VISITORS WELL CARED FOR

DEMAND ON HOTELS GREATER
THAN FOR MANY YEARS.

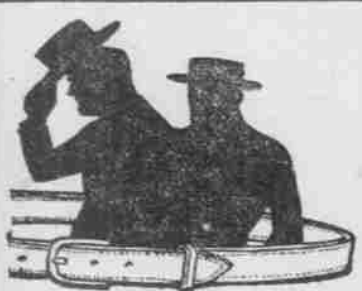
Bathrooms Are Converted Into Sleeping Quarters and Guests Are Made Comfortable.

On the whole, the crowds of out-of-town visitors in Portland during the past week have been well taken care of. The strain on the hotel accommodations was great, and every hotel in the city turned away hundreds of people daily. Hotel men say that it was the heaviest congestion they have known, far exceeding the G. A. R. convention.

Between the hotels and the information bureau at Liberty temple, where a list of rooms in private homes was maintained, visitors could find a place to sleep. There was no trouble whatever in finding the throngs. With the usual festival crowd increased by the conventions of bankers, Ad men, optometrists, Masonic grand lodge and Order of Eastern Star, people were attracted from all parts of Oregon and throughout the Northwest and Pacific coast generally, and from as far away as the Hawaiian Islands.

No place where a bed could be installed or a cot set up was overlooked by the hotel managers. The bathrooms were converted and the Turkish bath establishments were conducted as annexes at two hotels. Sample rooms, long the domain of commercial travelers, were equipped as dormitories, while the traveling men themselves were warned to keep away from Portland during the period of the festival.

At one hotel yesterday every line on two pages of the register was signed and out of the forty or more applicants, seven were accommodated with rooms. The clerks began to get anxious about 5 o'clock each evening during the week, for until patrons began checking out they did not know where they would put the people who had been waiting all day for a room. TITLE MEN PICK OFFICERS

CHESTER A. FULLER OF PORTLAND ELECTED PRESIDENT.

Need of Supporting Law to Facilitate Payment and Clear Tax Lien on Real Estate Topic.

The Oregon Association of Title Men, in the closing session of the annual meeting at the Chamber of Commerce Friday, discussed the recent amendments of the laws relative to the lien of personal property taxes as affecting real estate and the propriety of supporting a law to facilitate the payment and clear the lien of taxes on real estate.

Officers elected for the ensuing year are Chester A. Fuller, title & trust company, Portland, president; J. H. Gibson, Yamhill County Abstract company, McMinnville, first vice-president; James Johns, Hartman Abstract company, Pendleton, second vice-president; W. E. Hanson, Salem Abstract company, Salem, third vice-president; A. W. Havens, Clackamas Title company, Portland, re-elected secretary-treasurer.

The annual meetings of this organization are held in Portland during Rose Festival week. A delegate to the National Association of Title Men which will meet in September, probably at St. Louis, will be later selected by the executive committee.

From all sections of the state the assembled men reported a growing interest in Oregon real estate with every prospect of increasing activity and stabilizing of values.

BOOTLEGGER PAYS FINE

Roseburg Brakeman Assessed \$200 on Liquor Charge.

ROSEBURG, Or., June 13.—(Special.)—A. L. Copeland, a Southern Pacific brakeman, who has made this city his headquarters for some time, was arrested at an early hour this morning charged with smuggling in 20 quarts of whiskey.

The arrest was made before daylight and by 2 o'clock he had appeared in police court and was fined \$200. The liquor was placed in charge of two young women at a hotel, but the officers were watching and warrants were secured authorizing search of two rooms. Search of Copeland's room revealed nothing of importance, but a plain statement of the girls involved confronting him, Copeland confessed his guilt.

BOY ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

Lad Playing "Scout" Did Not Know Gun Was Loaded.

EVERETT, Wash., June 13.—Six-year-old John Uptegrah is in a local hospital with a bullet wound through the stomach and lung as the result of playing "Boy Scout" in which a .22-caliber rifle was used.

The boy who did the shooting did not know the gun was loaded. It is said Uptegrah is said to be in a critical condition.

AL KADER MAKES MERRY

PORTLAND NOBLES CELEBRATE CONVENTION VICTORY.

Coast Delegations Begin Homeward Journey—Plans for 1920 Meeting Under Way.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 13.—(Special.)—The Portland Al Kader Shrine celebrated most of the night over their success in landing the 1920 meeting of the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. Part of the coast delegation left at 2 o'clock this morning for Chicago and the remainder at noon today. Special coaches were to be placed on the regular train out of Chicago at 9:45 this evening, carrying the happy contingent direct to Portland.

Mayor Baker received a telegram from the Portland Chamber of Commerce congratulating Al Kader temple in winning out over New Orleans. "It was a wonderful victory," said Mayor Baker, "and we are not going to have any of the Shriners sorry about their selection when they come to our beautiful city next year. The session here was the greatest in the history of the organization and it will be our endeavor from now until the next Shrine meeting to make the 1920 Portland event greater still if possible."

New Orleans, though defeated, did the next best thing and invited the members of the Shrine to visit Portland via New Orleans. The Portland delegation was quick to respond to the honors given the city. All the bands here from the Pacific coast were massed and, augmented by the large band from Hanes temple, Toronto, Canada, paraded the downtown streets.

Harvey Wells, Portland, insurance commissioner for Oregon, who has been in Indianapolis for two weeks paying the way through the press and otherwise for the success of Portland, declared just before leaving that the Shriners would have the time of their lives next year.

MANY CONTINGENTS COMING

Several Soldier Parties Leave Atlantic for Pacific Coast.

Considerable troop movements are scheduled by the railroads for the next ten days. One party of 152 men left Camp Merritt last Tuesday, another of 42 men started from Garden City Wednesday and one of 34 men from Madison barracks, New York, Thursday. A party of 53 started from Garden City yesterday, and 128 men will enter at New York tomorrow. Next Tuesday 41 men will leave Newport News by one route, and 126 men in another group to travel by a different route. From Camp Devens, Ayers, Mass., 205 men will start on the same day. All these contingents are headed for Camp Lewis and will make brief stops in Portland.

FESTIVAL TAXES RAILWAYS

Steam and Electric Lines Are Crowded to Capacity.

Facilities of the railroads have been taxed to meet the demands of travel during the week. Absence of special rates for the numerous conventions and festival made it impossible to anticipate the actual requirements, as persons who came to Portland made no advance inquiries. Officials of the operating and traffic departments had distributed extra cars where it was thought they would be needed and seem to have been wise in their judgment. Although there was some crowding of cars and local trains were very heavy, the business was handled in a very satisfactory manner.

The Southern Pacific electric lines had a large volume of traffic to move on each of the past four days, with a considerable impetus setting in Sunday and increasing Monday, but the rush was taken care of with little delay or confusion. Oregon-Washington main line trains were increased with added coaches, and travel between Portland and Puget sound cities has been tremendous. All of the rolling stock on shop tracks and the coast yards was dusted and put into service to bring in the crowds and return them to their homes.

CHAMBER SEEKS BIG MEET

Portland May Make Fight for National Convention in 1920.

Recommendation that an effort be made to bring the 1920 session of the United States Chamber of Commerce to Portland was made by the delegates who attended the St. Louis meeting, in their report yesterday to the board of directors of the Portland chamber. In view of the next convention of the United Association of Plumbers and Steamfitters of the United States and Canada, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen spent the fifth day of their triennial convention here in executive session, considering legislative matters.

The subject matter was not made public, but delegates admitted the proposals before the convention are the most that body ever has been called upon to consider.

CON MEN SECURE \$15,000

Warner Roehl of San Francisco Victim of Chicagoans.

CHICAGO, June 13.—Warner Roehl, of San Francisco, who reported to the police today that he had been swindled out of \$15,000 in a copper deal, was the victim of confidence men who have piled their trade in St. Augustine, Fla., Chicago and other cities, milking wealthy men out of huge sums on fake horse races and stock market deals in the last two years, local detectives believe.

According to Mr. Roehl, one of the men represented himself as connected with J. P. Morgan & Co., of New York, and said because of his connection with that firm he was not permitted "to dabble" in the market. The swindler and an associate met Mr. Roehl in Chicago. The latter said the "deal" was to be executed at Madison, Wis. The pair accompanied him to San Francisco recently and Mr. Roehl said he obtained \$15,000, and the two men and the money disappeared from the train on the return trip. Mr. Roehl and his wife continued to Chicago and informed the police.
