Sergeant Ernest Frye, a 196-pound right-handed pitcher, was signed yesterday by the Portland Pacific Coast League baseball club. This is the chap recommended by Hub Pernoll, former Beaver and Detroit Tiger, who is now tilling the soil in the vicinity of Grants Pass, Or.

Judge McCredie, president of the Portland Baseball company, received a telegram from Pernoll on Saturday telling the worthy party went big right off the reel. He is registered from the southern Oregon town.

Where will Portland finish in the scramble for the 1919 pennant in the Pacific Coast baseball league? This is the question which is bothering the rabid ones here. Judge McCredie's opinion of the wise heads is that should Manager McCredie land another capable flinger he may be able to nose Vernon out of second place, but in the event he does not, he will do well to hit the third notch atop ahead of San Francisco and Oakland.

For the first time in the history of the league Portland will finish the season at home. San Francisco will close the present season at Twenty-fourth and Vaughn streets on October 5.

McCredie's pet will feature a six-game series with the Beas at Salt Lake this afternoon. When Ed Herr's proteges were here last the locals took six of the seven.

From Salt Lake the Portland club will journey to Los Angeles to obtain the Seals will be out for the well-known sweet revenge for the five lickings they took out of six starts here. After meeting the Los Angeles team, the Portland prides will come home for three weeks, opening with Oakland.

On the next stand at Recreation park Portland will meet Oakland, Vernon and Los Angeles. Then there are two weeks of traveling on the boards, Sacramento and Vernon forming the opposition with Seattle, Sacramento and San Francisco coming here for the last three weeks of the season.

Billy Sullivan, former catcher for the Chicago White Sox and scout for Detroit, has extended an invitation for the Beavers to journey to Newburg, Or., for a game against his apple pickers on August 15. This date falls on a Monday, and an off-day, and as Billy promises a hot time, the boys will not mind the jaunt. He will gather a club from strictly local talent.

Southpaw George T. Hler is scheduled to join the Beavers at Salt Lake this afternoon. He comes from the northern Minnesota league and will have a thorough tryout.

While by no means dissatisfied with the standing of his club, considering the slow start, Manager McCredie of the Vernon Tigers does not expect to stand pat on the present lineup. He says he is after another catcher. Also he still is endeavoring to put over a deal for Carl Sawyer, who is with Minneapolis. Not only is Sawyer better than an average infielder, but he is a headliner as a sideline humorist, regarded by many as the greatest along that line ever developed. If Boss Bill fails to get him this season he will continue his efforts next winter. The plan is to have Sawyer work with Patty Arbuckle in the movies on the side. Great—the combination of baseball and the movies.

Fans all around the circuit will watch the result of the Los Angeles-Vernon series, which starts tomorrow at Los Angeles. The late start is due to the hop which the Angels had to make from Seattle. If Vernon can take five out of seven it will assist that club greatly in its fight to overcome the big lead held by Killifer.

Chehalls Horsemen Invite Local Entries for Saturday.

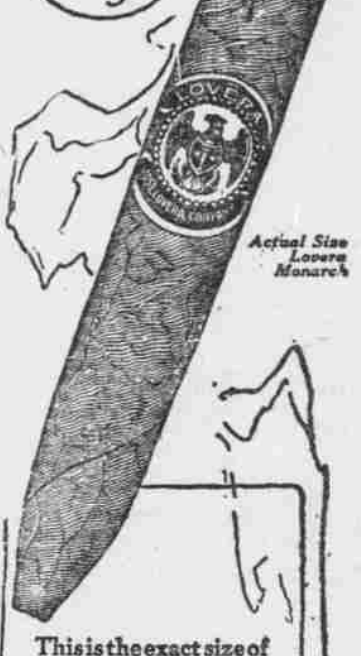
