Recent Law Permits Transfers to

Partial lists of aliens who canceled their first citizenship papers during the war with Germany are being mailed to employers of the northwest by the American Legion, which is urg-ing all business firms to discharge the foreigners and hire ex-service men in their places. Following is a letter which the legion sends with the lists. "Attached you will find a parital list of the names of men who can-celed their first citizenship papers in order to escape service in the recent war with the central powers. The employment committee of the Ameri-can legion Portland post No. 1, is call-ing this list to your attention for the following reasons: The American Le-gion is composed of men honorably discharged from the armed forces of the United States, and called for serv-ice during the recent world war. 
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
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
