

RADICALISM RAPPED IN SENATE'S REPORT

Special Committee Suggests
Legislation to Curb Ills.

FOREIGN-OWNED PRESS HIT

General Regulation of Organiza-
tions That Propagate "Notions
of Government" Is Asked.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—Radicalism, lawlessness and violence in America, and bolshevism as exemplified by soviet rule in Russia were denounced in a report made public today by the senate judiciary sub-committee, which made an exhaustive investigation of these and other subjects during the last session of congress. The report will be presented to the senate Monday.

Recommendations by the sub-committee for legislation included:

A permanent law similar to the wartime espionage act designed to control "forces of anarchy and violence" and "adequately protect our national sovereignty and our established institutions."

A strict regulation of the manufacture and distribution of high explosives.

Regulation of mushroom organizations and special interests which propagate "notions of government, sociology, benevolence or what not."

Foreign Press Hit.

Control and regulation of foreign-language publications.

More specific identification of newspaper interests, by amendment and broadening of the law requiring publishers to report their ownership, editors, creditors, circulation and other facts to the postoffice department.

A strengthening of the corrupt practices act regarding political contributions, existing state and federal laws being declared "entirely inadequate to meet present-day political methods."

The report comprised nearly 55,000 words and was signed by the full sub-committee.

Broadly the report dealt with these main subjects: investigation of which was ordered by the senate—bolshevism, pro-German propaganda, both before and after the United States entered the war, and the political activities of the brewery and liquor interests.

Activities of German nationalists and sympathizers and of the liquor interests were severely arraigned, but the committee made no specific recommendations other than those relating to better identification of newspaper interests and the strengthening of the corrupt practices act.

In a general statement prefacing its legislative regulations, the committee said the information disclosed certain well-defined, "a tyranny of autocracy," in America the committee declared "it is a slogan of the elements of unrest and discontent."

Congress Urged to Act.

"The activities brought to the attention of the committee," says the report, "are so startling that we believe the real advantage of the inquiry will be lost unless congress profits from the knowledge thus obtained by undertaking appropriate legislation to make impossible a repetition of these activities."

By those whose activities are still continuing or by others who at some future time may seek to undermine the government or pervert the popular will by adoption of similar methods against which the federal statutes seem to provide no adequate safeguard."

Bolshevism was excoriated in the report as a "dictatorship of class" and a "direct challenge to Christianity and civilization; a tyranny of autocracy."

In America the committee declared "it is a slogan of the elements of unrest and discontent."

Immigration Body Split

ATTEMPT MADE TO EXCEPT ORIENTAL CITIZENS.

Small Group of Membership Said to Desire Equality for Eastern Races.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—That all of the 1900 prominent men in the United States, many of them from Oregon and the northwest, whose names appear as members of the national committee for constructive immigration legislation, never fully approved the proposed legislative plan of that organization to let down the bars to Chinese and Japanese immigration and naturalization, was brought out in yesterday's hearing before the house committee on immigration.

Dr. Sidney L. Gulick, secretary of the committee on constructive immigration legislation, who testified at the hearing, admitted that only a general statement as to the purposes of the organization to work for a limited immigration fixing a percentage basis for the admission of all foreigners, was sent to the members whose names are being used. Dr. Gulick would not say that the committee of 1900 had specifically approved his proposed legislation which would repeal the statutes relating to exclusion or special treatment of Japanese and Chinese.

He further admitted that a small group of the committee on constructive

immigration legislation had formulated its legislative plan, which has no other interest in immigration laws, so far as could be developed than securing in the United States racial equality for orientals along with lifting the barriers to their admission.

Representative Burton L. French, of Moscow, Ida., as well as Ernest H. Lindley, president of the University of Idaho, are included in the list.

When the hearing adjourned yesterday Representative Raker of California was trying to get the senate committee of 1900 had never been fully advised of the real purposes of the national committee on constructive immigration legislation.

TACOMA MORE POPULOUS

Gain for Past Year Estimated at More Than 1320.

TACOMA, Wash., June 15.—(Special.)—Based on the school census with a ratio of 5 to 1, Tacoma's population on May 1 was 124,375. The figures for this year's school census show that there are 24,375 persons within the Tacoma school district between the ages of 4 and 21 years. The gain in the last year was 1324, or 53 per cent.

The Tacoma school board is constructing additions to several schools and erecting temporary buildings in other locations.

4 MEN BELIEVED DROWNED

Three Spokane Men Believed Lost in Priest Lake.

ROME, June 15.—Order has been restored in Spezia, where there had been serious rioting since Thursday. More than 100 shops in the city were sacked and several villas in the neighborhood were looted by the mobs.

IRISH POLICE UNION DISTRESSES BRITAIN

Statesmen Worried by Progress of Movement.

GRAVE DANGERS FORESEEN

Formerly Loyal Constabulary Now Demands Disarmament—Sympathy With Separatists Shown.

LONDON, June 15.—(Special Cable.)—Rapid growth of a trade union movement in the ranks of the Dublin Metropolitan police and the Royal Irish constabulary forms the subject of an important article by a special correspondent of the Daily News in Dublin.

Last December the first branch of the Union of Police and Prison Officials was established for the R. I. C. and D. M. P. jointly. No formal notice was taken of the event until February 4, by which time it is asserted over 1000 members of the R. I. C. and over 900 of the D. M. P. had become members. At that time the deputy inspector-general of the R. I. C. issued to all the county inspectors an announcement giving notice that the lord lieutenant could not see his way to permit members of the force to join a police union.

Order a Dead Letter.

There is evidence that this order failed very largely in its intended effect. Union officials go so far as to declare that it is now a dead letter and that union membership among the R. I. C. has more than trebled since its issue.

The most important aspect of the affair remains to be mentioned. The Irish section of the union not only demands for Irish policemen pay and conditions of service equal to those in England, but also makes a demand that strikes at the root idea of the force's constitution. It demands that the R. I. C. shall be disbanded and demilitarized.

The demand for disarmament is believed to be steadily growing. The idea is said by those who have good reason to know to be stimulated in the first place by fear in the second place by discontent and in the third place by the beginnings of sympathy even with the more extreme nationalist groups.

"In its present form," says the article, "the police movement is but another of those illis that can be traced back to the supreme folly of the conscriptionist's threat which sowed in a force that had hitherto been astonishingly loyal seeds of discontent and perhaps of disaffection."

Senate's "Affront" Presented.

The Morning Post and Times give considerable prominence to the adoption by the United States senate of the resolution requesting the American peace commission to endeavor to obtain a hearing before the peace conference.

The Times does not refer to the matter editorially, but the Morning Post, under the heading "The Senate's Affront," says in its leading editorial:

"There is no other country in the world where such deliberate and authoritative affront to a friendly power would be offered."

The Daily Chronicle regards the senate's action as proof that Americans are "extraordinarily misinformed" about the Irish question.

Y. M. C. A. SESSIONS OPEN

ELEVEN COLLEGES ARE REPRESENTED AT CONFERENCE.

Point System of Desirability of Faculty Influence in Student Government Is Topic.

SEABECK, Wash., June 15.—(Special.)—Eleven colleges and universities were represented by over 60 delegates at the annual Y. M. C. A. conference, which opened here Saturday. Five Washington universities and colleges were represented by a delegation of over 35.

The conference consists of two divisions. One is a school for social and Christian workers in colleges and universities, and the other is a student government session composed of student body, presidents and editors, who are discussing the question of student government and publications. Eleven of the leading colleges of the northwest are represented in the student government session by their respective student bodies.

The questions for discussion are the honor system and the point system of desirability of faculty influence in student government, and such questions as are considered important in student government. Among the leaders of both the student government question and the Christian social workers' question are Gale Seamen, international Y. M. C. A. secretary for colleges; Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of the Oregon Agricultural college; Professor Norman F. Coleman, Reed college; L. R. Wheeler, of the Portland Telegram; W. H. Lewis, a leading Seattle contractor, formerly of Portland; Professor F. E. Rickett, of the University of Oregon, and Dean A. Priest, University of Washington.

Normal to Present Play

Junior Prom Feature of Festivities at Monmouth School.

MONMOUTH, Or., June 15.—(Special.)—The senior play, "Everywoman's Road," which will be given in the auditorium of the normal on Monday evening, is under the direction of Miss Rosa B. Perrott, head of the English department.

The exercises at the Oregon normal school began with the junior prom Saturday evening by the junior class. The musical was furnished by the orchestra from Salem. A number of guests from abroad were present and enjoyed with the senior class the courtesies of the evening.

Vancouver Exercises Begin.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 15.—(Special.)—Commencement week for the senior class of the Vancouver High school began today. Baccalaureate services being held at the First Congregational church this morning. The sermon was preached by Rev. F. E. Dark, of the Baptist church, his topic being "The Supreme Task."

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FOG DELAYS TRANSPORTS

BRITISH FREIGHTER GROUNDS OFF BARNEGAT, N. J.

Colorado, Wyoming and Idaho Men on Board Ships Held Up by Bad Weather.

NEW YORK, June 15.—The British freight steamer Iperia, bound for New York from the West Indies with 2000 tons of dates, grounded on a sand bar off Barnegat, N. J., this morning, in the heavy fog which impeded shipping along the north and middle Atlantic coast and delayed two transports, the Peerless from St. Nazaire with 2465 troops, and the Alaskan, from St. Nazaire with 2129 troops.

Many of the troops were from Colorado, Wyoming, Idaho and other western states. They were greeted at the pier by a delegation including Senator John B. Kendrick of Wyoming, Governor F. W. Davis and former Governor

F. R. Gooding of Idaho, with Representatives Burton L. French and Addison T. Smith of that state, and Representative W. N. Valle of Colorado.

The transport Platteburg arrived from Brest with 39 officers and 2174 troops. Also aboard were 63 nurses, nine welfare workers, 46 soldiers' wives and 14 children. Among the units were special casual companies destined to Campa Dodge, Lewis, Presidio, Funston and Fort Russell.

WILSON SEEKS APPOINTEE

President to Name U. S. Member of Reparations Body.

PARIS, June 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—President Wilson is considering the appointment of an American member of the reparations commission, which will carry out the treaty provisions for German payment of reparations.

It is understood that Norman Davis, now the principal financial adviser, occupies first place for the appointment but that he does not wish to accept, owing to business engagements in America.
