

## SIXTEEN SIGN FOR SERVICE IN SIBERIA

Enlistment of 24 Makes Day Biggest Since Armistice.

MANY MEN GET BUTTONS

New Regulations Provide for Only One Battle Clasp for Occupation of Defensive Sector.

"Siberia week" opened with a rush at the Portland army recruiting station, Third and Oak streets, yesterday when 24 recruits were accepted from the 35 men who applied. Sixteen of those enlisting signed up for service in Siberia, or other foreign countries. The day was probably the most successful that the recruiting officers have had since the signing of the armistice. Many of those accepted yesterday had previous experience in the army and wanted to get back. All branches of the service were chosen by the applicants. Three Portland boys were signed up for service in Siberia at the time that they were issued victory buttons.

The supply of victory buttons on hand at the local office is running low and it is expected that they will all be issued by tonight. A new supply has been ordered. They have been going at the rate of 200 a day and a steady stream of men has been flowing into the office from the time of opening.

**Complete Record Is Kept.**  
A complete record must be kept of each man to whom a button is issued, including his name, rank, organization, serial number, home address and other things.

Among those who received the buttons yesterday was Frank Mura, a native Japanese, who served as a sergeant in the 15th artillery. The silver victory buttons, to be given to those wounded in action, have not yet arrived, but they are expected any day. New government regulations concerning the issue of battle clasps were received yesterday.

Battle clasps will be awarded for each of the major operations and for occupation of defensive sectors. Only one defensive sector clasp will be awarded to any individual. To be eligible to receive a battle clasp, the officer or enlisted man must have been actually present, under competent orders, with his organization during its period of engagement.

**Clasp Awards Explained.**  
Each officer or enlisted man serving in the first army area between August 28 and November 11, 1918; or in the second army between October 12 and November 11, 1918, will be entitled to a defensive sector clasp, irrespective of awards for major operations. Each officer or enlisted man serving in the area under French, British, Belgian or Italian command between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, will be entitled to a defensive sector clasp.

Those present in engagements in European Russia since August 1, 1918, or in Siberia since August 15, 1918, will be entitled to defensive sector clasps. Those enlisted yesterday will be sent to Fort McDowell, Vancouver barracks or Camp Lewis. They are:

**CIVIL WAR VETERAN DIES AT CORNELIUS.**

Lewis Stinson Fairchild, 87, a veteran of the civil war, died July 4 at his home in Cornelius, Or. His sister, Mrs. S. S. Deist, died, whom he had not seen in the previous 62 years, was with him when he died. Mr. Fairchild crossed the plains to California from his native state of North Carolina in 1862. Ten years later he enlisted in the union army and served nearly three years at Fort Vancouver. He is survived by his widow and eight children, besides the sister.

## UNION LEADERS FALL OUT

DEFAMATION OF CHARACTER IS CHARGED IN SUIT.

W. E. Carver Accuses W. R. Smith of Referring to Him as "Liar and Fraud."

OREGON CITY, Or., July 7.—(Special.)—As the result of strife in the two paper mill union labor organizations here, a suit has been filed by W. E. Carver, a member of the pulp and sulphite union, and an employee of the Hawley Pulp & Paper Co., against W. R. Smith, representative of the international paper makers' union, for \$15,000 damages for defamation of character.

Carver alleges two causes of action, asking for a judgment of \$5000 in one instance and \$10,000 in another. Smith is accused of calling Carver a "liar, fraud, crook, skunk and thief," and is said to have used these words in the presence of J. G. Williamson, George Williamson, Mrs. Beckman, A. Byron and John Doe Simpson at a labor meeting on June 28, and to have said, "He is everything but a man."

One of Carver's lower limbs is crippled, but he is able to perform manual labor, and was formerly an elevator operator in the Masonic building. After he joined the union, he permitted the use of a pool table, that he owned, at the union headquarters, and some weeks ago he demanded, in the courts, money for the sale of the table, contending that the unions agreed to purchase it.

Along with T. J. McGrath, president of the pulp and sulphite union, he has been antagonistic to Smith and to George Dunmore, who is the business agent of both labor organizations. Smith came here last year from the east, primarily to conduct the affairs of the unions, and has been in the northwest much of the time since.

Rooming House Trouble Aired.  
Counter charges in answer to the suit recently filed in circuit court by Mrs. L. Rasmussen were filed by Mrs. H. M. Gresham yesterday in which she

charges that false representations were made by Mrs. Rasmussen in making the sale of a rooming house and the furnishings at 405 West Park street. Mrs. Gresham asks for a return of \$550 alleged to have been paid. Mrs. Rasmussen in the original suit sought to recover part of the purchase price of the property.

**FIVE HURT IN ACCIDENT**  
Three Automobiles Come to Grief at Start of Week.

Mrs. A. J. Lake, 51 years old, of 244 Benton street; Mrs. B. Beck, 1046 East Lincoln street, and J. A. Baker, 285 Ross street, were injured yesterday by the overturning of Mr. Baker's automobile at Clackamas and Larrabee streets. The machine upset while Mr. Baker was trying to dodge a bakery wagon. Mr. Baker was pinned under the machine. The women were thrown on the pavement. None was injured seriously.

Sadie True, 6 years old, of 149 Lowndes street, was struck by an automobile driven in front of her home by Mr. Fried of Silverton. She is in St. Vincent's hospital with injuries about the head and face, but is expected to recover. The automobile is listed in police records as the property of Mrs. Frances Nelson of Silverton.

Mrs. A. J. Landen, 553 Division street was injured in a collision between her husband's automobile and a car driven by R. A. McGinnis of Tillamook at East Seventh and East Morrison streets.

**DAM SITE TO BE STUDIED**  
Experts Will Decide Irrigation of 100,000 Acres in Oregon.

BEND, Or., July 7.—(Special.)—Geological experts who will determine the possibilities of the Benham Falls reservoir site 10 miles up the Deschutes from Bend, will arrive on July 17, according to a telegram received today by the Bend commercial club from F. E. Weymouth, chief of construction, United States reclamation service.

In the party will be Professor W. O. Crosby, geologist; Homer Hamlin, geologist and engineer; and A. J. Wiley, engineer. On the report of the geologists as to the water-holding qualities of the site will depend government plans for the construction of a dam to store water sufficient for the irrigation of 100,000 acres in central Oregon.

**CHILD'S BODY IS FOUND**  
DROWNING OF ESTHER CHAPMAN CAUSED BY JUMP-OFF.  
Dragging of Oswego Lake Disproves Theory of Girl Being Enticed Away or Kidnaped.

The body of Esther Chapman, 9, adopted daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Chapman, 1022 1/2 Hawthorne avenue, drowned July 4 in Oswego lake, was recovered by a party who dragged the bottom of the lake yesterday under direction of Municipal Grappler Brady. The child evidently had stepped off a ledge into about 10 feet of water while she was wading along the shore. The body was several hundred feet from the spot where the child was last seen. It is believed that she waded along the shore in shallow water, unnoticed by the crowd of bathers. Keeping in the water, she left no scent by which the bloodhounds used in the search could trace her.

The child went to Lake Grove, on the shore of Oswego lake, on a picnic with her family. She asked Mrs. Chapman's permission to go wading with other children. Her sudden disappearance led to fears that she had been enticed away to the woods by an old man seen hanging around the crowd. Later it was suspected that her real parents, or Mrs. Chapman's divorced husband, might have kidnaped her.

The child's real parents are said to live in the middle west. Mrs. Chapman adopted her while the wife of a man named Brande, whose home is in Omaha, Neb. Mr. and Mrs. Chapman have been married a year.

Since the child's disappearance parties under the leadership of Sidney B. Vincent, publicity manager of the Chamber of Commerce, have searched the woods incessantly in an effort to find the body. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 7.—Griffith J. Griffith, a mining expert who was the donor of Griffith park to the city of Los Angeles, is dead at his home here. He was 69 years old.
