Yonkers, N. Y., Lad Battles Way to Tennis Finals.

YOUTH DEFEATS GRIFFEN

Match for Northwestern Title Scheduled for Saturday on Minneapolis Courts.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 24.—Vincent Richards, 16-year-old sensation of the tennis world, of Yonkers, N. Y., will oppose William Johnston, San Francisco, in the finals of the men's singles of the northwestern tennis tournament at Deep Haven courts tomorrow afternoon.

The feature of the day was the playing of Richards, who defeated Clarence Griffen, San Francisco, after five strenuous sets, 10-8, 4-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4, before one of the largest galleries that has ever witnessed a northwestern tournament. Johnston had an easy time winning today from Joseph J. Armstrong, St. Paul, 6-3, 6-1, 6-2.

The winner of the Richards-Johnston match tomorrow will meet Phil Riggs of Minneapolis, the present champion, for the northwestern title and trophy Saturday.

Tri-State Doubles Exciting. CLEVELAND, July 24.—In the hardest fought tennis game played here this season, Fred Alexander of New York, and S. Howard Voshell of Brooklyn today defeated Charles Carson and Benton of Cleveland, in three straight sets, 8-4, 10-8, 8-6, in the second round of the tri-state sectional doubles tournament. MULTNOMAH CONTESTS AT SELLWOOD POOL ARE CLOSE.

W. F. Backus and Jack Herman Tie for Dry Fly Accuracy Honors. Dr. McFarland Is Winner.

Several exceptionally good scores were turned in last Wednesday night in the regular weekly fly and bait-casting tournament of the Multnomah Anglers' club at the Sellwood pool, with Jack Herman, Walter E. Backus and Dr. E. C. McFarland dividing the honors.

Backus and Herman tied for first place in the 3-ounce distance event with a mark of 34 and 14-15 per cent. With four perfects, Dr. McFarland won the 5-ounce accuracy bait cast, and Jack Herman was second with three perfects. Marvin Hedges won first place among the beginners with two perfects.

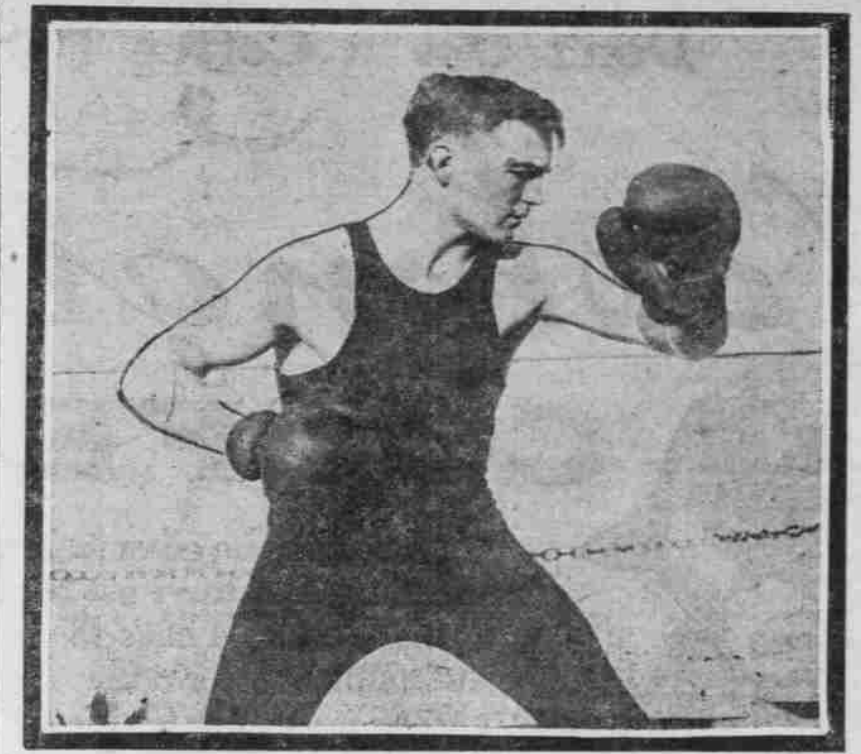

JIM BARNES LEADS WESTERN OPEN PLAY

Tall Englishman Scores Par 70 in Second Round.

WALTER HAGEN RUNNER UP

National Champion Thrills Gallery With Eagle 3s for 455 and 515-Yard Holes.

CLEVELAND, July 24.—Playing a par 70 today, James Barnes increased his lead to four strokes over the nearest competitor for his title in the western open golf championship at Mayfield Country club. Added to yesterday's 69, Barnes had a total of 139 for 26 holes, while Walter Hagen, national champion, was second with 145, having taken 72 today because of pit trouble.

Two strokes away stood Fred McLeod of Washington, D. C., formerly national champion, having scored 74 today on account of poor putting.

Hobob McDonald, Chicago, shared fourth place at 146 with Otto Hackbarth of Cincinnati, the Chicagoan setting a new record of 33 for the second nine and surpassing Hagen, his partner, by one stroke. His 71 was the second best score of the day, tied by J. Douglas of Atlanta.

Hampton Scores 23. Harry Hampton of Richmond, Va., later equaled McDonald's 23 after taking a generous 40 to go out.

McNamara of New York, who had second score at 70 yesterday, got tangled badly today at the start. He came home in 38, registering 147 tonight with J. Douglas, Edgar Eckart and Wilfred Reid of Wilmington.

Others to keep under 150 were Jack Hutchins of Chicago and Willie Kidd of St. Louis, with 148, and Charles Lorma, Toledo, Willie Ogg of Atlanta, and Leo Diegel of Detroit, with 149.

Hagen Shows Form. Aside from Barnes, the gallery showed most interest in Hagen, who after dashing off pars on the first two holes, thrilled the spectators by scoring an eagle three on the 55-yard eighth.

He went over the green with his approach on the 215-yard fifth, and took five, but recouped the loss with a birdie three on the 515-yard sixth and a two on the 145-yard eighth. He closed his drive and holed his birdie on the ninth, where he got embroiled in a forest yesterday, but got down in 18.

Ellsworth Augustus of Cleveland was the only amateur to remain in the race, J. H. Wadley of Texas being off his game.

ANDERSON IS NEAR DEATH

EX-FIGHTER VICTIM OF COMPRESSED AIR MACHINE.

Fellow Employee at Vancouver Is Accused of Using Gun in Attempt at Play.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 24.—(Special.)—Bud Anderson, well known in pugilistic circles and at one time contender for the lightweight championship of the world, lies in a critical condition at the St. Joseph hospital here tonight as the result of injuries sustained when a fellow worker at the G. M. Standifer corporation shipyard turned a compressed air machine on him, apparently with playful intent.

Dr. R. D. Wiswall operated on Anderson today in an effort to save the life of the ex-fighter. The compressed air entered the upper and lower Anderson's body and Anderson is still hovering between life and death.

When the air gun was pointed at him, Anderson collapsed almost immediately and upon being taken to the hospital it was found that the chest of the ex-fighter was badly torn, with a possible abrasion of the lungs.

The fellow employee who is accused of having turned the air machine on Anderson is E. R. Martin. Officials of the company promise a wide investigation, declaring that warnings have been given repeatedly on the danger of attempting to play with the machine.
