CASEALS ARRIVE TODAY—One hundred and forty caseals from Camp Merritt are scheduled to arrive in Portland this morning on their way to Camp Lewis for demobilization. They will be met at Union station by the reception committee and escorted to a hotel, where breakfast will be served. As the trains will leave about noon for Camp Lewis, little entertainment has been arranged for them during their brief stay in Portland. A detachment of 143 caseals from Newport News will also arrive in Portland at 3 o'clock this morning, and will make but a brief stop here. Another detachment of 80 men, and another of 127, from Newport News and Camp Mills, have been en route for Camp Lewis and will arrive here later in the week.

BERRY PICKERS NEEDED—An emergency call for berry pickers was sent to Portland yesterday by H. W. Strong, who is conducting the Red Cotton farm at Graham, Wash. He needs a large number of berry pickers to pick the raspberries, the largest single acreage in this section of the state. In response to advertisement in the Oregonian, enough inquiries to fill his needs for pickers. Through alleged carelessness of a rural mail carrier, however, 12 to 15 of Mr. Strong's answers to inquiries were lost on the roadway, where an employee found them after the recent rain. A shortage of pickers has been the result and Mr. Strong is eager to get into communication with acceptable pickers who will be given tent reservations at once.

DANCE AT ROCK ISLAND TOMORROW—A dance at Rock Island pavilion, will be given by the Portland Transportation club tomorrow night, at 8:45, with the evening dedicated to the club members and their guests, according to announcement made yesterday by the committee in charge. To reach the pavilion take streetcar to Milwaukie and transfer to the ferry, or the steamer, Willamette River, from Stark street dock at 8 o'clock, returning at 11:15 P. M.

CHINESE IS FINED—A fine of \$50 was assessed against Ah Jim in the municipal court yesterday afternoon on a charge of selling Chinese lottery tickets. Ah pleaded not guilty and protested that the police could not read Chinese and therefore could not tell they were lottery tickets. The case of J. K. Takigaki, arrested Tuesday night at his soft drink establishment at 215 Couch street, charged with selling hard cider, was continued indefinitely.

SWISS DIPLOMAT COMING

DR. HANS SULZER PROMOTING TRADE OF HIS COUNTRY.

Ambassador to Address Chamber of Commerce, Visit Local Industries and See Scenery.

On a visit to Portland and Oregon for the promotion of trade relations, Dr. Hans Sulzer, Swiss ambassador to the United States, accompanied by Mrs. Sulzer, will arrive in the city on the evening of July 16 to spend two days in conference with local business men and exporters of the Chamber of Commerce.

Plans for the entertainment of Dr. Sulzer are participated in by the chamber and by the united Swiss societies of Oregon. Next Thursday morning the ambassador will be shown the plant of the Eastern & Western Lumber company, and will pay a visit to Vancouver baracks, where a salute of 12 guns, customary when the minister of a foreign nation visits an American army post, will be fired in his honor.

At noon on Thursday he will speak before the Chamber of Commerce on "Trade Relations Between the Pacific Coast and Switzerland." That afternoon he will be the guest of honor on a motor trip in the vicinity of Portland. The day will conclude with a banquet at Swiss hall, tendered to Dr. Sulzer by the united Swiss societies.

At his own specific request next Friday has been left without engagements for the ambassador in order that he may take the Columbia highway drive and picnic in western fashion at Eagle creek. During their stay in the city Dr. and Mrs. Sulzer will be the guests of President Harry L. Corbett of the Chamber of Commerce.

REALTORS WILL ENTERTAIN

Portland Dealers to Greet Delegates From Puget Sound.

Portland realtors will hold a big get-together luncheon tomorrow at the Benson, when they will entertain as their guests a delegation of realtors from Canada and Puget sound, headed by E. S. Goodwin, president of the Interstate Realty association. In addition to the luncheon, the realtors will hold a convention, which will be held in Victoria July 17-19, the Portlanders will hear the reports of President Paul Murphy of the Portland board of realtors and F. E. Taylor, who have just returned from the convention of the National Association of Real Estate Boards at Atlantic City.

The programme for Friday will serve to top off the campaign now on to make Portland's delegation to Victoria the largest of any in attendance at the big annual gathering.

WATERFRONT WORK STOPS

Permits for Construction Held Up Until Survey Is Made.

Permits for any construction or repairs on Portland's waterfront will be withheld until the conclusion of a survey which was authorized yesterday by the city council, by adoption of a resolution presented by City Commissioner Barbur.

It is considered probable legislation will be enacted by the city council making it necessary to construct fireproof buildings and baring, in the future, all wooden construction at any point along the waterfront of the city.

Under the resolution adopted by unanimous vote of the city council, G. B. Hagar, chief engineer of the dock commission, City Engineer Langgard, Fire Marshal Grenfell and Building Inspector Plummer will make the survey.

Strawberry Pools Closed.

HOOD RIVER, Or., July 9.—(Special.)—The Apple Growers' association has announced the closing of four of its strawberry pools for the season, including all berries harvested up to and including June 15. The following remarkable prices are reported: Pool No. 1, fruit shipped from May 26 to May 23, inclusive, \$4.18 per box; No. 2, May 24 to 26, \$4.21; No. 3, May 27, \$4.12; and No. 4, May 28 to June 15, \$2.54. The balance of the pools on much less than half of the crop will be closed soon.
