Covenant Accepted by Vote of 29,750 to 420.

ALIEN WORKERS PROTESTED

Federation Votes to Cancel Before July 1 So-Called Baker-Gompers Agreement of 1917.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 20.—

Organized labor today indorsed the league of nations covenant...

In giving its approval by a vote of 29,750 against 420...

"Your message came while I was in Belgium and reached me too late to make full reply...

"Upon my arrival the executive council of the American Federation of Labor has recommended to the federation now in convention the indorsement of the league of nations...

"Reports published here indicate that the labor provisions have been so changed and weakened as to practically nullify their effect...

Soon after the report was introduced an amendment was offered to the effect that nothing in the indorsement of the league of nations covenant can be construed as denying the freedom of Ireland...

By unanimous vote the convention decided to cancel the so-called Baker-Gompers agreement of June 19, 1917...

Various resolutions designed to encourage the building of more houses were adopted...

The convention rejected a proposal that organized labor favor extension of the civil service to all employees and the rank of officers...

After a bitter fight the convention selected one of five prohibition resolutions offered and adopted it...

The telegram declares that Washington organized labor stands emphatically for national prohibition...

The fight in the convention was clearly between supporters of Gompers' policies and those against Gompers...

CHICAGO, June 20.—The commercial telegraphers' strike, according to a statement from strike headquarters here today, will continue as long as the Wilson administration stands on record as denying us the right which President Wilson says all workers are entitled to.

Strikers Claim Gains. The statement charged that the telegraph companies attempted to take advantage of our awaiting action by the American Federation of Labor by circulating false reports about desertions from our ranks and that the strike would soon be over.

"After first declaring no one had struck," the statement continues, "now they are offering fancy inducements for strikers to return. As a matter of fact, the gains have been all on our side."

The statement was made that the number of telephone workers on strike was increasing steadily and would continue.

Commercial companies said that conditions here were unchanged and that business was normal.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 20.—Conferences to be held within the next few days with officials of the Pacific Telephone company at San Francisco by representatives of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers will decide the question of calling a general strike on Monday of electrical workers throughout the Pacific coast district, which includes five states, according to a statement made today by Secretary Charles E. Ford of the electrical workers' union.

The telephone company maintained silence regarding the situation. Before continuing a conference with the telephone officials today to present a new set of demands, union officials announced that an ultimatum was being framed, which if presented, would cut off negotiations after tomorrow and result in locals in Oregon and Washington being called out.

Some Concessions Offered. Telephone company officials were said by the union leaders to have given an ultimatum to their demands and to have offered concessions which would be made a basis for negotiations if the strikers returned.

Today's conference was again continued after the workers had presented their demands, D. P. Fullerton, the conferee of the company, announcing that he would call the session again as soon as he had digested the demands and submitted them to other authorities authorized to act. It was indicated that this conference would take place tomorrow.

Worthy Horsman, Seattle, and C. W. Hurd, Portland, were added today to the committee named by the unions yesterday to negotiate with the company.

Service Still Crippled. Admission that they were winning no new members to their ranks from the Western Union company, but that the company was badly crippled on account of other strikes, was made by officials of the striking telegraphers' union here today. The Postal Telegraph company continued to admit crippled service, but the Western Union said its situation had not been changed materially. But few telegraphers in that
