SUMMER SCHOOL WILL OPEN TODAY.—The University of Oregon summer school will open this morning at the central library. WAGE SCHEDULE IS FIXED

MAYOR BAKER TAKES HAND IN SALARY INCREASES.

Spirit of Co-operation and Fairness Expected by Executive in Dealing With City Problem.

Although Mayor Baker has prepared a schedule of wage increases for city employees differing from that recently acted upon by members of the city council, and will present it Wednesday for action, it was predicted yesterday that a spirit of co-operation and fairness, rather than one of conflict, would mark a further consideration of the question.

Mayor Baker's schedule provides for a uniform increase of \$15 per month for employees paid by the month, and \$9 and 75 cents per day for common labor, and \$25 per month for heads of departments. It will provide for the repeal of the ordinance passed last Friday by Commissioners Mann, Barbour and Perkins, and other ordinances in conflict.

While it has been pointed out by the commissioners that some of the men in their departments are entitled to special consideration because of the technical nature of their services, and that a uniform increase would not serve their purposes, they have indicated a disposition to meet the mayor's program fully and to take no arbitrary stand until the question has had full discussion.

Members of the police and fire departments, it is argued, a blanket rise in wages may be found far more satisfactory than in departments where men are performing technical services. These men just now are said to be in great demand in private enterprises, and the city is compelled to meet salary offers from the outside in order to hold them.

Portland Gets Wide Publicity.

Through the "own your home" campaign that was inaugurated some time ago, Portland is receiving much publicity in the east, as indicated by requests for information that are received from time to time by the Chamber of Commerce and the committee in charge of the movement.

The Louisville request was made after the department of labor had suggested the opening of a similar movement in that city, and citing Portland's accomplishment as an example for the southerners.

Baptist Young People Meet.

YAKIMA, Wash. June 22.—(Special).—The Baptist Young People's union of the valley yesterday and last night met in convention in this city. A rally will be held at Sunnyside on September 5. In the meantime the organization will extend its membership, particularly in the lower valley.

OLD DOUGLAS COUNTY RESIDENTS REUNITED

Friendships Renewed at Picnic at Peninsula Park.

EARLY DAYS ARE RECALLED

Prominent Pioneers in Addresses Revive Memories of Umpqua Valley and Spirit of Douglas.

It was a big day for former Douglas county residents yesterday, when more than 500 former residents of that section who are now living in Portland and vicinity gathered for a picnic and reunion at Peninsula park. The occasion was the eighth annual meeting of the Douglas County Association of Portland, an organization composed of former residents of Douglas county, who are now residing or sojourning in Portland, and having as its purpose "to preserve old friendships, keep fresh old acquaintance and promote good fellowship among the members."

The association now has about 700 members, including on its roster many of the prominent pioneers of Portland. Reunions are held every year, and the one yesterday was the largest in point of attendance that the association has ever held.

Prominent Pioneers Speak.

Beautiful Peninsula park was gay yesterday, the bright flowers mingling their color with the red ribbons worn upon the coat lapels of the hundreds of Douglas county association members. At noon a grand picnic, and the younger members, representing the second and third generations of Oregonians, met under the shade of the trees for a basket lunch. The business session had already been held at 11 o'clock in the morning, and the regular program took place following the luncheon in the park clubhouse.

At the afternoon program talks were made by W. H. Brackett, 30-year-old pioneer of Oregon; George H. Himes, secretary of the Oregon Historical society; Justice H. L. Benson of the Oregon supreme court; G. C. Love, Portland pioneer of 1849; Judge A. M. Crawford, former attorney-general of Oregon; and Judge George W. Riddle, county judge of Douglas county. A musical program consisting of piano solos was rendered by Miss Beatrice Peters and Miss Belva Drain Lillis.

Early Days Recalled.

In an interesting impromptu talk Mr. Love recalled the pioneer days of Douglas county, when it was scarcely more than an Indian village. He spoke of crossing the Willamette on a ferry operated by turnstiles with mules to work the ropes. The mule drivers in those days got wages of 10 cents an hour, Mr. Love said. In his boyhood came the first steam ferry boat, a side-wheel steamer, and it was one of the great moments in his memory of early Portland.

Judge Crawford spoke feelingly of Douglas county, and the beautiful Umpqua river, declaring that those who had lived in the county and were now residing elsewhere had left the county only because they felt the duty of spreading the Douglas atmosphere and spirit throughout the state. Justice Benson declared he had attended every meeting of the association since it was held and was looking forward to many more. C. Louis Barzee read a poem which he had composed upon the subject of the Umpqua river. The mule drivers were opened by an invocation by Rev. Arthur Gardner and closed with the singing of "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," under the leadership of Mrs. E. J. Sutherland Gallagher.

FIGHT PREDICTIONS VARY

CANADIAN CRITIC SAYS CHAMPION WILL WIN BATTLE.

Sporting Editor of Boston Post Believes Dempsey's Youth and Speed Will Prevail.

Frederick W. Lyonde, Canada's greatest ring critic, said the other day that Willard will win from Jack Dempsey on July 4, when and how he pleases, and it's a safe bet that a majority of the Canadians will string along with Lyonde. "They don't make them big enough in the Dempsey model," concluded Lyonde.

George O. "Doc" Almy, sporting editor of the Boston Post, disagrees with the Canadian authority. "Dempsey has youth, speed and endurance on Willard, and I look to see him defeat the latter," is the way Almy puts it.

Post-Dempsey should win but he won't win in the simple, slugging manner expected by so many of his rabid admirers. Willard will be in good shape, and that item means that matters will be fairly even when the big day arrives.

Dean M. Snyder, Denver Express—Jack Dempsey should be the world's champion heavy. If Willard could fight as well as Dempsey, the greatest fighter who ever breathed up to now—Jack Johnson—need not have laid down to him in the Havana ring. The west has little respect for Willard, either as a fighter or as a man. Dempsey is clever enough to take care of the bulk of Willard.

Ralph Roddy, Memphis, Tenn. Express—The outcome of the Willard-Dempsey match depends entirely upon whether or not the champion can get in condition. If Willard is in shape he should defeat his smaller opponent.

John R. Donahue, sporting editor, Hartford Courant—In spite of the fact that it was a long-drawn-out battle, there are yet many flinty enthusiasts, alleged and otherwise, who are not quite satisfied with the Willard-Johnson affair of 1915. Dempsey, as everyone is aware, means business, and his aggressiveness and determination to show Willard up should prove important factors.

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NURSES TO PRESENT CASES

HEARING SET FOR TODAY BY INDUSTRIAL WELFARE BOARD.

Cigar Store Proprietors, Hotel Managers and Public Building Owners Will Be Heard Monday.

Regulation of hours for student nurses employed in hospitals of the state of Oregon is scheduled to come before the industrial welfare conference at its session to be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon in the courthouse. The attorney-general issued an opinion recently that the nurses come under jurisdiction of the welfare commission and that, therefore, it was the duty of the conference to make recommendations relative to hours of employment. A general invitation has been extended to all hospitals of the state to present their cases.

Little attention is to be given the question of wages paid nurses who are preparing to enter the profession, it has been announced, as they are students rather than employees. However, the conference will determine whether the eight-hour day shall apply to student nurses and will consider other matters pertinent to the issue.

Manufacturers of woolen goods are to be given a special hearing at the meeting of the conference on Thursday, the eight-hour day provision having been brought up in this connection. The woolen mills now are employing women on the ten-hour basis. Proprietors of cigar stores, hotel lobbies and managers of public buildings probably will have a hearing at Monday's session in regard to the employment of women as elevator operators after 6 o'clock P. M. This discussion had been set for last week's session.

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
