# PORTLAND RED CROSS **RANKS WITH HIGHEST**

Earl Kilpatrick Compliments Canteen for Service.

TASK DONE IS PRODIGIOUS

Twenty-Four-Hour Day Maintained by Workers to Assist Men Returning to Homes.

No other Red Cross canteen in the rountry excels the Portland organization in quality of service rendered, in the opinion of Earl Kilpatrick, assistant manager of the northwestern division, who recently wrote to the local officers compilmenting them on the splendid work being done here in carring for all service men who pass through the city. Mr. Kilpatrick wrote as follows to the Portland organization, after he had completed a trip over a large part of the country visiting the Red Cross canteens:

"I saw nothing outside of this division that compared with the canteen services as rendered in this division, and I saw nothing anywhere to excel the quality of service rendered by the Portland canteen."

The extent of the work of the Red

The extent of the work of the Red Cross canteen at the union station is shown by the report of activity for the month of June, announced yesterday by the canteen officers. During the month 1192 meals were served to service men, 1791 services of coffee and doughnuts were made, beds were found for 416 boys and 4464 theater tickets were distributed.

#### Men Want Postal Cards.

The number of postal cards distrib-uted reached the huge total of 19,300. These cards pictured Portland scenes, the highway and the local canteen, and will be an advertising feature of con-siderable value for the city, as they were sent to all points in the United States by the service men. Clearettes States by the service men. Cigarettes distributed during the month totaled 31.800, while candy to the extent of 600 pounds was given away.

In some instances the men are taken sick and have to be specially cared for here, while in other instances hospital trains pass through the city and special attention is given the men during their stay. During June 198 sick men were taken care of by the Red Cross canteen service. In some cases the men were attended at the emergency hospital, while in other cases it was necessary to send them to St. Vincent's for treatment.

M., then six more girls are on duty from 6 P. M. to 11 P. M. A night man has the shift between 11 P. M. and 6:45 A. M., so that the building is never closed. ### **WOUNDED CLASS HAS 5000**

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION FOS-TERED BY FEDERAL BOARD.

Studies Include Dramatics and Sciences, Agriculture and Industrial Trades.

WASHINGTON, July 27.—More than 1000 disabled ex-zervice men are now in training under the direction of the federal board for vocational education. Thirty per cent of those in training are preparing for some trade or industry, 15 per cent are taking commercial courses, 15 per cent are training for a profession, another 15 per cent are studying agriculture in some form and almost as large a percentage of the almost as large a percentage of the men are taking general educational courses, needed for their vocational training to be taken later. A few are in miscellaneous courses. The federal board takes the man just where it finds him and trains him in the most direct

ourse leading to his independence and usefulness.

The personal wishes of the disabled men are given careful consideration in the selection of the proper courses chosen for their re-education. These ambitions are often great surprises to the vocational advisors who are mak-ing contracts with hundreds of these wounded soldiers. A machinist, 34

years old, expressed the astonishing desire to play the piano. It seemed impossible, but he is having his way, and while preparing to earn his living by plano tuning, he is enjoying his association with the coveted instrument.

A young lieutenant, with decided dramatic talent, held an office job before he went overseas, where he lost his eye. He is studying dramatic art and is anticipating a successful career

his eye. He is studying dramatic art and is anticipating a successful career in his profession. A writer, who lost his arm and a mechanic's helper, who lost a leg, are taking agricultural courses, and looking forward to that independence found in the farmer's life. The list of courses in which disabled men are now training includes more than 200 different kinds. Theology, medicine, law, journalism, music and art are among the professions for which they are preparing, while carpentry, plumbing, sign painting, machine shop work, welding, gas engine work, telegwork, welding, gas engine work, telegraphy, talloring, shoe making, printing are only a few of the selected trades and industries. The list also includes all kinds of commercial and agricultural work.

Doing the things they have longed to Joing the thinge they have longed to do means that into the work will go an earnestness and enthusiasm that will result in efficiency and contentment for the disabled men who would other-wise be severely handicapped in their efforts to share in life's industrial

## NEW AERO FIELD OFFERED

LANDING PLACE NEAR INTER-STATE BRIDGE IS PRAISED.

Manager of Columbia Beach Also Promises to Mark Grounds at Night by Signal Lights.

According to pilots of the Oregon oroplane company, by far the best inding field about Portland has been ocated on a sand spit just above the nterstate bridge. The company ac-

Interstate bridge. The company accordingly has taken possession and is making its city flights from there.

This spit is in reality part of Sand Island or Columbia beach, and when the lack of a proper airpiane landing field was called to the attention of J. M. Rieg, manager of the river resort, he wrote a letter which the city commissioners will receive today, offering the field as a permanent landing place for Portland aerial visitors.

The field is covered with a sand as hard as payement and is about 1000 and as pavement and is about 1989 yards long, which aviators consider excellent in view of the fact that there is no obstruction in any direction, making the landing place the equivalent of a 3000-yard field.

Mr. Rieg further offered in his letter properly to designate the small for night




