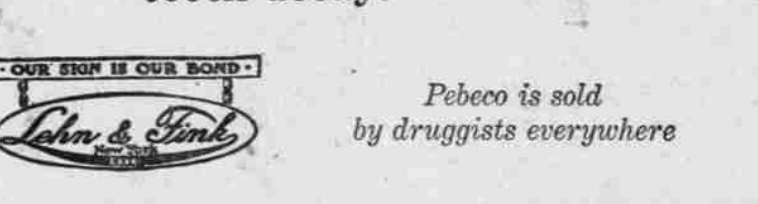

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FISHING FLEET BREAKS UP

Coos Bay Boats Leave for Umpqua and Columbia Rivers.

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 16.—Low prices paid to fishermen are said to be the cause of withdrawal of many boats this year. One has gone to the Columbia river, one to Newport and several to the Umpqua.

From 2 to 3 cents less than is paid at the Umpqua is said to be paid on Coos Bay. One fisherman reports a catch of over 1000 pounds of halibut this week for which he received only 11 cents.
