THOMAS WILLIAM SCOTT, BUREAU.
 Funeral services for the late Thomas William Scott were held Monday morning at 10 o'clock from the Holman chapel. Mr. Scott was general superintendent of the Kansas City Mill company and widely known all over the United States and Canada in the milling business. He was born in Reno, Canada, March 28, 1848, and had come to Portland with his only daughter, Mrs. H. R. Blayvelt, when his death occurred. The pallbearers were Jefferson Myers, E. N. Strong, Sanford Smith, W. H. Holmes, Glenn E. Husted, Thomas W. Kirby, Rev. A. A. Morrison officiated and the musical numbers were rendered by Mrs. Herman Politz. Interment was at Hillview cemetery.

COMMISSIONERS TO FIGHT.—Multnomah county commissioners are preparing to fight the temporary injunction obtained by Attorney John W. Kaste last week preventing the county from ordering the county clerk and county treasurer by the payment of warrants totalling \$332 to local firms from which the county had purchased gasoline books calling for 1500 gallons. They requested yesterday that the case be put on the docket and urged an early trial. Hearing of the case will decide whether the use of county gasoline for private automobiles of the commissioners, for private as well as county business, is legal.

CHECK FASSETT IS RETURNED.—Charles White, alias Fassett, wanted in Portland for the alleged passing of two bad checks amounting to \$500, was indicted by the grand jury yesterday. Deputy District Attorney Dempsey will submit the extradition papers to the governor and Deputy Sheriff George Hurst will leave tonight for Oakland, where White was arrested a week ago.

SPEEDING MAY BE COSTLY.—The new maximum for speeding is a year in jail and a fine of \$100, according to District Judge Jones, who yesterday "laid down the law" to two men brought before him for exceeding the speed limit. He ended by fining them only. Roy Reager was fined \$50 for traveling at 45 miles an hour across the Interstate Bridge and S. Nudeman \$40 for going 40 miles an hour on the Sandy road.

CITY ATTORNEY RETURNS.—City Attorney W. P. LaRoche has returned from Seattle, where he had been to attend a conference between shipping interests and longshoremen of the northwest. A tentative agreement has been reached covering wages and working conditions. Mr. LaRoche says and will be referred to the employers and employees for ratification.

DR. BODINE COMES HOME

LIEUTENANT-COLONEL CONCLUDES ARMY WORK.

Nearly a Year Spent in Charge of Surgical Department of Camp Hospital at Beaune.

"Yes, I am back in Portland again and I am glad of it," declared Dr. C. D. Bodine, 285 Fargo street, last night. Dr. Bodine had just returned from France after having spent nearly a year in the army medical department there.

As a lieutenant-colonel Dr. Bodine had charge of the surgical department of Camp Hospital No. 108 at Beaune, France, for a long time. This hospital was located near the Swiss border and handled a great deal of the American hospital work for soldiers located in that vicinity. He was originally identified with Base Hospital No. 27, but was later transferred to the camp hospital.

Dr. Bodine left for France the last of September, 1918. He left France for the states again June 27 and received his discharge at the Presidio on the fifth of this month.

"Don't say anything about what I did over in France," said Dr. Bodine last night. "I just did like the rest of the boys, the best I knew how."

"No, I haven't anything to say about anything," he continued laughing. "I'm just enjoying Portland once more, that's all."

PARISH DENIES REPORT

FLOUR MILLS OF PORTLAND NOT ORDERED TO CLOSE.

City Health Officer Says Millers Always Co-operate in Safeguarding Public Health.

Denial of the report that his department had ordered several flour mills of Portland and vicinity to close because of undesirable conditions in the plants was issued yesterday by City Health Officer Parrish, who said the millers never had shown an inclination to do other than that which the public health demanded, and that, therefore, orders to close plants entirely, and that the millers periodically conducted their own clean-up campaign for its eradication, so far as possible. The report that weevil had been found in the flour was denied by the chemical department.

The millers always have manifested a desire to hit the nail far as safeguarding public health is concerned," said Dr. Parrish, "and it has not been necessary even to threaten to close their mills, order to close them. Their plants are not closed today, so far as I know, unless they closed them voluntarily during the periodical clean-up which all millers have found necessary to conduct. We have not ordered them closed. I do not know where the report originated, but it does not seem to me that the millers have always co-operated with this department."

HANSON TALKS ON ALIENS

SEATTLE MAYOR WOULD HAVE IMMIGRATION RESTRICTED.

New Arrivals Should Be Made to Prove Worth First, He Says, and Then Be Given Freedom.

Selective admission and scientific distribution of aliens coming to the United States was advocated yesterday by Ole Hanson, mayor of Seattle, who delivered an address at the luncheon of delegates to the northwest conference of the Roosevelt Memorial association, held at the Benson hotel. Mr. Hanson urged that the immigration policy of the United States be conducted along lines making for the best interests of the United States and that people admitted to this country be under the same scrutiny that would be exercised by a man in opening his home to a stranger.

"A slap at Japan," was the way Mayor Hanson characterized existing immigration laws. He said the statute should be made to apply to all aliens, and that only such as might prove desirable should be permitted to enter. After entry, he said, they should be assigned to localities or a certain line of work until such time as citizenship papers were obtained, after which they might be free to locate at will.

In support of his plan, Mr. Hanson told of the hundreds of idle men frequently causing trouble in parts of the country.

PROBE OF PIERS ORDERED

Underwater Construction of Old Bridges to Be Examined.

As it is six years since the piers of the older Portland bridges have been examined thoroughly, Roadmaster Hatchel recommended yesterday that the county commissioners authorize the employment of a diver at a cost of \$225 to investigate the underwater construction. Authorization was given and the piers will be examined under the Hawthorne, Morrison and Burnside bridges.

From Oregon's share of the surplus war material of the government, Multnomah county will receive two two-ton trucks, according to advice received yesterday.

Tapestries for the court room of Circuit Judge Taxwell will cost \$798.50, according to a bid submitted to the commissioners.

Deputy District Attorney George Mowry will do the work of A. A. Murphy, during that deputy's six months' leave of absence, and will receive the remuneration accorded to Mr. Murphy's position, according to action of the commissioners yesterday.

PORTLAND MAN IS HONORED

Lieutenant-Colonel Kelly Gets Citation From General Pershing.

Lieutenant-Colonel George H. Kelly, well known lumberman and business man of Portland, who "went across with the 20th engineers, yesterday received a citation for exceptionally meritorious and conspicuous services with the American expeditionary forces. Lieutenant-Colonel Kelly was notified several weeks ago that he had been recommended for the citation and yesterday the coveted paper bearing the signature of General Pershing was received.

Lieutenant-Colonel Kelly was with the 20th engineers in Europe from 1917 until several months after the signing of the armistice, and saw service in many parts of France. Recently he received the much prized legion of honor award from the French government for meritorious service.

CITY'S TOMATOES ON WAY

Carload of Cost-Price Food Is Being Hauled Almost Here.

Portland's carload of canned tomatoes is somewhere in the offing. Despite the fact that he had received no further information as to movement of the car that was shipped several days ago from Sacramento, City Purchasing Agent McIntosh was confident last night that the carload of tomatoes would be on the bill of fare within the next 36 hours. He has been endeavoring to get the car number, in order to trace its movement and be in readiness to send the cargo to the three firms that have consented to distribute it without additional cost to the consumer.

MORATORIUM ACT INVOKED

Bankrupt Who Has Been in Service Seeks Final Order of Court.

Whether the moratorium act regarding debts of men in the service during the war will apply in bankruptcy cases, may be decided by the United States district court here, in case any of the creditors of A. E. Hoberg demand a hearing of their claims before the court. Hoberg filed a petition in bankruptcy and the adjudication was issued. The law provides that within 12 months of adjudication the petitioner must file a petition for discharge of all claims against him. Hoberg joined the service shortly before the expiration of the year's period, failing to file his petition. Yesterday he asked the court for an order of discharge of all claims against him. Hoberg claimed that the legal period of one year did not hold in view of the fact that he had been in the service.

The court allowed the order to stand with the provision that if any creditors appeared to protest the action the case would be opened for hearing.

GEORGE WASHINGTON LIKED

Alex Sheppard Names Wife's Friend as Divorce Co-respondent.

George Washington is named co-respondent in the divorce suit of Alex Sheppard, filed against Dora Sheppard in the circuit court yesterday. He alleges that his wife was arrested twice last June in company with George Washington and finally incarcerated in the city jail.

D. Belle Henderson finds a little more than a month of married life with Frank Henderson sufficient, filing suit for divorce yesterday, alleging that the day after their marriage, July 2, 1919, her husband exhibited a violent temper and since has been cruel and indifferent to her.
