NEW POST ASSUMED TODAY

Well-Known Official Takes Charge of Work in First Portland District After Long Absence.

Colonel J. B. Cavanaugh, corps of engineers, U. S. A., whose last work in the northwest was the formation of the 18th regiment of engineers early in the war, with which he went abroad, returned yesterday as engineer in charge of the First Portland district and will assume his duties today, when the transfer is made by Colonel George A. Zinn, division engineer.

SHIPS SAIL WITH 1918 FLOUR

GORN MARKET TAKES LEAP

Reduction of \$1 a Barrel in Flour. Less Than Expected, Has Bullish Effect.

CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—An instantaneous upward jump of 4 1/2 cents to 95 cents a bushel was the response of the very market today to the announcement that the government would maintain the guaranteed price of wheat. The highest price of the corn market was in the principal trading delivery, December, which soared 10 cents to \$1.25.
