

MINERAL LAND LEASE BILL REPORT READY

Measure Virtually Same as
One That Failed.

PRODUCTION TO BE AIDED

Early Consideration to Be Given
Matter Now in Hands of
Senate Committee.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Favorable report on the bill for the leasing of government-owned oil, coal, phosphate and sodium lands for the purpose of stimulating production was decided today by the senate public lands committee. The vote was unanimous.

The bill virtually is the same as that passed by both houses of the last congress, but which failed because the senate did not adopt the conference report.

Under the bill an oil prospector would receive title to one-fourth of the acreage allotted him under his prospecting permit at a fixed royalty of 5 per cent and a preference right to lease the other three-fourths at a royalty to be fixed by the secretary of the interior, but at not less than one-eighth of gross production.

Bids Asked in Producing Fields.
Oil lands within producing fields would be leased in plots of 540 acres at a royalty of not less than one-eighth or more than one-fourth of the oil produced. Issuance of the lease would be by competitive bidding, however.

Prospectors would be able to lease a maximum of 2560 acres of coal land on a basis of from \$5 to 20 cents a ton, but provisions authorizing the sale of coal lands were eliminated. Alaska coal land is not affected.

Royalties for the leasing of phosphate lands would be 2 per cent on the gross value of output and for sodium lands it would be one-eighth of the value of the output.

It is proposed that 45 per cent of the royalties received under the bill shall be paid to the states in which the government land is located; 45 per cent to the reclamation fund and 10 per cent to the federal treasury.

Development in Reserves.
Included in the bill were provisions by which persons having lawful claims to oil lands in the naval reserves in California and Wyoming, over which there have been litigation, can proceed with their development.

These provisions are identical with those contained in the bill before the last congress. Chairman Smoot said, Senator Smoot announced that the bill would be formally reported when the senate reconvenes next Friday with a view to early consideration.

PRINCE WILL VISIT COAST

CANADIAN TOUR TO TAKE HEIR
TO BRITISH COLUMBIA.

King's Son Spends Busy Day Going
Over Ground His Grandfather
Covered 60 Years Ago.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 13.—No decision has yet been reached as to the date or length of the visit of the prince of Wales to the United States. It was said here today. He is not expected to go there until the close of his Canadian tour, which will take him as far west as British Columbia.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Aug. 13.—The shores of Quidiuidi lake, two miles from the city, were thronged with enthusiastic Newfoundlanders today when the prince of Wales, on his official visit to this colony, went to the lake for the annual regatta.

After a programme which kept him up until long after midnight yesterday, the prince slept at Government House in the room occupied in 1859 by his grandfather, the late King Edward VII, when as prince of Wales he visited Newfoundland. Early this morning the prince went aboard the British cruiser Dramon for breakfast and at 10 o'clock made his second official landing in this city. A crowd greeted him, repeating the enthusiastic welcome of yesterday. In watching the regatta the prince was once again following in the footsteps of his grandfather, who was the guest of honor at a similar event 60 years ago.

The racing programme occupied the entire day, but the prince was restricted to a two-hour visit, as he was to leave the city at noon to re-embark on the battle cruiser Renown, awaiting him at Conception Bay, and proceed to St. John's, N. B., to begin his visit to Canada.

MESSENGERS, BONDS GO

TWO BROKERAGE FIRMS IN NEW
YORK ARE LOSERS.

Liberty and Victory Notes Fail to
Reach Destination; Police
Set at Work.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—Liberty bonds valued at \$225,000 were stolen yesterday from two brokerage firms in the financial district here, it was learned at police headquarters today. The stolen bonds in each instance had been entrusted to messengers who have disappeared.

Richard Whitney & Co. were the victims of the larger theft. This firm dispatched a messenger with \$175,000 worth of bonds to the offices of Kidder, Peabody & Co., brokers across the street from the Whitney offices. The bonds consisted mostly of Liberty notes, although among them were some of the earlier issues. The messenger, a boy, did not deliver the bonds and the police tonight were searching for him. The other theft was from Simmons & Slade, whose losses totaled \$45,000 in Liberty bonds of the second issue. They were stolen under circumstances similar to those under which the bonds of Whitney & Co. were taken.

to deal particularly with questions arising out of the peace settlement.

Permanent Acceptance Desired.
Commander Kenworthy asked why Lord Grey was not appointed permanently. In reply Mr. Bonar Law said that the government would be only too glad if Lord Grey would accept a permanent post, but that everyone who knew of the former foreign secretary's

disabilities would share in the satisfaction over his present action.

Viscount Grey of Fallodon (Sir Edward Grey) comes to the United States to represent the British government after a brilliant career as head of the British foreign office. For 11 years prominent in the political affairs of Europe, he was secretary of state for foreign affairs from December 11, 1905, to December 21, 1916.

On several occasions it was the initiative of Sir Edward Grey that caused the gathering clouds of war to disappear.

Gladstone, under whom Sir Edward served in his younger days, described him thus:

"I never knew in a man such aptitude for political life and such disinclination for it."

Since his retirement from the foreign office, Viscount Grey has been living in Northumberland. The new ambassador's eyes began to trouble him in 1915, and at one time it was reported he was blind. This report was erroneous.

Successor to Lord Reading.
The ambassadorial post at Washington has been vacant since the departure last spring of the Earl of Reading, who has resumed his office as lord chief justice of England.

A liberal in politics, Viscount Grey was in the house of commons from 1881 to 1914. From 1891 to 1895, he was under secretary of state for foreign affairs under the Earl of Rosebery.

The new British representative was born April 25, 1862, and succeeded to the baronetcy on the death of his grandfather in 1882, his father, Captain George Henry Grey, having died previously.

Viscount Grey has always supported the idea of a league of nations.

FASTER PLANES ASSIGNED

Curtiss Machines to Be Replaced by
DeHavillands for Patrol.

SALBOM, Or., Aug. 13.—(Special.)—One of the Curtiss planes assigned to the Oregon forest fire patrol service, left here this morning for Roseburg with Major Albert D. Smith and Lieutenant A. Goodrich in charge. This makes three planes placed at the disposal of the state and federal forestry officials for operation out of the southern Oregon city. The other five planes in the fleet will be retained at the Salem base.

Telegrams received here the past 24 hours indicate that the planes now in use here will be replaced by DeHavilland craft within the next week, or at least as soon as the Curtiss machines can be returned to Mather field. The larger craft are capable of carrying two persons and can develop a speed of between 120 and 125 miles an hour. The pilots now in charge of the Curtiss planes will drive the DeHavilland machines from Mather field to this city.

PAGEANT PLANS FINISHED

DISRESSED NATIONS APPEAL TO AMERICA

Will U. S. Deliver Them? Cry of
Near-Eastern Peoples.

OTHER POWERS DISTRICTED

British Supremacy in Levant Feared
and Purposes of France and
Italy Alike Are Suspected.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 12.—(By Courier.)—The little nations which make up what used to be the Ottoman empire are all acclaiming America as their deliverer. Even the Turks themselves see opportunity for a new life somewhere for the purely Turkish people, freed from the task of governing other nations, to which they have proved unequal. Armenia, Syria, Kurdistan, Mesopotamia, all are crying out to America. They want us to help them on to the new life of freedom which we have pictured as the war's end. They are sick of the intrigues and exploitation of the European nations. They trust America, and only America.

Now a new note is being struck into their voices. I have heard it from the lips of princes and professors and peasants and other patriots of many positions. They are asking whether America is going to lend herself to the policies and schemes of the other nations, so that she will no longer stand for the ideals which have been her distinctive boon to the world.

Betrayal of Trust Charged.
In the case of Egypt, America betrayed a trustful people at the behest of British policy. Will her alliance with France cause her to do the same to the Syrians of the Holy Land? Is America so closely leagued with Britain that she will condone the rape of Adalia and the purely Turkish hinterland? Have we become so involved with engagements in Paris that the horrible massacre of surrendered Turks at Smyrna by the Greeks calls forth no protest from us? Will the United States see Mesopotamia taken over, despite all pledges, by the British, without any semblance of local government, and with patriots being deported or otherwise punished, all that British business interests may possess without competition the cotton, oil and wheat which the region produces?

Covenant of Strife Feared.
Will America now abandon her historic and oft-declared principles in order that our allies may, unchallenged, revert to pre-war policies of imperialism and aggrandizement and exploitation? Is the league of nations to be a covenant of concession, compromise and cynical expediency, within which America is to be enmeshed and alienated forever as the voice of humanity in behalf of the weak and the oppressed? If so, it will be a covenant not of peace but of inevitable strife; of selfishness and not of brotherhood; of death and not of life.

If other nations are unwilling to adopt in real sincerity the principles of the United States to which they formally subscribed—principles which alone can assure the concord and welfare of humanity, then America must stand singular and apart as the exponent and defender of those standards. For their reality and maintenance is more essential to the world than is the existence of a league of nations. And unless she sells her soul, our country is obligated to support to the uttermost, even though she do so alone, those ideals which are summarized in the 14 points and addresses of President Wilson.

GERMANS STILL MILITANT
BILLIONS REPORTED BEING EXPENDED ON ARMY.
Maintenance of Voluntary Troops on War Footing Held to Be Open Declaration of War Purpose.

BERLIN, Aug. 13.—(Special Cable.)—Headlined "Where's the demobilization?" Freiheit features charges from an alleged well-informed military source that billions of public funds are still squandered on the maintenance of the German army on a war footing, while, far from demobilizing, high pressure recruiting continues. Freiheit asks:

"Why all this sabre-rattling still? What do we need the highest leadership now for? What war plans still are being worked out? Why are our staffs engaged in beating non-existent enemy? Or is the highest leadership merely being held in readiness to last night's war?"

"With how many autos and personnel is the highest leadership still equipped? What belittling burdens does it still impose on the nation?"

"To master this great strategic work there is in addition an army high command in the north and an army high command in the south. These, too, are natural in a war footing. But our staffs, too, have far more than the number of officers necessary. Recruiting bureaus of the smallest kind are still in the fullest activity."

"Volunteer troops maintained on a war footing are an open declaration of war against the peaceable working population. It is high time this one-sided emphasis of the state of war be ended by demobilization."

TINOCO QUILTS COSTA RICA

PRESIDENT NOT RECOGNIZED BY UNITED STATES.
Early Break-Up of Revolutionary Government Is Expected at Washington.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—President Tinoco has left Costa Rica. This information reached the state department today, but details have not yet been received.

Information that Tinoco had asked permission of the congress to leave the country was received here some time ago.

There was no indication whether the president quit the country before his brother, Joaquin Tinoco, vice-president of the republic, was assassinated on August 10.

The removal of Tinoco was accepted by the state department as further indication of the early breaking up of the present government, which President Wilson has refused to recognize, because it was created by the forcible overthrow of the constituted authorities.

SERBIA LAND OF ORPHANS

Two Hundred Thousand Persons in Country Lose Parents.

BELGRADE, Aug. 13.—(By the Associated Press.)—The war has made Serbia a country of orphans. There are 200,000 persons who lost both their parents and 300,000 more who lost one parent, according to statistics compiled by the American Red Cross workers from records in the Serbian educational department.

Some towns of 10,000 inhabitants have between 2000 and 3000 orphans.

BREWERS STILL HOPEFUL

Conference to Be Held to Stimulate Anti-Dry Feeling.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 13.—Believing that a revulsion of feeling against prohibition can be concentrated for a repeal of the liquor statutes, the brewers of the nation have called a big conference here.
