CHAMPION HAS CLOSE RACE

KELI ALMOST DEFEATS KAHANAMOKU IN SWIM.

Two Hawaiian Records Are Broken at Honolulu—15-Year-Old Boy Is Promising Swimmer.

HONOLULU, T. H., June 18.—(Special).—While no world's records were smashed at the two-day swimming meet held here, two Hawaiian records were broken and in the 100-yard race for men Duke Kahanamoku, world's champion swimmer and holder of the world's record for the distance, had the score of his life when John Kelli finished so close behind the champion that the crowd thought it was a dead heat.

The time was 1 2-5 seconds over the world's record.

Kelli led the champion to the 60-yard mark, when the duke in a burst caught up. They swam neck and neck to the tape. It was freely predicted that Kelli, who is just a youngster, would defeat Duke in the big September meet to be held here, when Norman Ross and other stars take part.
