SPECIAL SERVICE TO FAIR ANNOUNCED.
Special train service will be given next week by the Southern Pacific and Oregon Electric lines between Portland and Salem for accommodation of the large number of people expected to attend the Oregon state fair. An excursion rate of \$2.30 will be in effect on both roads. From Tuesday to Saturday, inclusive, the Southern Pacific will operate a train leaving Portland at 8:30 o'clock each morning and leaving Salem at 5:10 P. M., making stops at intermediate points. Wednesday morning the Oregon Electric will operate two sections in the train leaving the North Bank station at 8:15 o'clock, and three sections will be run on Thursday morning. An extra train will leave Salem at 10 o'clock Thursday night for Portland.

BEIJAN BOTTLES AID UNIVERSITY.
