

HUNS PLOT TO BLOW UP FOOD SUPPLIES

Unrest in Germany Takes Revolutionary Turn.

FREIGHT TRAFFIC DELAYED

Berlin Street-Car Strike Spreading to Suburban Lines—Authorities Are on Watch.

BERLIN, July 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—A plot to blow up elevators containing American food shipments has been uncovered at Hamburg, according to the Lokal Anzeiger. Those involved, it was said, were some of the convicts released from the Hamburg jails by mobs during the recent riots there. Authorities learned of the plot through the seamen's union, whose members were approached by the conspirators.

The street-car strike has partly involved the suburban and belt line railroad workers, if not the big industrial plants. The frankness with which the radicals are now demanding a dictatorship by the proletariat is looked upon as significant. In the meantime Gustav Noske, minister of defense, is generally tightening martial law regulations.

The government, while apparently satisfied the present strike movement is purely political and determined to treat it as such, is not underestimating its grave influence upon economic conditions.

The cessation of the city rail traffic has had its influence on the workers of the suburban roads and belt lines, which stopped operating on the ground that the overcrowding of the cars is contrary to public safety.

Berlin's downtown streets today again were jammed with long lines of vehicles, many of early types, which readily brought high fares. Many persons are using bicycles or roller skates.

The most serious phase of the situation is the attempt of the striking rail workers to halt the movement of freight cars, especially those carrying incoming food and coal supplies.

STOCK BROKERS SOUGHT

Two Heads of J. Frank Lilly & Co. Wanted in New York.

NEW YORK, July 2.—Assistant District Attorney Kilroe announced tonight a general alarm had been sent out for the arrest of J. Frank Lilly and Frederick Kent Schiener, members of the stock brokerage firm of J. Frank Lilly & Co., which was thrown into involuntary bankruptcy yesterday after its offices had been raided by detectives and its record seized. Lilly has not been seen at his office since last Saturday.

According to Mr. Kilroe, examination of the company's papers shows the concern had more than 1800 customers, with accounts ranging from \$25 to \$200,000.

VANCOUVER PLANS GAIETIES

Rivet-Driving Contest Will Be Feature of Fourth Exercises.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 2.—(Special.)—Everything is being made ready for the big annual Independence Day celebration. Large crowds from outside the city are expected and preparations are being made to furnish them with accommodations and entertainment.

The feature of the day's sports and entertainments will be the riveting contest for the championship of the

Columbia river. Challenges have been sent to all parts of the northwest and some of the acceptances received indicate that the men who are to uphold Vancouver's honor will have a merry contest. A wire has been received from the president of the Seattle chamber of commerce stating that he would bet a new hat on the Seattle boys, and H. L. Corbett, president of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, has wired as follows:

"You're on; for anything you want to bet."

Neither time nor money are being spared in preparing for the novel contest, and \$450 in prizes has been hung up. The G. M. Standifer Construction corporation is to furnish all forges, fires and tools for the contest, which will be held at the park at 2:30 in the afternoon.

The day's events will start off with a civic and industrial parade at 11 o'clock in the morning, headed by Colonel F. J. Koester. Following this there will be patriotic exercises in the park, followed by sports and music.

SOLDIERS LIKE HUN GIRLS

Will Marriages Be Allowed? Is the Query Propounded.

COBLENZ, July 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—The judge advocate department at army headquarters here was kept busy yesterday with inquiries from various parts of the occupied area as to whether marriages between American soldiers and German girls would be allowed, now that the peace treaty has been signed. More than 140 inquiries were made today by various individuals, including several officers.

A ruling on the question will be made in a few days. The order against fraternizing with Germans still is in force, nominally at least, and will continue probably until Germany ratifies the treaty.

ATTORNEY IS DISBARRED

Wenatchee Lawyer Found Guilty of Retaining Client's Funds.

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 2.—(Special.)—C. Victor Martin, attorney of Wenatchee, was disbarred by order of the supreme court today upon findings of the state board of law examiners. He was accused of retaining \$5000 received in settlement of a lawsuit when acting as attorney for the estate of Mary F. Brisky.

The settlement is said to have been made in 1914, but not discovered by the interested clients until 1916, when it developed in the course of another lawsuit. Martin is charged with refusing to refund the \$5000 he collected and the supreme court sustains the findings.

ESCAPED PRISONER TAKEN

William Brotherton, Wanted at Albany, Captured at Eugene.

EUGENE, Or., July 2.—(Special.)—William Brotherton of Eugene who escaped from the Linn county jail a few days ago, after being locked up for the alleged theft of wool from a warehouse at Albany, was recaptured here this afternoon by Sheriff Fred Stickels soon after he had alighted from the incoming Coos Bay train at the outskirts of the city. He said he had been at Noti, where he had visited friends.

Brotherton was seen by a passenger on the train who knew him. The passenger notified Sheriff Stickels by telephone.

PORTLAND GETS BUREAUS

District Loggers' Headquarters Are to Be Located Here.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 2.—The division office of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, under Captain E. D. Birkholz here, has been done away with, it was announced today, and district headquarters only for the ninth and tenth districts, Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho, will be maintained.

The headquarters for the 11th and 12th districts, Southern Idaho and Southern Oregon, have been removed to Portland because of that city's great accessibility.

NON-PARTISAN HEADS PRO-HUN, IS CHARGE

Former League Employee Says Townley Knocked Loans.

WAR OPPOSED, IS ASSERTION

F. A. Teigan Testified Leaguers at Headquarters With One Exception Wanted U. S. Neutral.

JACKSON, Minn., July 2.—Testifying on cross-examination this afternoon at the trial of A. C. Townley, president of the National Non-Partisan league, and Joseph Gilbert, organizer, Ferdinand A. Teigan, a former league employee, declared after he became connected with the organization in 1916, he came to the conclusion that every man of importance at Non-Partisan league headquarters in St. Paul, with one exception, was opposed to the entrance of the United States in the war. David Paquin was named as the exception.

Teigan testified that of the other men in the St. Paul headquarters he believed Joseph Gilbert was the only one who was not favorable to Germany. "I do not believe that Gilbert was pro-German. I believe his opposition to the war was based on philosophy," Teigan testified.

Attorneys Plan Impeachment

Late today attorneys for the defense announced they expect to offer testimony which they said would be submitted in an effort to impeach testimony of Teigan.

Teigan was cross-examined at length by the defense regarding his views as to the loyalty of a speech which Townley made at Glencoe, Minn., in June, 1917. The witness had testified on direct examination that in the morning before Townley had delivered his speech that he and Townley had discussed the fact that a number of persons of German extraction probably would be in the audience.

Liberty Loans Discouraged

Townley, I believe, intended to discourage interest in the liberty loan and to leave the impression with his audience that the government's financial preparations were not sound," testified Teigan.

"I know what Townley meant when he said these things. My knowledge was based on previous understanding," the witness testified.

Teigan said that he was discharged from the Non-Partisan league in the fall of 1917. He severed relations there when Townley told him "he would have to be sacrificed" because of criticism of Non-Partisan league meetings during the summer of 1917.

Townley told me that he intended to make thoroughly patriotic speeches thereafter," said Teigan. The witness testified he heard part of the address Townley delivered at the Non-Partisan league convention in St. Paul in September, 1917, and that he thought Townley made a loyal address.

MURDERED MAN IS FOUND

Humtuls River Yields Body Riddled With Bullets.

BOQUIAM, Wash., July 2.—(Special.)—The body of an unidentified man, murdered by being shot in the back of the head and three times through the heart, was found this morning in the Humtuls river west of Boquiam, about midway between the Olympic highway and Northern Pacific railway bridges.

The body had been in the water two or three days. The only article remaining in the pockets was a small key, and there is no clue to identify it

except a blurred laundry mark in the clothing. The man apparently was a Greek or Serbian, about 32 years of age, but none of the 100 persons who viewed the body knew him. Tracks of a number 8 shoe led down the trail to a point near the body and then back into the woods.

17 GOLD STARS ON FLAG

Centralia Service Banner Will Be Finished July Fourth.

CENTRALIA, Wash., July 2.—(Special.)—There are 17 gold stars in the city's service flag, which will be demobilized Friday night in the Main-street park as part of Centralia's celebration of July 4. The local boys who gave their lives in the war were: Grant Hodge, Leo Miller, William Brown, Elmer Noble, Ernest Teachnor, Homer Ward, Hober Webster, Henry A. Wolf, Charles Cady, Vernon L. Howe, Orin H. Spink, Albert Cobb, Bertram Boren, Ben Nudd, George Rardin, Jacob Barger and Roy A. White.

At the demobilization exercises Rev. Henry Van Engelen will preside as chairman. The flag will be presented by Paul Uhlmann Jr. on behalf of the Boy Scouts and will be accepted by Mayor T. C. Rogers on behalf of the city.

RANCHERS POISON HOPPERS

Pests Flock to Lemon Juice Mixture; Insects Under Control.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., July 2.—Discovery that grasshoppers which have been lunching successfully on wheat in the Cuyama district, beans in Faxen canyon and fruit in Paso Robles, are fastidious in their tastes, has enabled ranchers to exterminate the pests.

At first a poison mixture of molasses, bran and Paris green was fairly effective, but this was succeeded by an orange juice combination that the hoppers liked even better. Then a Santa Barbara man mixed his poison with lemon juice and the insects fairly flocked to it. The state horticultural commissioner has issued a bulletin urging the use of lemon juice for poison and the hoppers are completely under control.
