LONDON, July 15.—The raising of the blockade against Germany will not precipitate any avalanche of goods into that country, according to an official of the allied blockade council, who said today there was no accumulation of goods awaiting the removal of trade barriers. Trade with Scandinavia and Holland will become normal much oarlier than with the associated powers. So far only food is on the way to Germany from the latter countries. One American vessel laden with cotton is en route to Hamburg from New Or-leans, but it is destined for Casecho Slovakia. About 120 employes are on strike


