## CRATER PARK MAY EXTEND

DIAMOND LAKE INCLUSION FAVORED BY MATHER.

New York Zoological Chief Promises Stock of Olympic Elk for Cascade Game Purposes.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Aug. 31.—(Special).—If the efforts of Stephen T. Mather, assistant secretary of the interior and director of the national parks, materialize, Diamond lake will be included within the boundaries of Crater Lake national park.

Mr. Mather was in Klamath Falls last week for a few hours with Madison Grant, president of the New York zoological society and Boone-Crockett Gun club. They left for Sacramento and San Francisco in a touring car, after visiting the lava beds that are located 60 miles from here.

There has been much agitation among the people throughout Klamath county for the inclusion of Diamond lake in the Crater Lake park. Mr. Mather formerly did not appreciate the value of this, but after his inspection recently he vowed to do all possible to have the scenic spot included.

A road will be built from the present highway around the rim of Crater lake. This will place Diamond lake on the direct route from the Dunes to California. Eventually a system of roads will be laid out that will bring it into the direct travel of both the Dunes-California and Pacific highways.

Mr. Grant promised to stock the Diamond lake section with Olympic elk, which will make the game available in the Cascades for the sportsman. Mr. Grant was likewise intensely interested in the preservation of the trees along the great highways. He particularly commented on the wisdom of leaving the giant trees along the road from Ashland to Klamath Falls, characterizing them as some of the finest he had ever seen.

## TREATY FIGHT MAY END

COMMITTEE WILL TRY TO REPORT AMENDED PACT.

Early Disposal of Bills Affecting Prohibition, Oil-Land Leasing and Railroads in Sight.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—Efforts of the senate foreign relations committee to report out the amended German peace treaty soon after President Wilson's departure Wednesday on his western speaking tour, is of greatest interest on this week's congressional programme starting Tuesday after the labor day recess.

Republican leaders expect to report the treaty to the senate late this week or early next week for open consideration while the president is addressing the country, thus bringing the treaty contest to a climax. Controversy over ratification, amendments, reservations and interpretations is expected to ensue indefinitely and be intensified by the president's address.

Other important developments expected in congress during the week are:

disposal by the senate of the prohibition enforcement bill and the oil land leasing bill and report by the senate interstate commerce subcommittee of a bill proposing a permanent railroad regulation policy. Work in the house will be confined largely to committee work in preparing legislation.

## SENATE DEBATE TO CONTINUE

The foreign relations committee will continue hearings this week on questions affecting smaller European nations and peoples and also act on remaining provisions of the treaty, possibly by adoption of further amendments.

Debate in the senate on the treaty will continue Tuesday afternoon, speaking Tuesday in reply to recent addresses by Senators Lodge and Knox. The senate judiciary committee is called to meet tomorrow to consider the constitutionality of the French defense treaty.

The railroad bill is to be introduced Tuesday by Chairman Cummins. To provide the permanent rank of general for General Pershing before his arrival from overseas, senate leaders plan to pass on Tuesday the house bill granting the lifetime title.

**Reduction of Costs Sought.**  
Congressional committees continue work this week on measures designed to reduce the cost of living, with the house bill extending the food control law against profiteers on the senate calendar awaiting to be brought up. The house agriculture committee hopes to report soon a bill to regulate cold storage.

Hearings by the senate agriculture committee on the Kenyon-Kenrick bill to regulate the packing industry will continue this week. Principal bills before the house this week are over: tariff measures and those appropriating funds for completion of the Alaskan railroad and to repeal the law establishing the housing corporation.

Consideration of a permanent military policy will occupy both senate and house military committees this week.

## HANSON QUITS LABOR UNION

EX-MAYOR RETURNS CARD TO BOILERMAKERS.

Organization Is Played for Conduct During Strikes; Officers Are Termed Revolutionists.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 31.—(Special).—When former Mayor Hanson Saturday returned a silver membership card in the boilermakers' union, local No. 104, which was given him last spring upon the conclusion of the purchasing of the street-car lines, he sent a written statement to the officers of the union to the effect that while he will support the cause of labor, he will not retain membership in an organization that has formed a coalition with the I. W. W.

He flayed the conduct of the organization and termed its officers revolutionists, who had attempted to turn the city government over to a soviet approved by Al Miller of the Metal Trades council; James Duncan, Samuel Thompson; George P. Van derwerker, attorney for the I. W. W.; William D. Haywood, secretary of the I. W. W.; and the Russian alien, who is now in hiding, and Sam Sadler and Hulet M. Wells, convicted seditionists.

"Your union ceased to function as a labor union and became a revolutionary society the day it did not repudiate its false leaders," Hanson wrote, in conclusion. "I have waited in vain for the inner circles to call for the silver card. I hereby refuse longer to retain the card in my possession. When Americanism is the issue, there can be no compromise. Therefore, I return the card in the hope that the rank and file will, in the near future, remove from the positions of power in your union the officers and leaders who so grossly misled and deceived the workers, and, by so doing, proved themselves not only false to this country and my flag (not their flag), but also false to the principles of labor unionism."

## LINN SENATOR IMPROVES

Frank Porter, Attacked by Bull, Now Walks With Cane.

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 31.—(Special).—Frank H. Porter, the Linn senator, has recovered sufficiently from an accident which occurred almost a year ago to be able to walk with a cane. He was on crutches for 11 months.

After being confined to his bed for about three months, Senator Porter was able to stand and walk with the aid of the legislature by using two crutches. Senator Porter is one of the best known breeders of Red Polled cattle in the Pacific northwest and for several years has exhibited some of his herd at the annual fairs and exhibitions in Oregon and Washington. Last September he was superintending a load of cattle on a car at Haley when a bull attacked him.

## BEND POST GETS PICTURE

Painting Shows Burial Place of Victims of Tuscania.

BEND, Aug. 31.—(Special).—A picture that brings to the minds of many American soldiers who embarked on the Tuscania, among them Percy A. Stevens of Bend, for whom the local post of the American Legion is named, has been presented to the post, showing the last resting place of the Tuscania victims.

The picture is a replica of a painting of Kilnoughton bay, Islay, Scotland, showing the churchyard where the Americans were buried. It was presented by Mr. and Mrs. N. G. Davis of this city.

## MONTANA NOT DESPERATE

Unfavorable Publicity Through Crop Condition Reports Deplored.

MRSODLA, Mont.—The Missoula chamber of commerce has adopted resolutions deploring the "unfavorable publicity" given this state through reports "in state and governmental channels of crop conditions, drought, etc."

It is declared that conditions in western Montana are not bad and that a good crop is expected. Within the last several days rain in eastern and central Montana has given hope that the range may yet be saved and that wholesale shipment of cattle out of the state may be averted.

**Klamath Falls Plans Chamber.**

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Aug. 31.—(Special).—A large and enthusiastic crowd of business men and citizens of Klamath Falls heard F. S. Bramwell, vice-president of the state chamber of commerce, Thursday night discuss the vital need of co-operative work by the various chambers of commerce in the state in future publicity work by Oregon. ## TEXAN'S LOAN BILL READS LIKE FICTION

Senator Sheppard's Scheme Rivals Colonel Sellers.

## EVERYBODY IS WELCOME

Billion-Dollar Fund Under Cabinet Control Would Furnish Funds for Many Purposes.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—One of the most remarkable of the many bills introduced in the present congress proposes to set aside \$1,000,000,000 of the public funds in order to make loans to anybody who needs money to expand his business. The author of the measure is Senator Sheppard of Texas.

Under the innocent title of "A bill to increase the utility of the postal savings bank, to encourage savings among the people, and to secure the largest returns for such savings consistent with adequate security," the measure proceeds to organize the members of the president's cabinet into an industrial savings board. The only reference to "savings" in the bill is in this title and in the title to the bill itself.

This board is to take over control of the existing postal saving bank and all postmasters and letter carriers are authorized to take money for deposit and also to redeem certificates of deposit. Twenty-five per cent of the amount of the deposits is to be invested "in the bonds of the United States, bought in the open market at the lowest obtainable price." No other investments are to be made, and the balance is to be loaned out at 6 per cent preferably in small, short-time loans secured by readily marketable collateral or real estate.

**Loans Are Listed.**  
Loans can be made on state or government bonds up to 95 per cent of their market value; on investment securities approved by the Massachusetts and New York savings bank laws up to 90 per cent of their market value; and on wheat, cotton or other non-perishable products, stored in bonded and insured, up to 85 per cent of their market value.

On unencumbered real estate loans may be made "with or without amortization payments, as the borrower may prefer." The loans may be made through any bank or any corporation dealing in real estate mortgages which is subject to the examination of the banking department of any state to an amount ten times the capital and surplus of the bank or corporation.

Personal loans up to \$1000 "without requirement of collateral security may be made" by the board. The board may make written statement, showing his assets and liabilities and the purpose for which the money is to be used. The term of the loan is for one year, but if, after trying the scheme for two years, this \$1000 limit is deemed too small it may be extended to larger sums.

**Certificates May Be Passed.**  
The certificate of deposit in the postal savings bank is stipulated "shall not be legal tender nor in any way indicated as 'money,' but may pass from hand to hand by mutual agreement as is done in the case of 'certified' or other bank checks."

The last section of the bill reads: "That to the extent that certificates of deposit in postal savings banks crowd out of use forms of paper money now in use, causing the depreciation of the market price of bonds of the United States used to secure their circulation, below par, the treasury of the United States shall purchase or redeem such bonds at par issuing, so far as may be necessary to do so, other bonds of the United States bearing higher rate of interest and marketable at or above par."

The bill has been referred to a subcommittee of the treasury committee consisting of Senators Edge, Stirling, Dye, Gay and Walsh.

## TRAINING UNIT IS ADDED

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON WILL HAVE ARTILLERY COURSE.

Handling of Coast Defense, Heavy Mobile and Anti-Aircraft Guns Included.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., Aug. 29.—(Special).—Notice has just been received at the university that beginning with the fall term this institution will have established here one of the few coast artillery units to be introduced into the colleges in this country.

The work of the unit here will be to train men for officers in the coast artillery in co-operation with the reserve officer's training corps unit established here following the demand of the students' army training corps unit.

The unit established here, according to the announcement, will not only include the training of officers for the coast defense guns, but for the heavy mobile artillery and the anti-aircraft artillery, which is the most technical of all branches of artillery.

The war department will detail an officer here to have charge of the instruction and the government will also supply the equipment necessary, which will probably mean that a considerable supply of ordinance will be sent here.

## WILSON TALKS BUT ONCE

NO SEATS WILL BE RESERVED WHEN PRESIDENT SPEAKS.

Ships From Fleet Expected to Be in Harbor September 15 to Give Presidential Salute.

President Wilson's only speech in Portland and Oregon will be delivered in a public audience on Monday night, September 15. The president's itinerary precluded Oswald West's plans for the delivery of a short speech during the day the chief executive will be in Portland. A message yesterday from J. P. Tumulty, secretary to the president, stated that the schedule for the president's trip made any change in plans impossible.

The meeting will be strictly non-partisan and the only efforts to reserve seats will be for members of the reception committee. The building will be thrown open to the public, first come, first served policy.

The first meeting of the general com-

mittee appointed to arrange the programme for the president's stay in the city will be held probably Wednesday. Mayor Baker and Oswald West, both members of the committee, are out of the city and will not return until tomorrow. This committee also will plan the entertainment of Mrs. Wilson, who will accompany the president.

Secretary Tumulty has requested that the programme be submitted to the president for approval, explaining that during the trip so many addresses will be made by President Wilson that it will be necessary to conserve his strength by curtailing much of the entertainment.

Golf may attract the president and his aide, Rear-Admiral Grayson, to the course of the Waverley Golf club, where former Presidents Taft and Roosevelt both played.

According to present plans, ships from the Pacific fleet will be in the harbor during the president's visit. A presidential salute will be fired.

## B'NAI B'RITH PATRIOTIC

ORDER PLANS TO PROMOTE AMERICANIZATION WORK.

High Officials of Society in Portland on Tour of Lodges in Several Northwestern States.

Efforts of the Independent Order of B'nai B'rith this year will be turned toward Americanization work now that the war is over. The authority for this statement is Milton Meyer, grand president, who arrived here yesterday with his wife and Mr. and Mrs. Edgar C. Levy from San Francisco. Mr. Levy is grand orator of the fourth district. They are on a tour of inspection of the lodges of the northwest and will be entertained while in Portland.

"B'nai B'rith is co-operating with the bureau of education in Washington, D. C.," said Mr. Meyer, "in efforts to get immigrants to attend night schools. Where there are no schools for immigrants we are asking that they be provided."

"We are not concerned merely with our own Jewish people, but with all, irrespective of race or creed. In Portland you have not so serious a foreign problem as in San Francisco and Seattle, where boats are constantly bringing in Russians from Vladivostok. We want them to be taught in schools instead of becoming victims of red literature."

Mr. Meyer cited instances of care given Russian refugees by the lodge and of the kind treatment accorded the daughter of the leading anti-semitic paper of Petrograd, despite her father's hatred of the Jews. He also described cases at Ellis Island that have been given attention. "We want those immigrants who are not going to make good citizens shipped back, but those who are in trouble and deserve to remain in this country we are caring for," he continued.

"As far as the Jews are concerned, we have never let our people become public charges. They are always cared for by our own institutions."

The party is visiting 26 lodges in Oregon, California, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Nevada, and will leave Wednesday morning for Seattle. Members of the local lodge took the visitors up the Columbia highway yesterday and entertained them at the hotel. A banquet and dance in their honor will be held at the hotel Monday night and for Tuesday a luncheon and theater party are scheduled. A large claim is to be initiated at a closed session of the lodge Tuesday night, which they will attend.

## SPRUCE INQUIRY LULLS

PROCEEDINGS AWAIT RETURN OF CONGRESS COMMITTEE.

Presence of General Disque, Accused Former Corporation Head, Lends Interest.

A lull in the spruce inquiry prevails, owing to the visit of the congressional committee to the site of former operations in Lincoln county, where Spruce Production corporation constructed lines of railroad and built a huge oil mill at Toledo. The committee, James A. Ford, representative of Wisconsin; Clarence F. Lea, representative of California, and W. W. McLean, representative of New York, are expected to return this morning.

The presence in the city of General Disque, former head of the spruce production division and corporation, who hastened from New York to answer in person the charges that have been made against him and his administration, lends distinct interest to the anticipation of further sessions of the congressional inquiry.

Owing to the fact that this is Labor day, sessions will not be resumed until tomorrow morning. Friends and business associates of General Disque assert that he will be able to refute all apparently damaging testimony that has been presented to the committee, and to demonstrate that the spruce production division and company is essential to the production of the enormous mass of airplane lumber required by America and her allies had the war been further prolonged.

## CENTRALIA LEVY 21 MILLS

Salary of Mayor Increased to \$2000 in New Budget.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Aug. 31.—(Special).—Centralia's 1920 budget, providing a 15-mill tax levy for current expenses and six mills for indebtedness, was adopted yesterday by the city commission. The estimated expenses for all city departments total \$142,140.95, estimated receipts \$84,000, leaving \$58,140.95 to be raised by taxation.

In anticipation of the 1920 federal census, the budget provides an annual salary of \$2000 for the mayor and \$1500 for each of the commissioners, allowed for cities of between 8000 and 14,000 population. The mayor at present receives \$1200 and the commissioners \$1000 each.

## FLIER MAKES SPEEDY RUN

Thousand-Mile Round Trip Made in 46 1/2 Minutes.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—Lieutenant B. W. Maynard of the United States army air service, won the international army derby between Mineola, N. Y., and Toronto, Canada, covering the 1000-mile round trip course in 46 1/2 minutes, it was announced tonight by the American Flying club.

Lieutenant H. H. George, whose flying time was 520 3-5 minutes, finished second. Lieutenant D. B. Glah was third with a flying time of 524 1/2 minutes. The winners in the reliability test will be announced Thursday.

## BIG TIMBER TRACT BOUGHT

60,000,000 FEET TO BE CUT INTO LUMBER.

Sawmill and Commissary Buildings to Rise on British Columbia Property.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 31.—(Special).—A timber tract of 3200 acres on Boulder creek, in British Columbia, 100 miles from Spokane, has been acquired by the O'Neill-Irvine-Mann Lumber company, recently incorporated.

The tract lies between Salmo and Ymlr, on the Great Northern railway, and contains 60,000,000 feet of timber and 60,000 poles. Upon it the company will install a modern mill capable of cutting 100,000 feet of lumber in two shifts, will build a flume two miles in length, boarding house and commissary building and a sidetrack from the railway. The amount involved is withheld.

The timber is composed of white pine, cedar, white fir and spruce, and the stand is 20,000 feet to the acre. A contract for the poles has been made with the National Pole company, Escanaba, Mich. The lumber will be placed on the Chicago market.

The work of building the camp was started a week ago and the erection of the flume will be started this week. A sawmill has been shipped to the tract to cut timber for the buildings. Four men are contemplated in the operation of the big mill.

## FIELD IS TO BE INSPECTED

Army Air Service Official Expected at Eugene Soon.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 31.—(Special).—Colonel H. H. Arnold, commanding the air service of the western department of the army, is expected here within a few days to inspect the Eugene aviation field which is used as a base for the forest fire patrol in western Oregon.

Four of the hangars for the De Havilland planes that are now used in the service have arrived and will be erected at once. Others are expected soon.

One of the De Havilland will be taken Monday to participate in the Labor day demonstration, but no fancy flying will be attempted.

Lieutenant F. E. Roeder has arrived.
