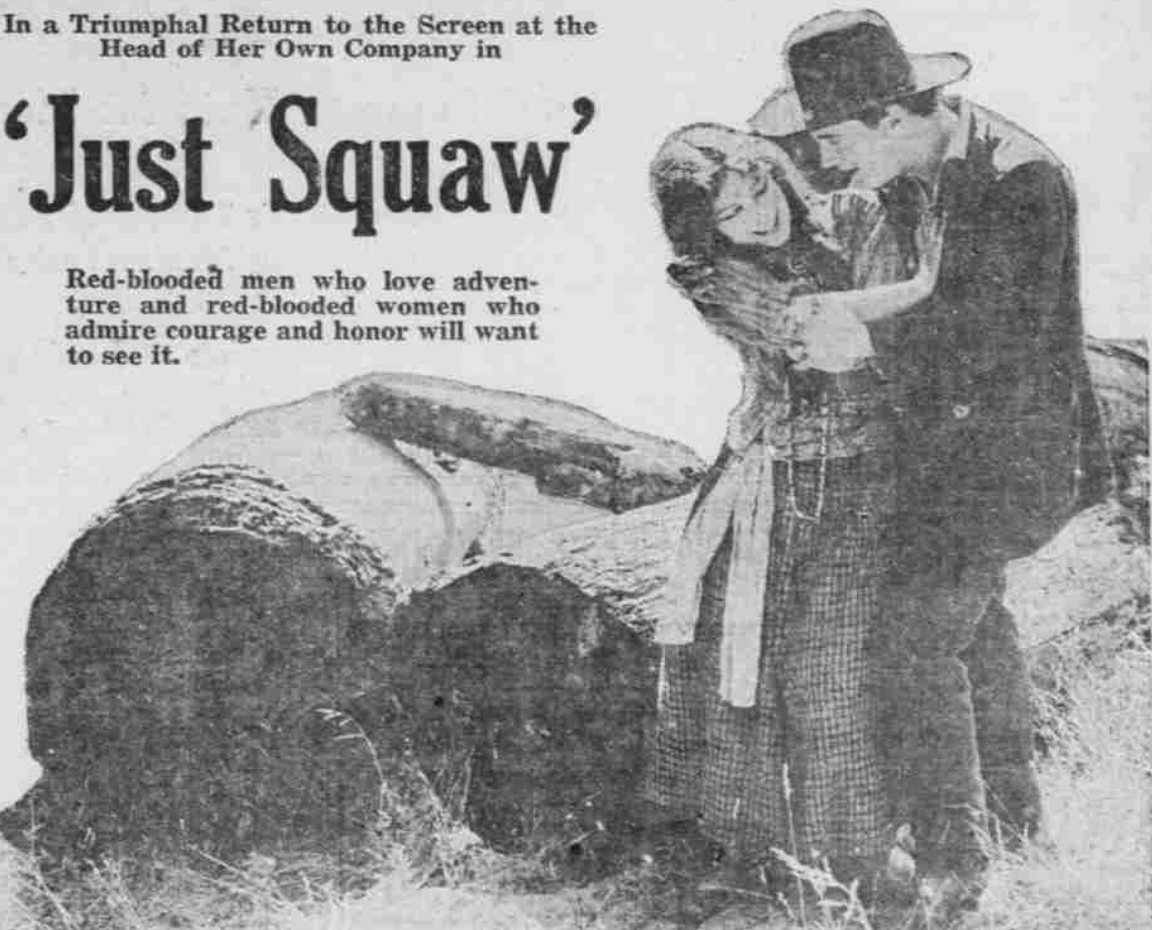
