

ZEPPELIN BUILDERS HOPE FOR U. S. AID

American Desire for Supremacy Over England Relied on.

FEELERS ALREADY PUT OUT

Financial Backing for Development of Rigid Airships Is Needed. Britain to Perfect Work.

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LONDON, July 29.—(Special Cable.)—With the ratification of peace and the resumption of relations with Germany, there is every possibility that some of the chief Zeppelin engineers and designers will make an effort to reach America and there try to enlist big financial backing for the development of rigid airships in America.

The correspondence of the world learns today that feelers have been put out in this direction. These Zeppelin builders feel that America will make a bid for aerial supremacy over England, and that America, rather than Germany, will offer the greatest opportunity in the construction of rigid airships in the next decade.

Other Reports Unconfirmed.
There have been other reports to the effect that interests in the big steel works in Germany are being obtained financial control of the Zeppelin works, but so far they lack confirmation.

All the indications in this country are that the development and perfection of aerial liners will go forward with persistent energy. This is seen in plans for the voyage of the R-33 for Cairo, whence she may proceed to India.

Use of airplanes in connection with these liners is under serious consideration. Both here and in America it has been found practicable for airships to carry airplanes which may be released in a nose dive at a height of several thousand feet, if the propellers and the engines are started before the release.

R-33 Will Make Trial Run.
There has been a suggestion that the R-33 be thus equipped when she goes to Cairo, and that the airplane will carry the mail. Before the trip is started, the R-33 may make a trial run to Spain and back, while the R-34 will undergo general overhauling at East Fortune, to which place she is expected to fly tomorrow from Pulham where she landed upon her return from Roosevelt field.

A commission representing the allied and associated powers is to go to Germany after the ratification of peace by the three powers, and to inspect there the Zeppelins and other airships, as well as the seaplanes, before their surrender, in accordance with the peace terms. The commission will include two American naval representatives and probably an army expert. It is said the United States will like to obtain one of the Zeppelins. In that case, an American crew will probably take her to the United States.

Brodie, executive committee member of the National Editorial association, which will hold its annual convention in the Pacific northwest next month, leaves tonight for Medford and Ashland for a conference with southern Oregon persons over the excursion of the Northwest Editors' association party to Crater Lake.

Will G. Steel, secretary of the Medford Commercial club, and Lynn D. Mowat, secretary of the Ashland Commercial club, are arranging for the entertainment of nearly 300 editors and their wives in their respective cities and at the lake.

MEDIATOR TRIES AGAIN

Conferences With Striking Miners at Wallace Are Resumed.

WALLACE, Idaho, July 29.—Robert M. McWade, conciliator for the United States department of labor, today renewed conferences here with officials of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers, who have demanded of mine owners of the Coeur d'Alene district wage increases of 50 cents a day, an eight hour day, "from collar to collar," and recognition of their union.

It was expected Mr. McWade would seek to arrange a conference with mine owners of this district later in the week.

SCHOOL HAS \$10,000 FIRE

Horses and Farm Machinery Lost in Blaze at Chelalis.

CHELALIS, Wash., July 29.—(Special.)—The big horse barn at the state training school for boys here was burned at midnight last night. Eleven horses, most of them valuable animals suitable for farm work, were burned to a crisp. There is but one lone colt at the school this morning. The institution also lost practically all its farm machinery. The loss is fixed at fully \$10,000 by Superintendent Horn.

The school now has no horses and no farm equipment, just in the middle of the busiest harvest season.

OIL WELL CAUSES RUSH

Seattle Capitalists Invest Heavily in Beach Property.

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 29.—(Special.)—Approximately \$100,000 has been

invested in Moclips, Sunset and Copalis beach property by Joshua Green and Thomas T. Aldwell, Seattle capitalists, and their associates, buying from Robert Chabot and other beach property owners. Completion of the deal was announced today by Mr. Chabot. Mr. Green is president of the Inland Navigation company. Mr. Aldwell is general manager of the Northwest Power & Manufacturing company.

Oil developments in the beach district occasioned the purchase. The land bought lies within one to two miles of the well now being drilled by the Standard Oil company of California.

The tracts purchased include the major part of the Moclips townsite, 46 acres at Sunset beach and 200 acres at Copalis beach.

WIDOW LOSES DAMAGES

COURT HOLDS HUSBAND WAS TO BLAME FOR ACCIDENT.

Doctor Who Contends He Has Right to Prescribe Liquor If Patient Needs It Learns Differently.

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 29.—(Special.)—Damages cannot be recovered for the death of a wife killed in the same accident with her husband, where the husband is found to have been guilty of contributory negligence, under a decision filed by the supreme court today in a suit brought by Robert Ostheiler, administrator for the estate of Ferdinand H. and Minnie Ostheiler. They were killed by an interurban train near Spokane, the wife dying a moment after her husband's death.

On a combination suit in behalf of both the jury denied damages for the husband on account of negligence, but rendered a verdict for the wife. The supreme court admits the wife's separate claim for injuries after her husband's death for the brief time she survived, but the double tragedy extinguished her chance of recovery and the verdict for her is reversed and dismissed.

In a Seattle case the supreme court sustains the prohibition act and restrains a physician who has been twice convicted of violating its regulations. W. G. Edwards appealed on contention that right of a physician to prescribe what in his judgment a patient required could not be abridged. The supreme court abridges it.

SUDAN LOAN BILL PUSHED

England Would Lend \$25,000,000 to Promote Cotton Cultivation.

LONDON, July 29.—The house of commons last night passed the second reading of the government bill introduced to aid the Sudan to raise a loan of \$5,000,000 for irrigation, railway construction and the development of 300,000 acres of land.

The main purpose of the bill is to promote cotton cultivation in the Sudan and thus render Lancashire less dependent on the United States for cotton.

ATTORNEYS 'MIX' IN TRIAL

Lawyer Strikes County Officer in Face After Lie Is Passed.

OAKLAND, Cal., July 29.—District Attorney Decoto was struck in the face by F. G. Ostrander, of counsel for the defense in the trial of David W. Connelley for alleged bribery, this morning, when Decoto shouted at Ostrander: "You're a liar."

MRS. THOMPSON FOR SUFFRAGE SESSION

Governor Called on to Summon Legislators Speedily.

OREGON DECLARED TARDY

Services of Several Members Are Offered Without Charge If Ratification Is Brought Up.

SALEM, Or., July 29.—(Special.)—Mrs. Alexander Thompson, representative from Wasco county during the 1917 and 1919 sessions of the Oregon legislature, has written a letter to Governor Olcott in which she says she will waive her salary and per diem in the event the executive will call the lawmakers together to ratify the woman's suffrage amendment to the federal constitution.

Mrs. Thompson also urges other legislators to follow her example and mildly takes the governor to task for imposing conditions which she intimates are unfair to the women of Oregon. Her letter follows in part:

"I note that though you do not deem it expedient at this time to incur the expense of a special session of the legislature to ratify the national suffrage amendment, you have made the statement that you will call a special session for this purpose if members will signify their willingness to forego salary and traveling expenses to the capital."

Governor Urged to Act.
"I am writing at this time to volunteer my attendance at my own expense, should you see fit to call this special session, and also to urge upon you the necessity for so doing."

"You take the stand that if Oregon's ratification were necessary to determine the question, you would unhesitatingly call the session. But do you not see that if every governor takes the same view of the matter, no headway will be made?"

"It seems to be highly important and consistent with our progressive spirit, that the states already in the suffrage column should take the lead in this matter. By prompt action on your part we will help to inspire other states and pave the way for the settlement of this question in time for the presidential election in 1920."

Women's War Work Recalled.
"This election promises to be the most momentous in the history of our nation. The women of the country have been a unit in contributing of their time, their money and their labor to prosecute this war to a successful

termination, and now they claim, and very justly too, the right to participate in the rehabilitation of our country. "I am hoping that your well-known spirit of progressiveness will prompt you to make arrangements in the near future for the consummation of this most desirable condition. Let old Oregon lead in this as she leads in every other good movement."

Mrs. Thompson now resides in Portland. Her friends say she would not be averse to making the campaign for United States senator or governor at the next election.

Weeks Favors Session.
Representative George W. Weeks of Marion county called on the governor today and expressed himself in favor of a special session.

John W. Cochran, chief clerk of the senate during the last four sessions of the state legislature, today volunteered to handle the affairs of that position gratis if Governor Olcott calls the lawmakers together to ratify the woman's suffrage amendment to the federal constitution.

Mr. Cochran has had much experience in legislative matters in Oregon and was secretary of the republican state central committee during the last campaign. He has expressed himself in favor of a special session of the legislature to ratify the woman's suffrage amendment to the federal constitution.

Hood River Fruitgrowers Find Hours Too Long.

HOOD RIVER, Or., July 29.—(Special.)—The daylight-saving law, which few supporters among Hood River orchardists, fruitgrowers, even those who support President Wilson and the administration on all other matters, expressed criticism of his vote of the agricultural appropriation bill because it carried a rider repealing the daylight-saving law.

"I am against the daylight-saving bill and so is every other orchardist with whom I have talked," says R. E. Scott, former secretary of the Commercial club and owner of an east side orchard. "We were all willing to work by it during war time, but it has grown too much for us. As a result of it, the farmers are working themselves to death."

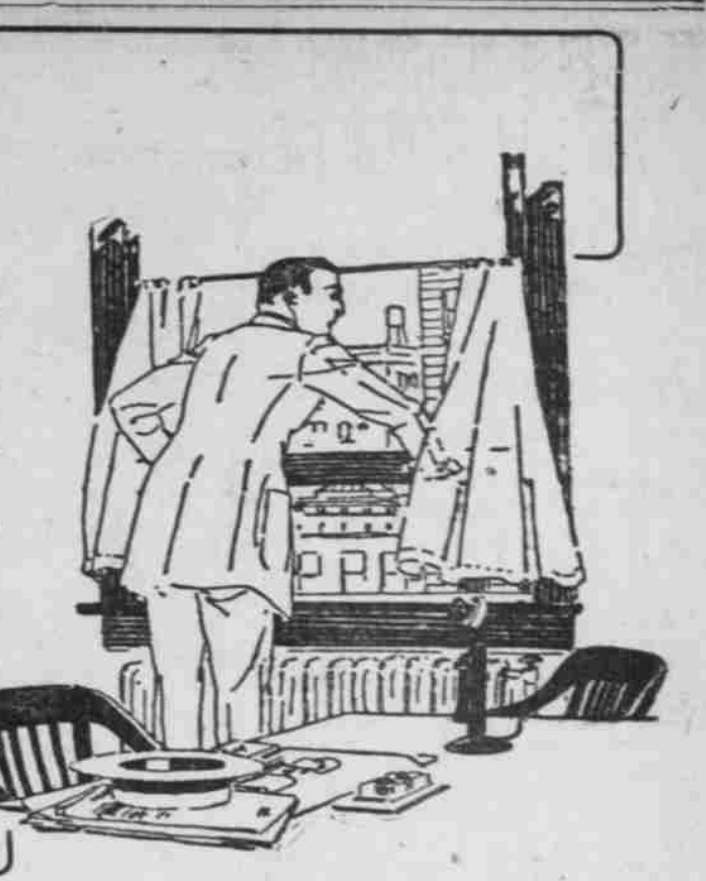

JAPANESE ARE DEFENDED

SEATTLE BROKER REPLIES TO STATEMENT OF VETERAN.

C. W. Antill Says Returned Army Men Decline to Work on Farms, as Do Japanese.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 29.—(Special.)—Replying to the demand of Miller Freeman, secretary of the State Veterans' Welfare commission, that Japanese be deported from the United States, C. W. Antill, broker, who handles many of the transactions whereby Japanese obtain leases on hotels and apartment houses, issued a statement in behalf of the Japanese.

"The money the Japanese use in their transactions in this country is not government money, but is obtained from these mutual associations," Mr. Antill declared. "Freeman said the Japanese are crowding the returned soldiers out of a chance to get a new start," he continued. "The returned man won't go out on the farm and work like the Japanese are doing."

Antill was backed up in his statement by F. J. Sasaki, representing the

United States Investment company, 216 Fifth avenue south. He denies Freeman's statement that all marriages between whites and Japanese are failures. He married a white woman, he declared, and they had lived happily together until she died a year ago, leaving him with one child.

"The Japanese pay more money to their employees than the whites," Mr. Antill went on to say. "In the Diller hotel, for instance, the whites paid only \$50 a month and the Japanese pay them \$100 a month. They also make satisfactory tenants. According to the owner of the Cascade hotel, the Japanese tenants there are very satisfactory. They keep the house up better than the whites."

"The Japanese are really to be credited, rather than discredited."
