

SHRINERS PLAN TO CELEBRATE VICTORY

Winning of 1920 Convention
Signal for Jollification.

PARADE IS NIGHT FEATURE

Many Prominent Lodgesmen From All
Parts of Northwest to Attend
Saturday's Gathering.

Saturday next Shrine of Portland and the northwest will celebrate the winning of this city of the great ceremonial session of the imperial council. There are to be representatives present from Seattle, Tacoma, Spokane and Astoria, with a possibility that Victoria will send a delegation. Deputy Imperial Potentate Ellis Lewis Garretson of Astoria, temple has been invited and will probably accept. He will bring the personal greetings of the imperial potentate, Frederick Kendrick of Philadelphia, the most popular and spectacular noble who has ever worn the crown of the Arabic work of Masonry.

A special feature of the celebration will be the attention shown to the women of Shrine. Women to See Settings. Between the hours of 10 and 11 o'clock in the forenoon of Saturday the wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of Shriner will be received at the auditorium and given a view of the rich settings that are used in staging the oriental work of the initiation ceremonies. That evening they will be banqueted at the imperial and then given a theater party. Frank McCrillis is in charge of the reception at the auditorium and Frank McCrillis will act as host in the evening.

More than 200 candidates have already been assembled and the prospects are that the number will aggregate 300. They come largely from Portland, with a liberal sprinkling from other cities of the state. The first session will be given at the auditorium Saturday afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock.

At 5 P. M. an adjournment will be taken and at 6 P. M. the candidates are to be taken to Hotel Portland for dinner.

Parade Is Night Feature. At 7:30 the parade will move from Masonic temple down Yamhill to Broadway, thence to Oak, thence to Sixth, to Morrison, to Fourth, to the auditorium, where the second session will be demonstrated following a jollification over the great victory Al Kader temple secured at Indianapolis last week in capturing the imperial council session.

The parade will include the band and patrol from Al Kader, the chanters and dancing girls, and at least 1000 members of the local temple in evening dress and fez. Potentate Hoffman is insisting on the dress suits this time. He says the occasion demands them. However, the fellows who do not have them will be placed as guards to prevent the escape of the novices. Fr. M. Smith is to be grand marshal of the parade.

Committee to Be Named. During the progress of events at the auditorium an announcement will be made of the general committee that will be asked to undertake the plans for entertaining the imperial council.

Large Expenditures for Purchase of Airplane Plants and Fields and Necessary Buildings.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Taking up the \$288,000,000 annual army appropriation bill today, the senate will consider it at a night session, the senate tentatively approved an appropriation of \$55,000,000 for the army air service, an increase of \$10,000,000 over the amount voted by the house.

Action upon many important committee amendments was deferred until tomorrow. Among these was the one fixing the average strength of the army during the next fiscal year at 400,000 men.

Plans of the war department for the rapid demobilization of the army were revealed to the senate tonight by chairman Wadsworth, who said that while on July 1 the army would consist of 1,033,000 officers and men, this number would be reduced to 748,258 by July 31; 472,258 on August 31, and from September 30 for the next nine months under the 400,000 plan, would consist of 222,000 officers and men.

In tentatively approving the air service appropriation the senate authorized \$32,000 for the purchase of the Curtiss Elmwood plant at Buffalo; \$2,260,000 for the Dayton-Wright airplane factory at Dayton; \$2,000,000 for the construction of station and necessary buildings for the housing of airships in Burlington county, New Jersey, and \$170,200 for the acquisition of El Estero, Santa Clara county, California, for the establishment of an aerial gunnery school.

IRRIGATION UNION SOUGHT

WESTERN STATE BODIES MAY AMALGAMATE TO SECURE AID.

State Engineer Copper Announces Plans for Meeting to Map Out National Campaign.

SALEM, Or., June 23.—(Special.)—An amalgamation of the various irrigation bodies of all western states may be effected within a short time as a means of procuring federal aid through the Lane bill, now before congress. That this consolidation is contemplated was indicated today, when State Engineer Copper announced that an all-western meeting is now being planned at which delegates from all irrigation congresses will be in attendance to map out a campaign in an effort to procure passage of the \$500,000,000 reclamation bill now before the national lawmakers.

The Idaho reclamation association, one of the strongest in the west, is taking the initiative in the movement. It has written to Governor Olcott, asking that this state lend every possible cooperation. State Engineer Copper is strongly in favor of the plan, as is Jay Upton, president of the Oregon irrigation congress.

VISIT ON FOURTH, APPEAL

PORTLAND FOLK URGED TO HELP IN CELEBRATIONS.

Other Cities Aided Rose Festival. Says Mayor—Good Turn Should Be Reciprocated.

The usual civic celebration staged in Portland on the nation's birthday will be omitted this Fourth of July, according to decision reached yesterday by Mayor Baker and W. P. Strandberg, the latter serving as acting-chairman of the Fourth of July celebration committee.

Portland residents are asked to go to the neighboring cities to aid in the success of the celebrations contemplated outside of Portland. The principal reason for the omission of the celebration here is the character of the recent Victory Rose Festival, which in every way was a celebration in honor of the returned soldiers, sailors and marines.

In addition Mayor Baker said that inasmuch as the people of the small cities and towns aided in the success of the Rose Festival very materially, the people of Portland should reciprocate by helping the outside communities in their celebrations.

FORD'S POLICY IS PROBED

Attitude Toward Employees Absent With Colors Questioned.

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., June 23.—In the Ford-Chicago Daily Tribune libel suit testimony was given by P. W. Williams, correspondent of the Tribune at Detroit, who sent out news dispatches on which the alleged libelous editorial was based. Williams, by request of the Tribune, endeavored to ascertain the policy of the Ford Motor company toward employees while absent with the colors and called up General Manager Klingensmith of the Ford company.

Williams testified that on one occasion Mr. Klingensmith told him that salaries would not be paid, jobs would not be held open, nor would dependents be cared for. He telegraphed the story to the Tribune, which printed it June 22. Counsel for the Tribune are trying to show that Mr. Klingensmith correctly reported the company's attitude to Mr. Williams June 21 and that this attitude was changed after publication of the Tribune's editorial on June 22.

LABOR SHORT ON COOS BAY

Mills, Planning to Operate Extra Shift, Seeking Men.

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 23.—(Special.)—The big demand for lumber has caused Coos Bay mills to add additional forces. The North Bend Mill & Lumber company will put on a night force of 30 men July 1, and the C. A. Smith Bay City mill now operating one side night and day, will, as quickly as arrangements can be made, operate both sides, which will probably be within two weeks.

There is a scarcity of help here and the Smith company, which will need 100 men, fears it will encounter difficulty in securing a sufficient number to operate successfully. The Bay Park shingle mill at North Bend is starting a night force. Grading and paving contracts are being worked in the open, are absorbing all the available labor.

RUNAWAY GIRLS CAPTURED

Louise Home Charges Walk From Portland to Roseburg.

ROSEBURG, Or., June 23.—(Special.)—Stealing away from the Louise Home at Portland three weeks ago, Hatty Wakeman, whose former home was in Jackson county, and Bernice Stewart of The Dalles, have been dodging officers in their attempt to reach California. They were detained at Riddle, 25 miles south of Roseburg, today, and returned to this city. The young women are 16 and 17 years old and walked most of the way from Portland here. They were picked up by Miss Pitchford, juvenile officer, Saturday evening and placed in a rooming house for safekeeping, where they escaped by way of a bathroom.

Highway Work May Start. McMINNVILLE, Or., June 23.—(Special.)—The arrival here of the cement paving plant today forecasts early activity on the McMinnville-Gaston section of the Pacific highway. It is the intention of Contractor La Point to commence work at the city limits and proceed north, and as there will be few heavy falls on this route, the pavement to the county line can be practically completed this year.

CHANGES PLANNED IN CITY'S HOUSING CODE

Committee to Be Named to Review Ordinance.

FEATURES HELD DRASTIC

Some Provisions Governing Air and Light in Buildings and Yard Areas Strongly Opposed.

As a first step toward modification of the present housing code which became effective about four months ago, Commissioner Barbur of the department of public works announced yesterday his plan of appointing a committee of five to review the code and report on possible improvements.

When this report is obtained Commissioner Barbur plans to formulate a report to the council, making recommendations that he deems essential in revision of both the housing and building codes.

A delegation of 25 men and women appeared before the city council yesterday offering suggestions for revision of the housing code. The delegation included representatives from the Portland Realty board, the Builders' Exchange and architects.

Code Declared Too Strict. The present housing code, according to L. R. Bailey, representing the realty board, has strict provisions which are unnecessary. He told the council that he believed sufficient air and light could be provided in homes, hotels and rooming houses with provisions less strict than those in the present code. Suggestion was offered by Mr. Bailey that one provision for rear yards of not less than 15 feet depth be changed to not less than 10 feet in depth. Suggestion also was made that under certain circumstances side yards which extend from front to rear should have a minimum width of no less than 4 feet.

"One reason for this suggestion," said Mr. Bailey, "is that there are lots with plenty of light and air available from the front and rear yards without taking into consideration the side yards. There are also lots on steep declivities where it is almost impossible to comply with the ordinance as it now reads."

Minimum Five Feet. At present no single dwelling can be constructed without a side yard of at least 8 feet in width. When the code was first enacted this provision was for not less than 10 feet, but the council, at the suggestion of Building Inspector Plummer reduced the minimum to 5 feet.

Mr. Bailey also suggested that on corner lots the allowance of ground area for building purposes be increased from 80 to 90 per cent and on inside lots from 65 to 75 per cent.

Another suggestion offered by the committee amends the section providing that "in all dwellings hereinafter erected every room shall have at least one window opening toward the street or upon the yard or court" by dropping the remainder of the sentence, which reads: "of dimensions specified in the title and located on the same lot."

Immediate Action Promised.

The reason advanced for this omission is that it is virtually impossible to have the center room in a bungalow on a court 8 feet in width, as the section provides.

Commissioner Barbur said yesterday that he would form his committee at once and expected to have his report with recommendations to the council within 60 days.

A warrant was issued for the arrest of George Pifer, supposed owner of the machine, and in the meantime the car has been ordered held as evidence while Deputy District Attorney Bernard figures out some legal way for the confiscation of an instrument used in the commission of an unlawful act, to-wit, an automobile.

Acting on a very weak but very reliable tip, Deputy Sheriff Hurlburt entered a garage at 484 Burnside street yesterday looking for a way with a certain make, the latest model. He found it a very innocent-looking object, much more easily associated with moonlight rovers than with the ubiquitous bootlegger. Though it seemed a shame to mar the enamel, the deputy extracted a screw-driver from his hip pocket and began a ruthless search into the rear vitals of the machine.

The search was rewarded, richly, by the sight of row after row of liquor, neatly packed. The bottles were of eight-year-old Sunnysbrook and Old Pepper whiskey and Gordon gin, nine cases in all. Probably a case more had been removed since the car made the trip from California.

The license number was in the name of Blaine Smith, but investigation led to the report that the car had recently been sold and transferred to one George Pifer, for whom a warrant was issued, charging unlawful possession of liquor. It was all bonded in 1918.

TOWNLEY'S PLEAS IGNORED

Head of Non-Partisan League Must Appear in Court.

JACKSON, Minn., June 23.—Judge E. C. Dean late today ordered attorneys for A. C. Townley, president of the National Non-Partisan league, to have Townley appear in court by Wednesday noon for his trial on a charge of conspiracy to violate the state disloyalty law.

"It is Mr. Townley's business to be here," said Judge Dean, "and no business is an excuse. No election campaign is an excuse. His bond of \$1000 will not be forfeited if he appears in court Wednesday noon. If it is physically possible for him to do so."

Buffalo to Be Inoculated. HELENA, Mont., June 23.—Inoculation of the entire herd of tame buffalo in Yellowstone park will be made by veterinarians working under the direction of Dr. Rudolph Snyder, in charge of the federal bureau of animal industry of Montana, it was announced today. This will be done to prevent an outbreak of hemorrhagic septicemia.

LIQUOR-LADEN AUTO COMES

Smugglers' Machine Leaves Eugene for Portland Under Escort.

EUGENE, Or., June 23.—(Special.)—Loaded with liquor that had been confiscated at Lakeview, a big automobile, owned by Clyde J. Minas of Canyonville, Or., who was arrested for smuggling over the state line from California, left Eugene today for Portland with F. B. Tichenor, deputy United States marshal in charge, accompanied by Deputy Sheriff I. Vernon of Lakeview, Minas driving the car.

When Minas was arrested the car contained nearly twice as much liquor as it carried while here, but he was compelled to destroy much of it because he could not carry it. Minas is quoted as saying that a large amount of liquor is being taken to Klamath Falls by way of Lakeview on account of the Elks' convention to be held there soon.

STEAMER FARNAM SUNK.

LONDON, June 23.—The American steamer Farnam, from Baltimore, has been sunk by a mine explosion, a dispatch to Lloyd's from Gothenburg reports. The steamship Farnam, sunk by a mine, was a vessel of 3555 gross tons and owned by the United States shipping board. The ship sailed from Baltimore May 15 for Gothenburg with coal.

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
