

GOVERNOR LISTER IS BURIED AT TACOMA

Many Pay Tribute to Memory of Washington's Executive.

2000 AUTOS IN PROCESSION

President Suzzallo of University of Washington and Rev. R. H. Shuett Give Eulogies.

TACOMA, Wash., June 17.—The body of Governor Ernest Lister lies tonight in the family plot, Tacoma cemetery, close to the grave of his father, following a funeral today such as this city has never before seen. While a blanket of silence hovered over the markets and industries of this city, political prejudices were laid aside and thousands from all parts of the state were present to pay tribute to the memory of the Tacoma citizen and sixth governor of the state.

Infantry Leads Procession.
Following impressive church services, six companies of the Third Washington Infantry, national guard, led the cortege diverting all traffic from the line of march and clearing the way for over 2000 automobiles that followed.

Services at the cemetery blended the military ceremony with the Masonic ritual. Business houses here were closed from 1 to 3 this afternoon for the funeral. Rev. R. H. Shuett of the Methodist church, where the funeral was held, preached the funeral sermon, and President Henry Suzzallo of the University of Washington and Bishop Frederick Keator of the Episcopal church, both personal friends of Governor Lister, gave eulogies.

Service as Governor Longest.
Governor Lister is the second governor of the state to die in office and be buried in Pierce county. In 1895 Governor John R. Rogers of Tacoma died and his body lay in state in the county courthouse here.

Ernest Lister was one of the advisers of Governor Rogers and Lister's political career began under the Rogers administration. Tacamans are recalling the fact that the careers of the two men ran in parallel paths. They are the only two democrats to have been elected governor of Washington, and they are also the only two governors to be re-elected. Both died during their second terms.

Governor Lister served as governor of the state longer than any other man, he having assumed office in January, 1911.

CENTRALIA BUSINESS HALTS

Commerce Chamber and Lodges Send Delegates to Funeral.

CENTRALIA, Wash., June 17.—(Special.)—Business houses in Centralia were closed for one hour this afternoon during the funeral of Governor Ernest Lister. A proclamation asking the stores to close was issued by Mayor T. C. Rogers yesterday afternoon.

At the noon luncheon of the chamber of commerce yesterday, Dr. A. R. MacLean, J. H. Roberts, A. I. Zimmerman and Newell S. Wright were named to represent the chamber at the funeral.

Members of the chamber of commerce and P. B. Hubbard last night were named to represent Centralia lodge of Masons at the services, while Dr. O. E. Nelson, exalted ruler of Centralia lodge of Elks, urged as many local Elks as possible to attend the services.

LISTER HONORED AT SPOKANE

City and County Offices Will Be Closed This Afternoon.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 17.—City and county offices here will be closed this afternoon out of respect to the late Governor Lister. The local stock exchange also will be closed, and business houses generally have been asked to take like measures of respect.

A public memorial service has been arranged for a downtown church this evening, at which several church eulogies will be delivered.

CO-OPERATIVE BODY QUILTS

Spokane Trading Company to Pay Small Amount.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 17.—(Special.)—Acknowledging that their business could not survive the stigma placed on it by the sensational fraud exposures in 1915, the officers of the Northwestern General Trading company, operating a co-operative store here, have decided to discontinue.

"We have practically closed out our stock," said President J. P. Hill today. "We will soon return the assets to the stockholders at less than \$1.00 a share. The par value was \$20, and there are more than 6000 paid up stockholders."

The company was organized in 1909 with a capitalization of \$600,000. Not all of this sum was paid up, however. The venture was an experiment in co-operative community merchandising. The difficulties which beset the firm into failure arose over alleged fraudulent use of the mails. President Gale Smith and two other officers were given jail sentences after conviction in the federal court.

HOOD RIVER BOY LANDS

Oregonian Story Tells C. A. Bell of Son's Arrival.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 17.—(Special.)—C. A. Bell, chairman of the canteen committee of the Hood River Red Cross chapter, whose activities have brought joy to scores of thousands of soldiers passing through the city within the past two years, is looking forward to a happy reunion with his own son before July 4.

Mr. Bell found it difficult to restrain his happiness this morning when he read Peggy Curtis' story in The Oregonian of the arrival of the steamer Alaskan and Peerless yesterday, carrying the 148th and 146th regiments of field artillery, and noted that his son, Fred H. Bell of company B, the latter regiment, had landed from the Peerless.

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The convention opened with an invocation by Rev. Henry Van Engelen, pastor of the Baptist church, followed by a flag salute and patriotic singing, led by Mrs. J. Alexander Mahan of Ellensburg. Mrs. Kate Ronsdon, secretary of the chamber of commerce, welcomed the delegates on behalf of Centralia, and Mrs. F. G. Gilbert, president of the Civic club, one of the three local organizations affiliated with the state federation, extended a welcome on behalf of the club women of the city.

Mrs. R. J. Thompson of Spokane responded to the address.

An address by Mrs. Overton G. Ellis, of Tacoma, "Washington Women in War Work," closed the afternoon's program. Tonight a reception will be held in the Elks' club rooms, an art exhibit to be a feature of the evening.

The convention will get down to real business tomorrow morning when Mrs. Josephine Preston, state superintendent of public instruction, will address the session, while tomorrow evening Mrs. N. E. McCready of Snohomish will deliver her address.

Tree to Be Dedicated.
Tomorrow afternoon a tree planted in the city park will be dedicated to the sons of federation members who gave their lives to the cause of world democracy. Mrs. A. Smith, head of the conservation department of the federation, will preside at the dedication exercises and will present the tree, which will be accepted on behalf of the city by Mrs. George Dyrart. The dedication address will be delivered by Prof. Clark P. Bissett of the University of Washington.

Officers will be elected by the federation Thursday morning. Mrs. W. M. Kern of Walla Walla has been mentioned prominently as a candidate to fill the office of president, held two years by Mrs. N. S. McCready of Snohomish, and as the custom of alternating the presidency between eastern and western Washington has long been kept up, it is expected that there will be no opposition to Mrs. Kern's candidacy.

Other retiring officers are Mrs. J. W. Mowbray of Olympia, first vice-president; Mrs. G. C. Howard of Snohomish, corresponding secretary; Miss Beattie L. Winsor of Seattle, treasurer, and Mrs. J. H. Cunningham of Spokane, secretary.

Headquarters for the convention have been established at the Hotel Centralia, where members of the executive board met this morning with Mrs. McCready. The other members of the board are Mrs. K. SALE IS WORLD'S RECORD
ED CAREY GETS HIGHEST PRICE FOR JERSEY HERD.

F. A. Doerfler of Silverton, Pays \$5100 for St. Mawes Boise Rosaire; \$2100 Paid for Calif.

CARLTON, Or., June 17.—(Special.)—A world's record was established at the sale of thoroughbred Jersey stock, held Monday at Ed Carey's Oaksprings farm, near Carlton, when the highest average price on record was paid for a Jersey herd bred by one owner.

Easily the feature of the sale was St. Mawes Boise Rosaire, purchased by F. A. Doerfler, Jersey breeder of Silverton, for \$5100, a bull calf, brother of Rosaire, 10 days old.

Several head were bought by D. C. Howard, county agent for Columbia county, at prices ranging from \$1200 to \$1500. The Hood farm, of Lowell, Mass., made several selections, paying as high as \$2525. Guy Hewitt, a Monmouth breeder, paid \$1550 for a cow.

Other buyers were Dr. Hard of California, Merton DeGuire of Silverton, Ralph Hyatt of Silverton, P. O. Powell & Son of Monmouth, and Anton Malair of Boring.
