

BRITAIN'S CHARGED
WITH SEIZING EGYPTTemporary Occupation Be-
comes Permanent.

INDEPENDENCE TAKEN AWAY

Country Desires to Place Its Woes
Before League of Nations—Held
Not Internal Question.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—In a brief filed today with the foreign relations committee of the United States senate, Joseph W. Polk, formerly governor of Missouri, counsel for the Egyptian commission, charges that England, under the guise of a protectorate over Egypt, practically has seized that country as a British possession, that "in the annex to the peace treaty the status of Egypt would be made an internal question" and beyond the jurisdiction of the council of the league of nations, which council the Egyptians desire to pass upon the status of Egypt.

The document sets forth that the original occupation of Egypt by British troops beginning in 1882 was claimed by the British government to be merely temporary for the purpose of suppressing "rebellious" and "collecting" debts due to Europeans. The British government, says Mr. Polk, pledged Egypt and the world this occupation would be only temporary.

Killing of Natives Alleged.
After giving a resume of the political history of modern Egypt and the "alleged wrongs done in that country to enforce British rule in the last several decades," the brief recites the story of "the killing of 800 and the wounding of 1600 Egyptian natives last April in the streets of their cities while holding demonstrations for freedom under the self-determination clauses of the peace treaty."

Mr. Polk, who was formerly solicitor for the state department and who now represents the commission which was named by the legislative assembly of Egypt, a majority of whom were elected by the people, he says, calls attention to the fact that Egyptian troops numbering 1,000,000, "fought on the side of the allies to make, as they believed, the world safe for democracy" and for the right of national self-determination for all peoples.

Egypt, before the war, he says, was independent for all practical purposes, though under the nominal sovereignty of Turkey and subject to an international tribute to Turkey. On December 18, 1914, it is said Great Britain removed the ruler of Egypt and appointed Prince Hussein as "sultan," ostensibly as a war measure and assumed by the Egyptians to be such.

Egyptian Commission Interned.
When the time came for making peace, Mr. Polk observes, "the Egyptian people naturally concluded that since, under the league of nations, they would be preserved from external aggression, the protectorate of Great Britain would be removed. But they were doomed to disappointment."

The Egyptian legislative assembly commissioned Mr. Polk to present to the country's claims, it is charged, was "interned by order of the British government upon reaching Malta." Released from the internment of General Allenby, it is said, it reached Paris "only to find with amazement that a recognition of the British protectorate over Egypt had been written into the treaty."

PENITENTIARY HAS BLAZE

Fire Result of Spontaneous Combustion Causes \$3500 Damage.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 18.—(Special.)—Fire from spontaneous combustion broke out this morning in a building used for a penitentiary in Idaho State penitentiary and destroyed it, together with about 80 cords of wood and caused damage to dynamo, boilers and engines in the building.

The total damage is estimated at \$3500. The power plant was gutted, only the side walls of concrete blocks remaining.

Salvador Bars Hondurans.

SAN SALVADOR, Aug. 18.—The Salvadoran board of health has prohibited passenger traffic into Salvador from the Honduran ports of San Lorenzo and Amapala, owing to the prevalence of yellow fever in these ports.

UNIVERSITY LACKS ROOM

EXPECTED STUDENTS AT OREGON WILL TAX FACILITIES.

Women's Building Will Not Be Completed Before Spring Term Opens. Army Barracks to Be Utilized.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Aug. 18.—(Special.)—The problem facing the university authorities at present is that of room for the students, who will begin to crowd the halls September 27, when the freshmen will take the examination in English composition required of all entering as first year students. Monday, September 23, the freshmen belonging to the upper division, those of the junior and senior classes, will pay their registration fees, and Tuesday, September 24, the freshmen and sophomores will register. Wednesday, October 1, class work begins.

Though the contract for the erection of the women's building has been let, that building will not be completed before the spring term opens, and meantime the university will have to get along as best it can with crowded class rooms. The plan at present is to have all the military work carried on in the barracks erected for the students army training corps last year. Though practically all departments will be crowded, the schools of Journalism and Commerce will suffer most for lack of room. Dean D. W. Morton plans to use his office for a class room, and Dean Eric W. Allen of the school of Journalism, has found that his classes have outgrown his office, which he has used for a class room for several years.

Though the living accommodations will also be taxed to their limit during the coming year, the university authorities feel that they can handle the situation, because near the campus are a number of large dwelling houses which can be used if necessary.

The addition this year of about 12 graduate assistants, there having been a fund of \$5000 put aside for that purpose, will increase the teaching force of the university, and will also increase the strength of the graduate school.
