

OREGON MEN ARRIVE IN PORT AS CASUALS

Transports Bring Many Soldiers From Overseas.

PORTLAND FIGHTERS BACK

Colonel George A. White Leaves for Home Within Ten Days, After Conference on Legion.

NEW YORK, July 2.—(Special).—Several units with Oregon men arrived up to last night and more are due tonight. Amos West, George A. McPaul and Claude Bristol, all of Portland, were among recent arrivals.

Lieutenant Colonel George A. White, who returned ten days ago from France, will leave New York and Washington in ten days for Portland. He is here on personal business and for a series of conferences with the American Legion heads in co-ordinating the work overseas with that in America.

Colonel White is secretary of the Legion in Europe and director in the general organization. He, with Colonel Roosevelt and several others officers, planned and launched the legion in France early in January before the holding of the first caucus.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., July 2.—The transport Canandaigua landed 3000 of officers and enlisted men here today. BREST, July 2.—During the month of June 177,000 American troops sailed toward France from Brest. This is the record for any month at any port on the Atlantic seaboard of France since the armistice.

POLICE RAID BEER CACHE
Eighty Quarts of Home Brew Seized at Farm.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 2.—(Special).—Eighty quart bottles of home-made beer were seized by officers yesterday afternoon in a raid made upon the ranch of A. Henning, living about one mile from Washougal. The arrest was made by R. L. Wiley and W. W. Lewis, deputy sheriffs, who were assisted by C. K. Cochran, chief of police of Camas.

Henning admitted to the officers having brewed the liquor and explained that it was made by a process of boiling a mixture of hops and syrups from 60 to 80 hours. He said he had been making it for about two years. A quantity of syrup was also found. Henning is the father-in-law of A. V. Conley, who was recently arrested for robbing the bank of Beaverton.

IMMERS MAKE DEMANDS
Montana Unions Want Less Work and Higher Wages.

BUTTE, Mont., July 2.—Demands for a 44-hour week, with \$5 a day for journeymen and \$7 for helpers, has been made of mining companies of this district by unions embraced in the metal trades council, together with the carpenters' union. Double time is asked for overtime and holidays.

Wages increases also have been demanded by crafts included in the international union of mine, mill and smelter workers in Butte, Great Falls and Anaconda. Hoisting engineers ask an increase from \$2.25 to \$3.10 a day, smeltermen and mill men from \$4.50 to \$6 a day, and other crafts ask substantial increases.

WILSON CANDIDATE IN MINNESOTA DEFEATED

District, Heavily Democratic, Elects Republican.

VOTE DEEMED SIGNIFICANT

Richard D. O'Brien, Who Ran on "Stand-by-President" Platform, Receives Only Fourth of Votes.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, July 2.—Republican leaders found a large measure of satisfaction in the result of the election in the fourth Minnesota district yesterday, although Carl Cummins, the regular republican nominee, was not elected.

The successful candidate is Oscar Keller, who ran as an independent republican and contended throughout the campaign that his republicanism was of just as good quality as that of Cummins. The significant feature of the outcome was that in this district, which is heavily democratic, the democratic candidate ran third, the two republican candidates receiving almost three-fourths of all the votes cast. Richard D. O'Brien, the democratic candidate, ran on a "stand-by-Wilson" platform.

Second Lieutenant Thomas J. Yeagan of the air service, convicted by a court-martial at Vancouver barracks, Wash., on several charges, which included failure to pay obligations to the Vancouver barracks and to several other creditors, has escaped from the sentence of dismissal from the service. The president has commuted the sentence to a reprimand and restriction within the limits of the post for one month. Second Lieutenant Frank L. Fink, quartermaster corps, convicted at Camp Lewis on similar charges, escapes from dismissal in the same way.

Representative McArthur of Oregon has been appointed by Speaker Gillett a member of the joint congressional committee which is to confer with the state officials of Massachusetts on the contemplated observance of the 300th anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims at Plymouth Rock.

The United States reclamation service will match funds with the state of Washington on an examination of the lower Snake river irrigation district in Walla Walla and Franklin counties, Washington, which would put water on 130,000 acres. Representative Summers has been advised. The Washington legislature appropriated \$10,000 for a survey and the government will supply the same amount.

Captain Arthur E. Nesbitt, air service, Portland, is directed to come to Washington to report to the director of the air service for new assignment to duty. Colonel William F. Sharp, field artillery, is detailed as assistant military instructor at Oregon Agricultural college, Corvallis.

The officers and 73 men from Oregon and Washington are with the 23d engineers headquarters truck companies which sailed on the Nanamond from Brest for New York on June 28.

COLONEL WILLIS ON LEAVE

Army Officer to Spend Several Months in Northwest.

Colonel Percy Willis, accompanied by Mrs. Willis, has arrived in this city for a visit and will spend the greater part of three months in the northwest on sick leave. Until he entered the army his home was in Salem. Colonel Willis has been brought back from the Philippines when the United States entered the war and was put in training camps in the south, later being promoted to his present rank. For the past year he has been in command at Fort Jackson, New Orleans.

Colonel and Mrs. Willis are guests at the home of the former's brother, Eugene Willis, 463 East Ninth street.

Red Cross Classes Announced.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 2.—Instruction in public welfare work is to be offered throughout eastern Washington by the local Red Cross chapter, it was announced today. Classes are to be conducted in home dietetics, care of the sick and first aid, it was stated.

MINT OIL CROP IS POOLED
VALLEY GROWERS EXPECT TO GET \$8 TO \$10 A POUND.

Price This Year About Double That of 1918 and Big Profit Is Anticipated by All.

EUGENE, Or., July 2.—(Special).—The oil produced by the mint growers of the Willamette valley will be pooled this year, according to decision of the Willamette Valley Mint Growers' association at a meeting held here today.

By pooling it is expected that a price of from \$8 to \$10 a pound will be obtained for the oil this year. It sold for \$4 a pound last year and \$3 a pound during 1917.

Reports made at the meeting today show that 300 acres of mint are being raised in the valley this year, and of this acreage 175 acres are in Lane county. The growers look for a possible average of from 20 to 25 pounds of the oil to the acre, and if it sells at \$10 a pound the income will be over \$300 an acre. E. B. Wallace, of Albany, president of the association, and P. V. Brown, of Harrisburg, and about 20 Lane county growers, were present at the meeting.

PRESIDENCY IS OBJECT
General Wood's Chances Are Being Boosted in Washington.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 2.—A state convention of supporters of Major-General Leonard Wood's candidacy for the republican nomination for the presidency will be held next month, it was announced today by Major Harry Armstrong, chairman of the state Wood for President club.

He said it probably will be held at Walla Walla or Yakima. Representatives from every county in the state are expected to attend, he declared.
