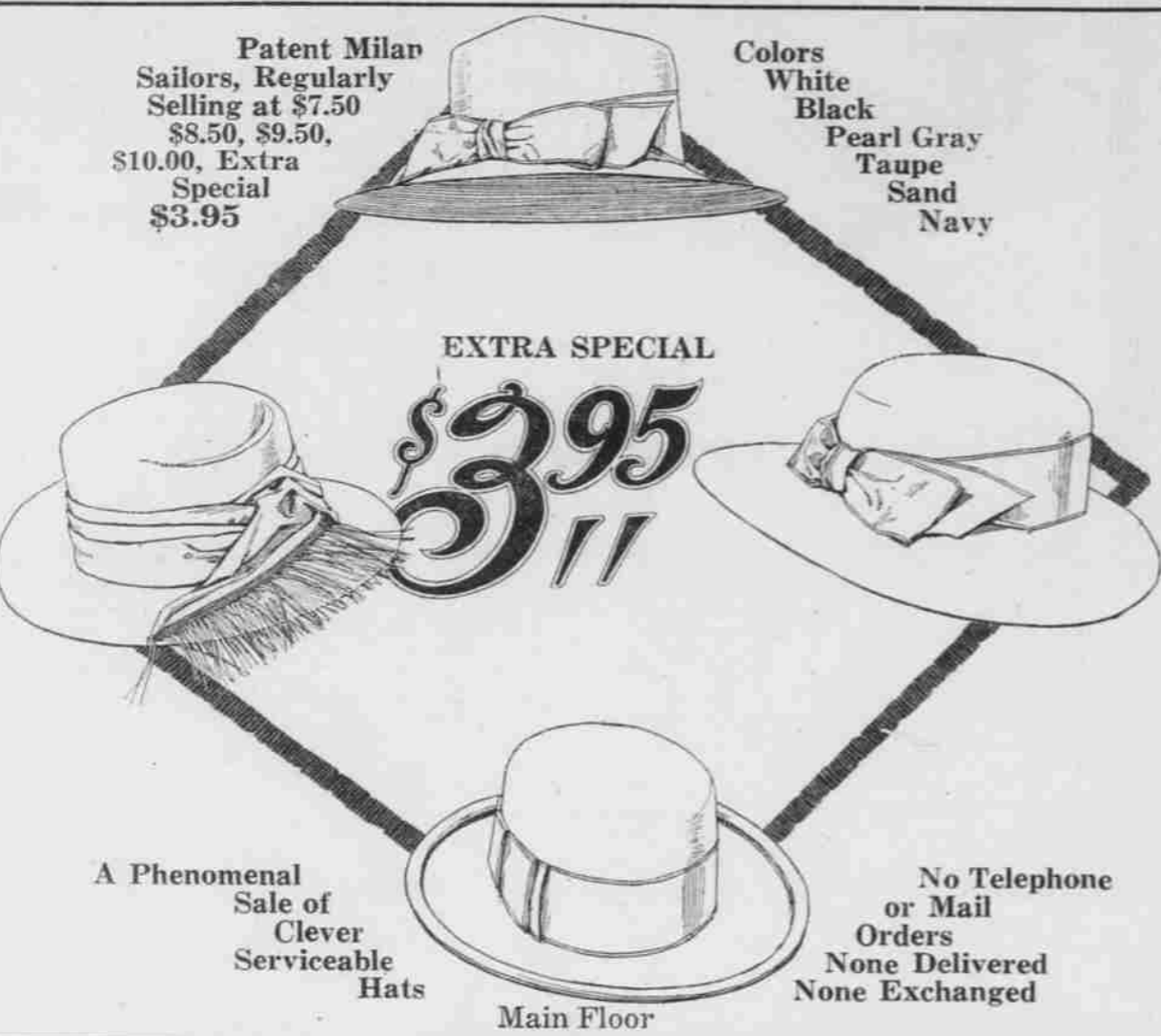

WORLD ROASTS BURLESON

ADMINISTRATION CLAMORS FOR HIS RESIGNATION.

In Address to President Postmaster-General is Characterized as Burden to Democratic Party.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash., July 15.—In an editorial yesterday, addressed to the president, the New York World, leading administration organ, called for the removal of Postmaster-General Burleson. The World calls the president's attention to a complete summing up of the indictment against Mr. Burleson in the postoffice department wire service. The editorial concludes as follows:

"The democratic party ought not to be made to carry this burden. You and not the democratic party are responsible for Mr. Burleson. You can do the party no greater service at this moment than to demand his resignation. Incidentally it may be added that by so doing you will be strengthening yourself and your administration for the great contests upon which you are about to enter.

"It is confidently believed that a way will be found for Mr. Burleson to get out of the cabinet, possibly within the next few days, so as not to hurt his vanity. A democratic member of congress from Oklahoma, who declares himself in possession of inside information, has given out for publication in an Oklahoma paper a statement that Burleson is to be displaced by Attorney-General A. Mitchell Palmer. At the department of justice this afternoon it was said that Mr. Palmer would not consider the place.

LOSERS OF CROP GET JOBS

Montana Dry Land Farmers Go to Nebraska to Work.

GREAT FALLS, Mont., July 15.—(City) 250 dry land farmers from this section of Montana who are needing work because of having lost their crops, a special train will leave Great Falls today for Sidney, Neb., where the men are guaranteed at least 20 days' work at the rate of 50 cents an hour or better.

STOCK PAVILION TO BE SEEN

Business Men Will Go to North Portland at Noon Today.

Promptly at 12:10 o'clock today three special cars chartered by the Pacific International livestock exposition, laden with members of the Portland Ad club, Rotary club, realty board, business club and Progressive Business Men's club, will leave from in front of the Hotel Benson for North Portland to view Portland's largest building, which covers 7 1/2 acres and lays claim to being the biggest and best building of its kind anywhere.

This structure is the new stock show home of the Pacific International livestock exposition, which is now well on its way to completion and which will cost upward of \$25,000 when finished and equipped, on November 1, in time to house the 15th annual show of the Pacific International.

IDAHO COPPER ORE RICH

Company Capitalized at \$10,000,000 to Develop Mines.

BOISE, Idaho, July 15.—(Special.)—Capitalized at \$10,000,000, the Idaho Copper Mining & Smelting company will be formed within a few weeks to develop the vast resources of 63 claims in the Heath mining district, Washington county, according to M. R. Straight, a New York mining man who has been in that section for more than a year quietly buying up claims to be worked by the company.

RATE INCREASE OPPOSED

Montana Commission to Protest at Portland Hearing.

HELENA, Mont., July 15.—Declaring that present rates on perishable freight shipped in heated cars afford carriers in Montana a profit of at least 140 per cent, the Montana railroad commission has protested to the interstate commerce commission against increases ranging from 38 to 54 per cent on this class of business and 60 to 93 1/2 per cent on refrigerator cars. A hearing on the increases asked by the railroads will be conducted at Portland, Or., tomorrow.

CONTRACTOR WINS AWARD

JOHN W. SWEENEY WINS SUIT AGAINST JACKSON COUNTY.

State Supreme Court Denies Rehearing of Case Wherein Extra Payment Is Demanded.

SALEM, Or., July 15.—(Special.)—The Oregon supreme court, in a decision handed down here today, denied a rehearing of the case appealed by Jackson county from a decree in favor of John W. Sweeney by which he was awarded \$82,522.29. The same decree held that the United States National bank of Portland was entitled to a lien on the award to Mr. Sweeney in the amount of \$29,995.50.

MAN KILLS WIFE AND SELF

Ted Ross Runs Amuck in Lewistown Hotel Kitchen.

LEWISTOWN, Mont., July 15.—During the noon hour today, while the dining room was filled with guests, Ted Ross shot and instantly killed his wife in the kitchen of a hotel here, where she was employed as a cook. He then shot and perhaps fatally wounded Edna Hiltner, a 14-year-old girl, and killed himself.
