

WAR LAID TO BEER AND WINE BY FORD

Liquor Makes French and Foe
Suspicious, Belief.

ADVERTISING IS DISCUSSED

Testimony at Tribune Hearing at
Mt. Clemens Shows Manufacturer
Paid Out \$80,000.

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., July 17.—Court had been in session nearly three hours today before Henry Ford, plaintiff in a \$1,000,000 libel suit against the Chicago Daily Tribune, resumed the witness stand.

The opening hours were consumed with testimony by Kirke B. Alexander, and the reading of a magazine article on Mr. Ford by John Reed in 1918.

"The article says you live in a million-dollar house," said Attorney Elliott G. Stevenson, representing the Tribune.

"More than that, I think," he said. "A million and a half."

"Well, I don't really know," said Mr. Ford. "Maybe you don't want to know."

"I told them not to tell me," said Mr. Ford.

"Mr. Reed points you as a very democratic person who loves to sit on a neighbor's back porch and talk. The neighbors don't sit on your back porch, do they? Guards keep them away, don't they?"

An objection was sustained. Mr. Ford said that Reed gathered practically all of the statements in his story elsewhere than from the witness.

Liquor's Effect Discussed.

Mr. Ford opposed the use of alcoholic drink and Mr. Reed pointed out that the Germans thrived on beer and the French on wine.

"Yes, and I think that was one of the causes of the war," said Mr. Ford.

"How," asked the lawyer.

"It made them suspicious of each other."

The reading of the Reed article was interrupted to permit testimony by Kirke B. Alexander, an advertising agent of Detroit.

In December, 1917, he said, he interviewed Mr. Ford at a luncheon in the Ford factory, at which Alfred Lucking, Mr. Ford's attorney, and a man named Smith were present.

Mr. Ford in the course of a general conversation said that "if Germany had not invaded Belgium, France and England would have been at peace."

"I asked him if he thought Germany was ready for peace and he said yes, that the Kaiser was."

On redirect examination it developed that Mr. Alexander handled the Ford advertisement headed "Concerning Preparedness."

"I read it over and noticed that it was signed by Mr. Ford," said the witness. "I went to him to make sure he had read it, and reminded him that by his signature he was accepting full responsibility for the statements."

Mr. Alexander said it cost Mr. Ford \$80,000 to publish "Concerning Preparedness," "Humanity and Sanity" and one other advertisement. Reading of the Reed article was then resumed.

Mr. Stevenson invited attention of the witness to the testimony of Henry A. Wise Wood, who quoted him as stating that he would take down the American flag from his factory, never to go up again.

This was published in the Detroit Free Press in a report of a speech by Mr. Ford.

"Did you read it in the Free Press?" asked the lawyer.

"My attention was called to it," said Mr. Ford. "I did not read it in the Free Press."

"Not that I recall," said Mr. Ford. "And Theodore Delavigne, your publicity man, wrote to Mr. Wood stating that you were grateful for what he had said."

"I don't remember," said Mr. Ford. "He was still under examination at adjournment."

DRIVER BLAMED FOR DEATH

Coquille Man Charged With Manslaughter.

MARSHFIELD, Or., July 17.—(Special.)—L. M. Myers, a resident of Arago district in the Coquille valley, was held in Justice J. J. Stanley's court on a charge of manslaughter as a result of the death of Mrs. Barkdoll, an aged woman who died a week after being injured by a car which overturned when Myers was driving it into Myrtle Point. District Attorney Hill stated that John Barkdoll, a son of the dead woman, preferred the charges and expects to prove the accident was due to the alleged drunken condition of Myers.

Thomas White of Bandon, who also was riding in the car, suffered a double fracture of the arm. Myers was released on a bond of \$1000.

CONTRACTORS FACE FINE

Failure to Apply for Licenses May
Get Some Into Trouble.

SALEM, Or., July 17.—(Special.)—Because of the apparent tardiness of many electrical contractors in Oregon in filing bonds in the sum of \$500 and paying their annual license fee of \$15 State Labor Commissioner Gram announced today that he would begin checking up on the delinquents on August 1. Penalty for failing to comply with the terms of the law carries a maximum fine of \$100.

The act was passed at the last session of the legislature and thus far only \$9 out of 293 contractors known to the commissioner have applied for licenses.

WOMAN, SHOT BY SON, DIES

Bullet, Accidentally Discharged, Goes
Through Wall.

THE DALLES, Or., July 17.—(Special.)—Mrs. Anna Rust, who lived near Sherar's Bridge, was accidentally shot by her son yesterday afternoon and died early this morning. The boy was putting a gun back into place after it had been used to kill hawks. The bullet passed through a wall, striking Mrs. Rust in the forehead.

Detailed information of the tragedy has not been received in The Dalles. It is not known whether a coroner's jury will hold an inquest.

HEAT STORIES IN CONFLICT

One Reporter Picks River Bank and
Another Hottest Spot in Salem.

SALEM, Or., July 17.—(Special.)—Reconciling weather reports in Salem

during the present warm spell is not the task of an amateur, according to those who have been most affected by the torrid atmosphere. Monday the Salem Statesman published a front-page story to the effect that the temperature reached 103. Tuesday afternoon the Capital Journal stated that 95 degrees was the highest temperature recorded for the day.

Mathematicians discovered that the Statesman reporter picked the warmest corner in the city to take the temperature, while the Capital Journal man consulted an official thermometer stationed on the river bank. How to strike a happy medium is the question that is now puzzling the inquisitive public.

Breezes have been prevalent here today and indications are that the hot spell is broken. Farmers say the torrid temperature has proved a benefit rather than an injury in this vicinity.

COLLEGE ADDS TO FUNDS

ALBANY INSTITUTION TO GET
\$15,000 FOR FIVE YEARS.

Citizens to Pledge \$5000 and Synod
of Oregon and Board of Educa-
tion Will Give Equal Sum.

ALBANY, Or., July 17.—(Special.)—The campaign of Albany college to obtain an additional sum of \$15,000 a year for five years for an extension of the work of the college is progressing satisfactorily. Committees are now obtaining pledges for \$5000 per year from Albany citizens for this period and the raising of this amount will assure an equal amount from the synod of the Presbyterian church of Oregon and the general board of education of the church.

Half of the amount to be raised locally has been subscribed and the committees report that the amount will be secured here. There is no time limit on this campaign, but the committees wanted to make a preliminary canvass while the Oregon synod is in session to see if the synod could be assured that Albany will raise its share. From the work already done the committees will assure the synod that the local amount will be subscribed.

This play was proposed to the college by the general board of education of the church which proposed to give \$1 for every \$2 raised in Oregon the next five years. Committees of the synod offered to raise \$5000 a year for five years in other parts of Oregon if Albany people would subscribe an equal amount.

Albany college receives an income from its endowment fund, but the amount now being raised is needed for an extension of the college's work.

For each \$50 subscribed in Albany the donor may give a year's scholarship. So the present campaign will not only afford the college more funds, but will increase the number of students by 100 for next year.

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VETERAN AND NURSE DEAD

James Harper Expires Soon After
Man He Cared For.

FOREST GROVE, Or., July 17.—(Special.)—Two sudden deaths occurred here this morning when Harry Hayward, a civil war veteran, died of heart failure and James Harper, who cared for him last night, suddenly expired.

Mr. Hayward, whose home was in Anaheim, Cal., had been here but a short while. He had no relatives here, but is survived by a son in Wheatridge, Colo.

While seated on the hearth containing Mr. Hayward's body, Mr. Harper was stricken and died in a few minutes. He was a bachelor, aged 63 years, and was born at Gales Creek, Or. He is survived by three brothers, Robert of Salem, Or., William of Deep Creek, Wash., and A. D. Harper of this city.

ROAD WORK BEGINS SOON

Plant to Pave Highway Out of Eugene
Is Being Assembled.

EUGENE, Or., July 17.—(Special.)—The Clark & Henry Construction company will begin the work of paving the Pacific highway between Eugene and Junction City, 13 miles, as soon as the plant to be used here is assembled and get materials and equipment assembled, according to George Clark, manager of the company, who arrived here Tuesday night.

Clark is looking for suitable office rooms down town and will open headquarters in a few days.

Joseph Feinstein Dies at Albany.

ALBANY, Or., July 17.—(Special.)—The funeral of Joseph Feinstein, who died at his home here Tuesday night, was held today at St. Mary's Catholic church in this city and was conducted by Rev. Father Arthur Lane, rector of the parish. Mr. Feinstein had been a resident of Oregon for 29 years. He was born in Germany 85 years ago and came to the United States when a young man. In 1890 he came to Oregon. He is survived by his widow and three children, Mrs. Edward McNeil, Mrs. Frank Albrecht and John Feinstein, all of Albany.

Mining Assistant Picked.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, July 17.—(Special.)—R. E. Wilcox, in charge of the development of copper properties in southeastern Alaska, has been appointed assistant professor of mining in the school of mines at the college. He is a graduate of the University of Washington. Mr. Wilcox has had experience in mining and metallurgical work in Montana, Idaho, British Columbia and northern Alaska.

Standard Oil Pays \$26,789 Tax.

SALEM, Or., July 17.—(Special.)—Standard Oil company today paid to the secretary of state \$26,789.12, covering the tax on gasoline and distillate sold by that concern in Oregon for the month of June. Gasoline sales amounted to 2,577,566 gallons and distillate 282,801 gallons. The money derived from this tax is used in state highway construction.

BRITAIN KEEPS BARS UP

RESTRICTIONS ON FOREIGN
TRADE TO BE CONTINUED.

Limitations to Apply to All Nations
and Are Intended to Restore
British Exchange Rates.

WASHINGTON, July 17.—To protect British exchange in America and other countries where the balance of trade is against England, the British government, in addition to maintaining on the prescribed list of imports a good many articles, has found it advisable to require special licenses in some cases with the purpose of reducing the expenditure of British money for luxuries.

It is learned that in making these additions to the items requiring special licenses for importation, there has been no thought on the part of the British government of discriminating against American trade. On the contrary, the regulations apply to imports from all sources.

Sir Eric Geddes recently informed the British parliament that some special measures would be necessary to protect British exchange and appealed to the patriotism of the British public to curb their expenditures for foreign luxuries.

He, therefore, gave notice that notwithstanding the lifting of the blockade and the practical termination of the war, the British government found it necessary to continue, for the present at least, the regulations restricting importations into the country.

MARSHFIELD, Or., July 17.—(Special.)—Dr. George E. Houck, who left Roseburg at the declaration of war in 1917, returned today from overseas duty, where he won promotion to the rank of major.
