Fullz, president of the International league and spokes-man for the minor associations, stated today: "We are not going to lose the fruits of the arrangement made last winter simply because the majors now find that they made a bad bargain." Fultz, in a prepared statement, out-lined the case of the minor baseball leagues in part as follows: "Although the minor leagues of pro-fessional baseball have been the great developers of playing talent, they have

developers of playing talent, they have never received the financial reward which their important position in the baseball world would justify. AMERICANS SPLIT HONORS Request for Higher Price Denied.

"This condition was unquestionably brought about to a large extent by the draft rule, which permitted the major leagues arbitrarily to take from each minor league club at the end of each season one or more of its players at stated prices for each classification. "In an endeavor to leasen the burden of this unfair rule, the minor leagues, at a meeting in New York, January 16, 1919, requested a revision upward of the draft prices, placing that for AA player at \$7500.
