

BRITAIN'S LATCHKEY TIED WITH RED TAPE

New Rules for Visitors Likely
to Bar U. S. Dollars.

ANTE-WAR FREEDOM GONE

Latest Restrictions Resented by
American Tourist Class, Which
Has Millions to Spend.

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LONDON, Aug. 25.—(Special Cable.)

The British government has announced its rigid new peacetime regulations and restrictions for visitors to the United Kingdom. It is a question now how many Americans will desire to visit England, which has lost its old freedom of movement for visitors.

When retailers and hotel proprietors begin to realize that the regulations will jeopardize the huge \$100,000,000 which American tourists have left in their wake here in an average summer they will make a loud wail.

If most of the Americans who have had to undergo the system of police registration and inconvenience to business travel carry out their plans there will be a boycott of England in the future by thousands of Americans.

Practically every American who has come here since the armistice and been forced to spend much time registering with the police is going home to assist in the legislation and to discourage relatives and friends from coming to England.

"If the British make us feel like suspects and enemy aliens who don't we do the same thing with British subjects in America?" they ask.

Americans who live here because they represent American concerns thought that when the war ended there would no longer be any necessity for standing in line in police stations with Germans. Their consternation is great because the peace time regulations are more onerous than were this necessary war measure.

It will be necessary for any American business house here to obtain the consent of the ministry of labor to import an American employee. Recently the new secretary of the American Chamber of Commerce in London was stopped on his arrival in Liverpool until permission was obtained for him to come to London to take up his duties.

The widest latitude is given the government officials at ports to bar any alien, and at any time certain districts of the kingdom can be shut off to aliens, who are to be under as close if not closer supervision than during the war.

The government timed its announcement of the severe regulations just after parliament adjourned for two months, thus stifling parliamentary criticism until the rules have been in effect for a month or more.

It is only another evidence of the influence of the reactionaries in the government. Recently the French government made its displeasure known on the proposed restrictions. So far the American government has not taken any action.

DRY TIMES AID JEWELERS

Money Formerly Spent for Liquor
Now Goes for Gems.

CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—Prohibition and high wages paid during the war have combined to make the jewelry business more prosperous than ever before in its history, according to delegates attending the meeting of the American Retail Jewelers' association in session here.

"A large part of the money formerly expended for liquor is now being used in buying jewelry," said Joseph Mazur of New York.

"The public apparently has plenty of money and is spending a large part of it for jewelry. The highest priced articles are in the greatest demand."

LIGGETT WILL DETERMINE

Ultimate Size of Camp Lewis Matter

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—General Hunter Liggett, commander of the western department, is expected at Camp Lewis soon to determine the ultimate size of the camp before the secretary of War Baker issued an order to have General Liggett settle the question after W. H. Abel, Montezuma attorney, appeared before him with a request that the camp should be cut to 25,000 acres. Deeds to 54,000 acres already have been approved.

DEMAND OF ALLIES GETS ARCHDUKE OUT

Mission Gives Joseph Two
Hours to Leave Post.

U. S. DELEGATES PROVOKED

Americans Displeased With Failure
to Handle Roumanian Case
With Firmness.

PARIS, Aug. 25.—The resignation of the Hungarian government to accept Archduke Joseph, previously reported in press advices, was announced in messages received by the supreme council today.

The resignation occurred at 8 o'clock Saturday night and that the formation of a new cabinet had begun.

In the new cabinet, the dispatches state, Paul Garami, minister of justice in the Peidl cabinet, will be minister of commerce, while former Premier Peidl will be minister of food.

Karl Payer, minister of home affairs in the Peidl government, is designated as minister of labor in the reconstructed cabinet, and Count Crany, a minister of foreign affairs, The other places have not yet been filled.

Archduke Joseph's resignation followed the delivery of the supreme council telegram demanding that he resign, accompanied by a letter stating that the inter-allied mission would give him two hours to take this action.

The American peace delegation is displeased with the tendency to make the supreme council an international foreign office, taking up many matters not properly belonging to the conference. It is also annoyed at the failure of the powers to take more direct action to require Roumania to live up to the armistice.

It has been made clear that the American delegates are not willing to sit much longer on controversies in which the United States has little direct interest.

PARIS, Aug. 25.—(Havas.)—The Roumanian cabinet has refused to accept the decision of the peace conference relative to the division of Banat and Femevar between Roumania and Serbia, according to the Echo de Paris, which adds that Serbia is reported to be considering the general demobilization of her army.

PARIS, Aug. 25.—Germany has declined to invite allied troops to police Silesia before they have that right under the treaty, which stipulates that they are to safeguard the plebiscite there. The Silesian situation is unsatisfactory and the Germans are reported to be bringing about a recrudescence of the recent reign of terror in that province.

TEN DEALERS ARRESTED
SOUND COMMISSION MEN HELD
FOR HOARDING POTATOES.

Four Japanese Among Defendants
Released Under \$500 Bond Each.
Stock Thrown on Market.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 25.—Ten Seattle commission men were arrested here today and charged with hoarding potatoes in an attempt to increase prices. Four of the 10 were Japanese.

All were released under \$500 bonds. The men were arrested in connection with the seizure Thursday of approximately 300,000 pounds of potatoes by federal officers.

The potatoes, it was said, had been held in storage so long many were unfit for human consumption. Some of the good potatoes of the seized lot were thrown on the local market.

ONLY 238 IN STATE PRISON
Dry Law and Parole Policy Cause
Fall in Population.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—Prohibition and the liberal parole policy in Oregon have combined to reduce the population of the state penitentiary to the lowest degree in four years, according to Salem officials. Records show 238 men and 3 women in the prison, against a total population of more than 300 four years ago.

Although a few of those paroled from the institution violate the confidence placed in them by the officials, more than 85 per cent of the men make good and eventually are restored to citizenship, according to the records at the prison.

6 HELD FOR AUTO THEFTS

Woman Accused of Being Leader of
Interstate Gang.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—Suspected of being interstate

automobile thieves, Alfred Kellerbren, and Lillian Miller, alias Kellerbren, who says her home is in Oregon, were arrested today and lodged in the city jail on a charge of grand larceny. They were arrested, following alleged confessions by Harry Schirmer and William Schirmer, who with John Fratella and Luke Fratella, were arrested earlier in the day.

According to the police, the two Schirmer boys confessed that they had been implicated with Kellerbren in the theft of an automobile, which was taken to Downey and stripped. They say the woman is the leader of a band of auto thieves, it is alleged.

The police are investigating statements made by the Schirmer boys that Kellerbren and the woman had been active in the theft of automobiles in California, Oregon, Idaho, Washington and Montana.

BIG PLANES PATROL FIRES

DE HAVILLAND CRAFT REPLACE
CURTISS MACHINES.

Large Ships Establish Base at Eugene for Operations Over
West Forest Areas.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—The five De Havilland and seven Curtiss planes stationed in Salem and Roseburg in connection with the Oregon forest fire patrol will assemble at Eugene tomorrow, from where the larger craft will operate north as far as Portland and south as far as Medford.

The Curtiss planes, which have been replaced by the De Havilland type of machine, will leave soon for Redding, Cal., where they will engage in forest fire patrol work.

The five De Havilland planes arrived at Olcott field last night and this morning two of them hopped off on preliminary cruises of the forested areas between Eugene and Eugene and Salem and Portland.

The craft making the flight to Portland was piloted by Lieutenant Wright and carried Lieutenant Webb and a mechanic as passengers. Major Smith was in command of the plane going to Eugene and was accompanied on the trip by F. A. Elliott, state forester.

Mr. Elliott returned here tonight and expressed his high satisfaction with the conduct of the large craft. The De Havillands are capable of developing a speed of 125 miles an hour and made the trip from Eugene to Salem, a distance of 150 miles, in 80 minutes.

The planes leaving tomorrow for Eugene will carry a full complement of tools and equipment here since this city was designated as a base for fire patrol operations in this section of the forest.

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—The home of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Watson Bray on Twenty-eighth avenue furnished the setting for the wedding of Miss Jane Morrison, daughter of Arthur Burkhead of Monmouth, Or., this afternoon. Only immediate relatives of the couple were present.

The ceremony was followed by a wedding dinner and supper, after which Burkhead and his bride left on a motor trip. They will be away a couple of weeks and will then return for a brief visit with Mrs. Burkhead's parents before leaving for their future home in Oregon.

The bride is one of the most attractive girls in the younger set here. Mr. Burkhead has just received his discharge from the educational department of the government, where he has been serving since his release from the navy a few months ago.

HOMEMADE LIQUOR SEIZED

Search of Farmer's Home Near Oakland, Or., Brings Results.

ROSEBURG, Or., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—The home of H. E. Kruger, a farmer of the Oakland section, was searched by Sheriff Quine and deputies and a quantity of homemade liquor was confiscated. In addition to the homemade liquor, a gallon jar of alcohol was discovered and seized. Kruger admitted that he made the liquor, but asserted that he was within the law, the alcohol having been bought some years ago.

The confiscated goods were turned over to the district attorney's office as evidence in the case. It is found on analysis of the liquor that Kruger has violated the statutes.
