

OFFICERS BUNGLED, SAYS HULDEKOPF

Harsh Criticism of American Army Command Voiced.

FRENCH OFFICERS QUOTED

Transportation Situation on Battlefront So Bad That It Was Labeled Germans Stopped, Statement.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—American soldiers in France were "so unprepared," said a statement made today by Colonel Hildekopf, formerly adjutant of the 23d Illinois division.

Colonel Hildekopf said he was accompanied by a statement made to him last January 6 by a Colonel Cowan of general headquarters, that the transportation situation on the battlefield was so bad that the American army could not have kept on a month longer and that if the Germans had not stopped, the Americans would have been forced to inspect the 23d division.

STRONG POLISH STATE AIM OF U. S. MISSION

Co-operation by Jews and Poles Held Necessary.

DOOR TO PEACE TO OPEN

Country to Withstand German Intrigues and Bolshevistic Infiltrations. Probe Declared Sincere.

VIENNA, July 14.—(Special cable.)—After going to Vienna from Warsaw to find out what the entente intends to do about the pressing question of Hungary, I encountered on arrival the American commission to Poland on its way from Paris to Warsaw. As I know the importance of the work of this commission can hardly be over-estimated, I took the opportunity to learn their attitude toward the delicate problem they are approaching.

My longest talk was with Henry Morantiau, whom I quote with his permission: "We are going to Poland fully aware of the difficulties of our task," he said. "Intense antagonism has been aroused by the Jews in Poland. Fortunately, our work has been aided in advance by an improved understanding in Paris between the American committee and Mr. Paderewski."

Jewish Problem to Be Studied. "On entering Poland we must be sure, too, that both sides of the controversy understand the object of our mission. We must convince the Poles that we are coming with open minds and with an American sense of justice. We want all the facts and we will report them exactly as they are.

"But we do not want either the Poles or the Jews to think we regard the Jewish problem as the most important part of our mission. That is merely the first subject of inquiry. Our mission cannot be successful unless we can present the whole truth both to the Poles and to the Americans.

"Friction cannot be ended by the work of a few men, but it confidently may be hoped that an unprejudiced commission can put Poland on the way toward a solution. "Means must be found to bring about unity between the Poles and the Jews. I would not wish the Jews, either in America or in Poland, to suppose that we minimize the necessity of probing the trouble to the bottom to effect a radical cure. It will be our purpose to enlighten united interest in America in order that the Poles and Jews may join in making Poland a great power. That is necessary for the peace of the world.
