VETERAN FLYERS PASS THROUGH CITY

With the 42 casualties who came through Portland yesterday afternoon in charge of Lieutenant J. T. Wilson of Seattle were a number of flyers who have flown in Germany many times and who saw much service on the Rhine. Three other officers were with the men, Lieutenant E. E. Smithson of Ellensburg, Wash., Lieutenant Thayer of Portland and Lieutenant Seale, a doctor from Missoula, Mont.

STATE EXCHANGE RIGHTS UPHOLD

The state exchange, co-operative store operated by the Central Labor Council, in property incorporated and in exercise of such franchises and privileges as are conferred by law, decided Circuit Judge Kavanaugh yesterday in a reversed returned in a trial case instituted by District Attorney Evans last week. Judge Hill was expected to demand his return to that city, as he is said to have escaped from the penitentiary there some months ago, but a telegram was received by Sheriff Hurlburt yesterday from Joliet waiving claim to the prisoner.

CHURCH FILES PLANS

Plans for the building to be erected on Ivy street by the congregation of Trinity Lutheran church at a cost of \$25,000 were filed yesterday for checking. The Viek Bros. warehouse plans for a \$40,000 building at 244 East Madison street, also have been filed, together with those for the \$10,000 garage contemplated by J. C. Cahalan at 499 Stark street and J. M. Jlowinski at 1122 Crocker street.

SHOW TO DRAW BOOSTERS

WASHINGTON STATE TO ORGANIZE EXCURSIONS.
Memorials to Late Governors Withcombe and Lister to be Unveiled at Livestock Exposition.

A special train carrying Governor Hart of Washington and several hundred boosters from Seattle, Tacoma and vicinities will come to Portland for the opening day of the Pacific International Livestock exposition's ninth annual stock show on November 17, according to reports brought back yesterday by General Manager Plummer of the stock show organization. The two-day convention of Washington bankers at Paradise valley.

Following a general discussion on the best method of showing the interest and co-operative spirit of the Washington body in the approaching event at Portland, it was agreed that a Pacific International Livestock exposition-day celebration should be held at Seattle on October 27. At this time the Sound-city boosters will organize an excursion by special train to bring many hundreds of business men, bankers and boosters from Seattle, Tacoma and way points to Portland for the opening day of the dedication of the Pacific International's new \$250,000 building. Mr. Plummer, vice-president E. G. Crawford of the United States National Bank and several other livestock enthusiasts of Portland will go to Seattle for Pacific International day.

YOUNG VETERAN RETURNS

CLIFFORD HURLBURT, IN ARMY AT 15, WEARS RIBBON.

With three gold chevrons on his sleeve and wearing the victor's campaign ribbon with a star for participation in the St. Mihiel drive, Clifford Hurlburt, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Hurlburt, 625 East Salmon street, one of the youngest volunteers in the war, passed through Portland yesterday on his way to Camp Lewis, where he will be discharged from the army. Three days after America's declaration of war against Germany, Hurlburt joined the 162d infantry, which later became the 162d infantry, 41st division. At the time he enlisted he was a little more than 15 years old. He sailed from New York on the France December 12, 1917, and was transferred upon his arrival to the ammunition train of the Ninth corps, last army, with which he served for 18 months.

HOLLADAY SCHOOL SAVED FROM FIRE

The fire started from a blow torch which painters were using on the roof of the building. 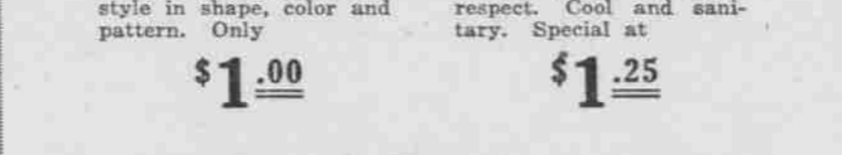
