

STRIKE NEGOTIATION OFTEN INTERRUPTED

Mayor Rolph, San Francisco,
Breaks Second Deadlock.

APPRENTICE PERIOD IRKS

Telephone and Electrical Workers
Still Out, Though Confer-
ences Continuing.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—Efforts to break a second deadlock between the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company and its striking employees in California and Nevada were made by Mayor James Rolph and a special committee of the board of supervisors today. Following the first deadlock Wednesday, Mayor Rolph called representatives of both sides into conference, and concessions by the company reducing the apprenticeship term for girl operators from seven to five years resulted in the reopening of negotiations.

The representatives of the strikers, however, left a conference with the company's representative today when they refused their original demand that the apprenticeship period be reduced to three years, and that a \$4 wage be paid thereafter. The company has granted a \$15 weekly wage effective after five years. The representatives of the workers, after announcing that this was "entirely unsatisfactory," again resumed negotiations with Mayor Rolph.

Representatives of the company said they would concede a three-year period of apprenticeship instead of five years providing the operatives would consent to a reduction in wages already conceded in the compromise offer of the company. This was flatly refused. Evidence of a split between the international officers of the striking unions and the strikers were less apparent today. It being announced that C. C. Dwyer, international vice-president, had decided to suspend his decision to submit the company's latest compromise to a referendum of the affected locals.

200 DOCTORS AT PICNIC

TRIP TAKEN OVER HIGHWAY
TO BONNEVILLE.

Election of Officers This Morning to
Close Session of Oregon State
Medical Association.

Election of officers of the Oregon State Medical Association will take place at this morning's closing session of the annual convention. Nominations were made yesterday.

About 200 doctors made a trip up the Columbia highway to Bonneville yesterday afternoon and enjoyed a picnic and programme of sports and music there. Before they left at noon a luncheon was tendered the visitors by the Portland City and County Medical Association at the Portland hotel.

The morning was taken up principally with a talk by Dr. Charles M. Barbus of this city, who is state president. He reviewed the work of the organization during the past year and recommended certain reconstruction plans. Dr. E. J. Hunsaker of Minneapolis spoke on "Care of the New-Born With Special Reference to the Prematures," and Dr. C. C. Browning of Los Angeles told of some of the physical signs which aid in the differential diagnosis of pulmonary tuberculosis. He said the influenza epidemic caused a large number of cases of tuberculosis to crop out quietly.

ONTARIO ASKS PAVING BIDS

City to Hardsurface Business Streets
and Pave to City Limits.

ONTARIO, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the city council last night calls for bids for three miles of paving were ordered. Under the proposed paving plan Ontario will pave not only its main business streets but will build hard-surfaced arteries to the city limits on the east, north and west to meet the roads which will be built under state supervision into the city when the programme is under way next spring.

Bids for paving are being called for under two conditions. One is for immediate construction, the other for work to commence on March 1, 1920. The decision to start paving was reached following the withdrawal of objections by several property owners, and marks the end of opposition to Ontario's progressive programme of improvements.

DIPLOMAS ARE GIVEN 231

Robert Fry Clark Gives Address Before
Washington Graduates.

BEAVERTON, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—Two hundred and thirty-one graduates from the elementary grades of Washington county received their diplomas at public graduation exercises held in Hillsboro Tuesday.

The address was delivered by Robert Fry Clark, president of Pacific university of Forest Grove. Superintendent John A. Dopp of Forest Grove extended an invitation in behalf of the high schools of the county, for the graduates to continue their schooling at one of the secondary institutions of the county.

Programme features were given by different schools of the county. The Rose Garland drill by girls of the Beaverton schools receiving liberal applause. Superintendent N. A. Frost presented the diplomas.

One Fatal Accident in Week.

SALEM, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—But one fatal accident was reported

during the past week to the industrial accident commission, according to the weekly report published today. Ole Jensen, a Portland shipyard worker, was killed. There were 470 accidents reported during the week, of which 412 were subject to the workmen's compensation act, the others being either from firms which are not subject to the law or have rejected it.

POLICE CHIEF REPLIES

Seattle Official Answers Shipbuilders' Complaint.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—Charging that shipbuilders' industrial union No. 325 is an I. W. W. organization and accusing it of fostering anti-American principles and plotting the overthrow of the United States government, Chief of Police Warren filed answer Friday to the suit of the union to restrain him from closing the organization meeting hall at 717 First avenue.

On receiving Chief Warren's reply Attorney Ralph S. Pierce, representing the union, asked Superior Judge Boyd J. Tallman to postpone the hearing to give him time for filing a denial. The case was postponed until next Wednesday. The suit resulted from closing the union hall by policemen acting under Chief Warren's orders. The union asks the court to bar Warren from interfering with its meetings. This case is regarded as a test of the police power to close I. W. W. meeting places.

OFFICERS MUST EXERCISE

Mounted Men at Camp Lewis to Ride
Hour and a Half Each Day.

TACOMA, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—Under orders issued at Camp Lewis today, officers whose duties in war require them to be mounted, will take exercise on horseback for an hour and a half daily to "maintain their physical proficiency and their knowledge of horsemanship."

This is the first time since the camp was created that such an order has been issued. The course will continue for two months. Lieutenant-Colonel Guy Carleton, of the cavalry, has been assigned as officer in charge. Colonel P. J. Hennessy, infantry and recruited officer, will be instructor of the morning classes and Lieutenant-Colonel Byron L. Barger, camp morale officer, will instruct the afternoon classes.

FUNERAL SET FOR TODAY

Services for Alonzo Perkins to Be
Held at Finley Chapel.

Funeral services for Alonzo Perkins, 32, who died June 24 at the family residence, 5529 Forty-fourth street southeast, will be held at 10 A. M. today in Finley's chapel. Interment will be in Riverside cemetery.

Mr. Perkins was a veteran of the Mexican war. He was born in Waterloo, N. Y., August 26, 1874. He had lived in Oregon 20 years. For 14 years he was county judge in Washington county, Nebraska. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. E. Rogers and Mrs. Fannie Ship, and two sons, Dudley and Charles Perkins, all of Portland.

Portland Manager for Sound Mill.

TACOMA, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—William Irons of Portland has arrived in Tacoma to become manager of the Puget Sound Flouring mills. He succeeds Ralph B. Smith, who came from Portland 27 years ago to assume the same duties and who now resides at his ranch at Edgewood, near Tacoma. Mr. Irons has been sales manager for the Portland flouring mills for the last six years, and prior to that time he was with the Hammond Milling company, Seattle.

Jailbreaker Caught in Act.

SALEM, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—Ned McSherry, recently arrested in California and returned to Salem to answer indictments charging him with issuing worthless checks, attempted to win his liberty from the Marion county jail last night. The prisoner had severed five bars to his cell when he was caught in the act of leaving the jail. Three small saws were found in his possession by Sheriff Needham.

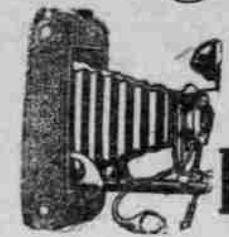

SEATTLE MAY PAY MORE

MAYOR HANSON FAVORS RAIS-
ING CITY HELP'S WAGES.

Board of Public Works Told Em-
ployees Need More Money to
Meet Expenses.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—Mayor Hanson went before the board of public works Friday and asked for an immediate investigation of living costs in Seattle. He declared that 5000 city employees must be given wage in-
creases to meet increased living costs and said he would sign an emergency ordinance appropriating the necessary funds if the council decided to take action.

In his statement before the board of public works Mayor Hanson said: "I have had occasion since my return from the east to investigate the cost of living in the city of Seattle. At the time the armistice was signed we all hoped, and many of us believed, that the cost of living would stop rising and some of us thought it would decline. Instead of that being the case the cost of living in the city of Seattle has increased."

FIREMEN ELECT OFFICERS

John Kenlon of New York Leads
International Association.

KANSAS CITY, June 27.—John Kenlon of New York today was elected president of the International Association of Fire Engineers, in convention here. Other officers elected were John J. Healy, Denver, first vice-president; Frank G. Reynolds, Augusta, Ga., second vice-president; Peter J. Carter, Camden, N. J., treasurer; while James McFall of Philadelphia was elected secretary for the 16th time.

Toronto was selected as the meeting place in 1920.

Contest Over Bank Charter Opens.

SALEM, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—Circuit Judge Bingham has issued a writ of mandamus compelling the state banking board to issue a charter to the proposed Bank of Commerce of St. Johns. The bank applied to the superintendent of banks for a charter which he denied. The bank officials then appealed to the banking board which affirmed the superintendent's decision. Appeal was then taken to the circuit court. Superintendent of Banks Bennett announced an appeal will be taken to the supreme court from the decision handed down by Judge Bingham.

BANDITS HOLD UP NINE

ONE ROBBER KILLED, THREE
MEN WOUNDED IN DUEL.

Desperadoes Get \$43,000 From Mine
Pay Office With Sawed-Off
Shotguns as Weapons.

BENTON, Ill., June 27.—Five robbers held up the offices of the Middle Fork mine, two miles east of here, this afternoon and seriously wounded three employees of the company, escaping with \$43,000.

One of the bandits was shot and killed as he ran from the office. His companions carried the body to a waiting automobile and made their escape. The money was in currency and gold and had been drawn at a Benton bank for the regular semi-monthly pay-day today.

John Dalen, William Devilbiss and an Italian who were assisting Paymaster William Roberts make up pay envelopes were wounded by shots from the bandits.

Late this afternoon the body of the bandit was found in a ravine near West Frankfort. The car had been abandoned. The bandit appeared to be about 19 years old. He was not identified.

A posse of 200 men pursued the bandits and fought a pistol duel at Logan, east of here.

Four of the robbers entered the mine office and immediately began firing sawed-off shotguns.
